D. A. Reports On Case Status

District Attorney, James Shelton, has provided the following status report on several pending criminal cases due to numerous inquiries regarding these specific cases. These are several factors which have contributed to the delay in obtaining a final resolution in these cases. First, there was a substantial period of time in which the district did not have a District Attorney after David McCoy was sworn in as District Judge. The Governor's office appointed James Shelton as District Attorney in late September, 1993, after McCoy had assumed the Judge's position on August 1, 1993. Second, Judge McCoy is disqualified from from serving as Judge on any case in which he participated in any manner as District Attorney. Therefore, another Judge has to be assigned to hear those cases. The scheduling of trials and cases between five counties, several judges, court reporter, and other court personnel has been rather difficult. The following is a brief summary of the status of the listed cases.

1. Cause No. 2525, The State of Texas vs. Roy Lynn Pool. Roy Lynn Pool has been indicted for felony

theft of property of a value in excess of \$20,000.00. District Attorney, James Shelton, has been in contact with and is working with the United States Attorney's Office in Amarillo regarding additional federal charges against Ms. Pool. It is anticipated that both the federal court case and the state court case will be concluded within sixty (60) days. At the present time, District Attorney Shelton, Assistant U.S. Attorney, Mark Nichols, and Phil Jordan, attorney for Ms. Pool, are discussing options for disposition and resolution of both the federal and state court actions. Since David McCoy was District Attorney when this case was originally presented to the Carson County Grand Jury, Retired District Judge, John Forbis, has been assigned to preside over the case.

2. Causes Nos. 2501 and 2502, The State of Texas vs. Jerry Lee Daniels. Jerry Lee Daniels has been indicted on two separate cases of indecency with a child. David McCoy was District Attorney at the time the cases were presented to the Carson County Grand Jury and was, therefore, disqualified from presiding

Kenneth (Buster) Eugene Schultz

Kenneth Eugene (Buster) Schultz, a lifelong resident of Groom, was pronounced dead at Northwest Texas Hospital, Wednesday, February 16, following a one car accident near the intersection of the I-40 service road and Texas 70. Buster, the son of Kenny and LaVerne Schultz, was 24 years old.

The exact time of the accident was unknown, but was thought to have been approximately around 1:00 a.m. Shultz is said to have been returning from Clarendon when he entered a curve onto Texas 70 from I-40. He failed to straighten the '78 Toyota and ran off the north side of the service road. The driver then overcorrected, went into a sideways skid and began to roll.

The accident was reported by an unknown driver who called for help from the K O A Campgrounds. The Groom

Volunteer Ambulance Service was called. From the scene, the MediVac Helicopter Unit was called out.

Shultz had massive head injuries, chest and abdominal injuries according to DPS Trooper John Holland and had been ejected from the vehicle. He may have, also, been exposed to the cold for as long as two hours before the wreck was discovered.

Shultz was a 1987 graduate of Groom High School. He is survived by his parents, Kenny and LaVerne Schultz, a sister, La Neta McClure of Amarillo and his grandmother, Clara Shultz of Westbrook, Minn.

Services were held Friday, February 18, at the United Methodist Church of Groom. The family requests memorials be to the Groom Ambulance Fund.

Letter to Editor:

For the first time within the memory of most local voters we have a contested race for District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District - comprised of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, and Hall Counties. First among the duties and responsibilities of a District Attorney in Texas is the prosecution of persons charged in State District Court with the commission of felony crimes. Felony level crimes are the most serious kinds of crimes - crimes for which, if convicted, a person may be sent to prison, as opposed to merely being fined or sent to county jail. It is difficult to over-emphasize the value of a good District Attorney to the citizens of this district. We have been blessed in past years with quality representation.

By law, candidates for the office of District Attorney must meet only two standards in order to qualify for the office. They must be licensed to practice law in this State, and be residents of the district for which they seek office. Other criteria which voters may consider - but which are not mandatory - are ability, dedication, experience, personal integrity, life style, etc. Personal tastes of the voter notwithstanding, a candidate's ability, etc., notwithstanding, if the candidate does not meet the minimum standards mandated by law, the candidate is not qualified to serve - he or she is disqualified.

Randall Sims, one of the candidates for District Attorney of our district was not a resident of the district for the requisite period of time before the filing deadline. Mr. Sims lived and worked in Amarillo (Potter County) until the first of this year. The law requires that the candidate live continuously in the District for six months before the filing deadline - which was January 3, 1994. Therefore, to be a qualified candidate, Mr. Sims had to reside continuously in the district from July 3, 1993 to January 3, 1994. In the Spring of 1993, Mr. Sims expressed his intentions to run as a Republican candidate against Randy Sherrod for Randall County District Attorney. His claims that he

"intended" to reside in the 100th District are all form and no substance. By law, residence is a matter of intention, volition (making a decision), and action. His assertions that he "intended" to live in this district is directly contradicted by the factual "action" of living and working in Potter County.

