## New State Attendance Laws Now In Effect

## "Is your child a full time

 student?....Only if your child attends school 175 days per school year, then that child is 97 percent of one student. If absent 10 days during the school year, then 94 percent of one student is what the state allows for your child." This is Superintendent Kenneth Sweatt's challenge Kenneth Sweatt's challenge for the year under the State's new attendance
accounting system. "In the accounting system. "In the past," he explains, we were allowed to choose a fal month and a spring month.
periods, we stressed and offered incentives for fulltime attendance to achieve maximum percentages for state payments.
-' With increased computer technology, each school district will send attendance records each month, and the state will pay basic entitlements based on average attendance for the entire year, continues Sweatt.
Accoding to Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager of the School District, the basic allotment per student begins at approximately
$\$ 1,900$ for a computation of gress state aid for a foundation school program. "However, when the state awards this amount per student, they automatically factor out of it a district's share of the foundation program
"For instance, assume that the state computes 220 students at $\$ 1,900$ per student, then the district would automatically receive $\$ 418,000$ per student, then the district would automatically receive $\$ 418,000$ from the state to operate an accredited system.
"However, the state, at the end of an involved formula, assumes that the school district can pay 40 school district can pay 40 percent of minimum costs. Now, that basic allotment has become $\mathbf{\$ 1 , 1 4 0}$. So for 220 students, there is now $\$ 250,800$ from the state rather than the gross $\$ 418,000$ computed first.
"This is an over-simplification of a very involved formula,' continues Hutsell, but these are the basic elements to the program."

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular
session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

## New State Attendance Laws Now In Effect

"Is your child a full time student? "...Only if your child attends school 175 days per school year, then that child is 97 percent of one student. If absent 10 days during the school year, then 94 percent of one student is what the state allows for your child."

This is Superintendent Kenneth Sweatt's challenge for the year under the State's new attendance State's new attendance accounting system. "In the past," he explains, "we were allowed to choose a fall month and a spring month.
During those accounting
periods, we stressed and periods, we stred incentives for fulltime attendance to achieve maximum percentages for state payments.

- With increased computer technology, each school district will send attendance records each month, and the state will pay basic entitlements based on average attendance for the entire year, continues Sweatt.
Accoding to Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager of the School District, the basic allotment per student begins at approximately
$\$ 1,900$ for a computation of gross state aid for a foundation school program. "However, when the state awards this amount per student, they automatically factor out of it a district's share of the foundation program.
"For instance, assume that the state computes 220 students at $\$ 1,900$ per student, then the district would automatically receive $\$ 418,000$ per student, then the district would automatically receive $\$ 418,000$ from the state to operate an accredited system.

However, the state, at the end of an involved formula, assumes that the school district can pay 40 percent of minimum costs. Now, that basic allotment has become $\$ 1,140$. So for 220 students, there is now $\$ 250,800$ from the state $\$ 250,800$ from the state rather than the gross 18,000 computed first.
'This is an over-simplification of a very involved ormula, continues Hutsell, but these are the basic elements to the program.'
"At this point," adds

## PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows
"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
