## Warning Goes Out

To Unlicensed Drivers

Local Department of Public Safety Officer Greg Eatmon issues a warning to unlicensed drivers. Due to enormous amount of complaints levied by citizens of Groom concerning
underaged drivers, strict enforcement of the drivers licencing laws by the Carson County Sheriffs Department and local DPS Officers will be upheld from this point forward.
Penalties under the law include (a) Drivers under the age of 14 will be taken rate and held under juvenile laws until released to parent or guardian at which time parent and guardian will be cited for permitting a minor
to drive. A class $\mathbf{C}$ misdemeaner is punishable by a
$\$ 200.00$ fine. (b) Ages $14-15$ will be cited at the scene for not holding a valid drivers icense which is a class C misdemeaner which is punishable by a $\$ 200.00$ fine. (c) Violation of a drivers license restriction driving on a instruction permit with no licensed driver age 18 or above ) will result in automatic suspension of their permit and driver will nut be eligible for a drivers license until he or she is 18 years old.
Local law enforcement officers remind young drivers and parents that you are warned. These laws are for the driver and pedestria safety.

In order to teach the D.A.R.E. Course, a person has to be a licensed, certified police officer. Ms Britten, a native of Groom attended Texas Tech University and Amarillo College, and then enrolled in the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy graduating in May of 1988.
She was serving as assistant director of security at the Excel Corp. plant at Friona prior to accepting the county's D.A.R.E. assignment.
The program is designed for grades five and six, and has had many positive results in those schools in which it has been imple mented.

Teachers and principals report fewer in-classroom disciplinary problems, decreased absenteeism and
tardiness, and a higher respect for authority. Also, there has been a marked decrease in school vandal ism in may of the participat ing schools.
Ms. Britten's instruction also will focus on resisting peer pressure, building selfpeer pressure, suing stress esteem, riking drugs, alterwithout taking ugs, alter natives to drug taking a strand.
The classes will be 45 minutes in length, and wil be part of the school cur riculum. Various classes wil devote their class time to the D.A.R.E. project.

The project is to be funded through a joint effort of Parmer County, the City of Friona, and the school districts of Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie.

In addition, a grant for the program has been received from the Panhandle Region al Planning Commission (PRPC).

Plains Historical Museum's Research Center, a very special library and archive, are collections of books, manuscripts, interviews maps, photographs periodicals and much more. Researchers requiring historical documentation discover here a virtua treasure trove of information on the development of the Texas Panhandle and the Southwest from prehistoric times to the present. These times ohe prange in researchers range in age from grade school children levels of interest from class levels of interest from clas assignment to scholarly research. Inquiries come from the far corners of the globe, from Europe, Asia, Africa, (would you believe Zimbabwe?) and, of course, from all over the United States.
Of ever increasing public interest are the collections of photographs and film footage in the center. With the development of the videotape recording industry comes requests for early ranching and oil related scenes, from both still photographs and motion pictures. Centennial celebrations in the Panhandle, such as those in Potter, such as those in Potter, Randall, and Swisher Counties generated the need for early images, useful for reproduction in special hibits, county and church hibits, county and church histories and school projects. Copies of photo250,000 seled from over appeared as ilutrations appeared as imstrations others decorate the walls thers decorate the walis of Artists have secured Artists have secured work ing copies in order to achieve desired images for painting and illustrations.
Of great value to historic preservationists are early photographs of homes and buiding in the Panhandle found in the Guy \(A\). Carlander and John E. Hill Collections, for example.
