"With federal officials voicing concerns about the potential for another domestic attack, I am encouraging agricultural producers along the border and statewide to mobilize and be on the lookout for unusual activity and strangers on their farms and ranches,' Combs said. "Texas is the largest cattle producing state in the nation, so we must continue to be vigilant about protecting our animals against the introduction of foreign diseases."




