Local Veterans Speak Out On Attacks

As I considered how to cover the terrible events of the past two weeks, I decided my thoughts weren't important, as my experience is limited, so I decided to find representatives of our Armed Forces to see what they thought.

John (Jake) Bible was

John (Jake) Bible was 21 years old on Dec. 7, 1941, the day the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. He enlisted in the Marines on Feb. 2, 1942, just two months later. He spoke with great pride of his time served and spoke with even greater pride when he told me of his five children who also served. He had two sons who served in Vietnam; one in the Marines and one in the Army. He also had three daughters who served; one in the Air Force and two in the Army. When I asked him

thought should do after the attack on our country, he said that the best thing we could do is go on with our daily lives. He pointed our that the more we allow this to affect our lives, the more power we give these terrorists. He said all that we can do for the dead is to remember and to never let it happen again. should WE retaliate, and is impatient He for the retaliation. we should have already begun to strike

Don Hauck served in Korea during the Victnam War. I asked him for his thoughts on the War on Terrorism. His first thought was of our young men. He was concerned for their safety. As a father, he said it was his biggest

Don said that we should back our President and said he was glad President Bush is not just bombing Afghanistan, but is taking his time to investigate in order to punish the right people. He doesn't want innocent people to die but realizes that may happen. He said you can't blow up a whole country looking for these guys. Don was especially concerned about what hard task it will be to fight this war. He believes that it will be much harder fighting an organization and group of people than it would be to fight a country. He also thinks we should back Israel and their struggle against terrorism.

Don said he also believes President Bush has done a good job with his speeches and believes Bush has said a lot of good things. He says he will be praying for the President, for the Country, and that God's will is done.