If you think this qualification criterium is not a serious matter, think back to the recent highly publicized indictment of U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison. The indictment of Senator Hutchison had to be redone because one of the twelve grand jurors who considered her case was disqualified by law from serving on a grand jury. As The Interstate Turns

On Monday, February 7th an Amarillo man was arrested on IH-40 1/2 mile east of Conway for Possession of Methamphetamine, DWI-Felony, Driving While License Suspended and Unpaid Amarillo Police Department tickets. The man was taken to the Carson County Sheriff's Office where he was booked into jail on his charges. Later that afternoon a search of a vehicle 1/2 mile east of Groom resulted in the seizure of a small amount of marijuana. After an interview of all adults involved, an Oklahoma City man was arrested for Possession of Marijuana Less Than Two Ounces. The man was taken to the Carson County Jail where he posted bond and was released. Sgt. Ray Davis of the Carson County Sheriff's Office assisted with both arrests.

On Tuesday, February 8th, two Indiana men were arrested on IH-40 one mile east of Groom for Possession of Marijuana Less Than Two Ounces by Trooper Tony Rocha of Perryton. Both men were transported to the Carson County Jail where they remained until they could post bond. Later that afternoon Trooper Gary Davis stopped a man from Wanba, Minnesota who was

under suspension in Texas. The man was issued a citation for Driving While License Suspended. The very next traffic stop Trooper Davis seized a 10 MM handgun from a Wilberton, Oklahoma man. Further investigation by Davis revealed that the man was a felon and not allowed to carry a firearm. Davis notified Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms who will do a follow up investigation to possible charges against the man.

On Sunday, February 13th, Trooper Gary Davis assisted Game Warden Winn Bishop with the arrest of a Groom resident and a Claude man for Unlawfully Carrying a Firearm after both subjects were found in possession of .22 pistols. Both subjects were transported to the Carson County Sheriff's Office until they could post bond.

Carson County Sheriff's Report

Eight persons are currently in custody in the Carson County Jail. Their charges include DWI, Involuntary Manslaughter, Violation of Parole, Forgery, Warrants (Corpus Christi) and various traffic-related offenses.

Our department is currently working with the Randall County Sheriff's Department, Potter County Sheriff's Department, Texas Southwestern Cattleman's Association Rangers and the Department of Public Safety Intelligence Division in an effort to locate suspects and property from a number of rural burglaries we've had lately.

One piece of equipment was recovered in Oldham County after the suspect attempted to sell the equipment in the presence of Oldham County Sheriff David Medlin. The suspect was arrested and incarcerated in Oldham County.

The sheriff's department is investigating a number of reports of vandalism to mail boxes, road signs and railroad equipment. We are looking forward to locating the suspects in these cases so that they can be duly recognized for their prowess with firearms while they are pursuing those vicious and dangerous inanimate objects. We at the Carson County Sheriff's Department understand that these mental giants are certainly humble to a fault in that they prefer to conduct their business under the cloak of darkness, but we also feel that a person who can successfully locate, stalk and shoot state and federal property in this manner deserves the attention of representatives from several law enforcement agencies.

A sheriff's deputy took one subject into custody who had intentionally consumed a large quantity of hard liquor. This subject had to be taken to the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center for emergency treatment for alcohol poisoning.

We are currently investigating a report of harassment in the Fritch area and a case of obscene telephone calls in White Deer.

Lee Tice and Becke Reynolds of the Carson County Sheriff's Department attended a meeting in Amarillo last Wednesday which dealt with the Crime Victim's Compensation Act and Crime Victim's Rights. The 73rd Legislature amended portions of the Code of Criminal Procedure to provide crime victims with the right to receive

information about AIDS and HIV testing and counseling. Lee Tice is the Carson County Sheriff's Department Crime Victim's liaison with the Crime Victim's office in Austin.

Food Store.

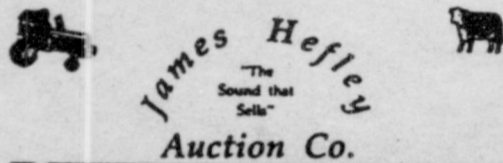
Ward Accepted To Pharmacy School At SOSU

Retired District Judge, John Forbis, was assigned to hear the cases. The cases were set to go to trial on January 3, 1994. However, on December 30, 1993, John T. Graveside services were in Austin Memorial Park in Austin. Arrangements were by Weed-Corley Funeral Home in Austin.

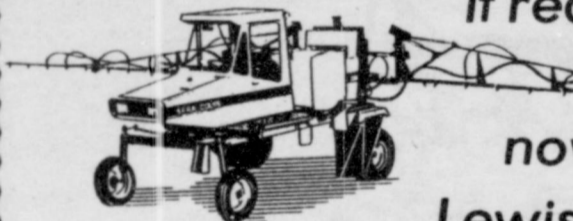
