## Upward Trend

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling $\$ 120.7$ million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales taxes.
"The economy of Texas is Tovering "Bullock said "and the consumer confiance is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."
City sales tax rebates otaled $\$ 111.4$ million.
May checks represent laxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 21.

Groom's rebate was up 17 percent with a check amounting to $\mathbf{\$ 2 , 2 5 5 . 5 1}$. Panhandle had a 19 percent increase; Skellytown, 33 percent and White Deer a 31 percent increase.

The financial nformation contained in the updated rate filing demonsirates the company has an $\$ 81$ million revenue deficiency based on a rate of return.
GTE Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley said, 'The last time the company raised rates was in 1983. We have known with increased expenses and capital investments that eventually we would have to ask for increased revenues. With the downturn in the Texas economy we wanted to delay this as long as possible. this as long as possible.
However, since we are being required to update the current financials and procurrent financials and process the merits of the rate fling, we have decided to seek the rates necessary to cover the
deficiency.
