Amarillo, Panhandle and Pampa are named in the petition as the areas that Groom residents would like to call at the local rate. At least 40 residents (one name per household) are required to sign petitions to express an interest in expanding the The State call area. National Bank, Groom Dairy Queen and Groom City Hall have the petitions to sign.

Groom is currently reaping the benefits of the same type of expansion that was passed in White Deer. Calls from Groom to White Deer or from White Deer to Groom are the same as any local call.

Cost to the residential phone would be \$3.50 per month, no matter how many calls you make to Amarillo, Panhandle or Pampa. Businesses would pay an additional \$7.00 per month.

So much of local business must be transacted with establishments in Panhandle. Pampa and Amarillo. All county services must be

done with Panhandle. Doctors, pharmacies and hospitals must come from Amarillo or Pampa. The money the average person usually spends far exceeds \$3.50 per month.

Many school children that live in the Groom school district but have Pampa phones would also benefit. No longer would they be required to call collect or keep up with a credit card number in order to reach home.

Another additional benefit is that the Groom telephone system would have to be updated. Currently, Groom does not have access to many features (such as call waiting and caller I.D.) that more modern phone systems have. While many people may or may not use these type of benefits, we pay the same basic rate as other area towns that do.

If the petition of interest gets enough signatures, the measure will be put to a vote by way of local telephone bills. If 70% of Groom's telephone subscribers vote yes, the local calling will then be expanded to Amarillo, Pampa and Panhandle.

Deputy Larry Mendez is investigating the theft of materials and tools from a contractor. Deputy Mendez


