It's the end of an era: Groom Memorial Hospital no longer exists. My mind was filled with

memories as I read the headlines in The Groom News. Memories of the pride we all felt at the opening of the hospital; of the sore feet all band members had from marching in parades and playing in concerts to raise money for it; of all the cakes, pies, breads and cookies baked and donated to this worthy cause; of the barbecues and dinners served to raise matching funds for the Hill-Burton grant monies. All of this was done because there was a need.

And that need was med. It was met by those dedi-cated men and women who devoted their lives to the health care of the Groom Community and the area surgounding it surrounding it. My father, Dr. Witt, was

there at the beginning of Groom Memorial Hospital. He worked hard for this dream to materialize and he worked with people whose visions matched his own. Bankers, merchants, housewives, farmers, housewives, school children—we all had a piece of the dream, and we all felt a true sence of accomplishment when it was realized.

was realized. Doctors, nurses, techni-cians, administrators, cooks and housekeepers all came—and went, until there was only one frail, ill elderly man trying to keep the flame lit and burning brightly in the Groom Memorial Hospital. And then he, too, left—his body giving out while his spirit then he, too, left—his body giving out while his spirit still fought. Even at the end his philosophy remained, "Don't worry or fret about things you can't control. Worry about and work Worry about and work toward things you can make

happen." Even though this is the end of an era, I'm proud to see the effort the community is making toward going forward and building a future for Groom. Commu-

Activities begin at 9:00 a.m. and conclude with the barbecue in the evening.



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



#### **GTE Installs New Phone System in Groom**

General Telephone Gen-eral Manager Jerry West says the new phone system for Groom will go on line Nov. 8.

The new equipment will bring about touch calling capabilities and "more im-portantly," says West, "automatic number identification." This service will automatically charge long distance calls to your phone number. You will no longer get an operator when you dial long distance. Groom customers are ac-

customed to calling any-where in town and charg-ing the calls to their own numbers when the operator asks for the billing infor-mation. In November, this will require an operator assisted call or the use of a credit card.

The biggest change for Groom customers will be having to learn new phone numbers. "The Itech numbers. "The Itech system being installed in Groom was engineered to require the last four digits in every number to be changed," said Mr. West. The 248 prefix will remain the same. Mr. West added that the General Telephone notified customers well in advance of the number changes so that they would changes so that they would have ample time to notify family and friends before

the change takes place. For those of us slow to take care of such details, the phone company will provide a recording when the old numbers are called. The recording will advise callers that the number is in longer in service, please consult your directory or

directory assistance. A supplemental directory will be delivered to telehone customers before Nov. 8 and new director-ies are to be ready for distribution in May.
