Warning Goes Out **To Unlicensed Drivers**

Community Calendar

Local Department of Public Safety Officer Greg Eatmon issues a warning to unlicensed drivers. Due to enormous amount of complaints levied by citizens of Groom concerning

underaged drivers, strict enforcement of the drivers licencing laws by the Carson **County Sheriffs Department** and local DPS Officers will be upheld from this point forward.

Penalties under the law include (a) Drivers under the age of 14 will be taken immediately before magistrate and held under juvenile laws until released to parent or guardian at which time parent and guardian will be cited for permitting a minor

to drive. A class C misdemeaner is punishable by a \$200.00 fine. (b) Ages 14-15 will be cited at the scene for not holding a valid drivers license which is a class C misdemeaner which is punishable by a \$200.00 fine. (c) Violation of a drivers license restriction (driving on a instruction permit with no licensed driver age 18 or above) will result in automatic suspension of their permit and driver will not be eligible for a drivers license until he or she is 18 years old.

Local law enforcement officers remind young drivers and parents that you are warned. These laws are for the driver and pedestrian safety.







County Commissioners Approved Resolution Carson County Commis-

sioners approved a resolution concerning the purchase of items of \$15,000 or less during their Monday, October 22, meeting. House Bill 1434 and House Bill 1671 add to and amend provision in Chapter 262 and

262.011 (a) of the local code. This gives the County authority to purchase items with a value of \$15,000 or less without entering into the bidding process other-wise required by law, if it is the best interest of the County.

Commissioners also gave permission for Precinct 3 to advertise for bids to purchase a motorgrader. Another resolution was approved concerning the purchase of products and services produced and offered by the blind and handicapped citizens of

Texas. The resolution says that Carson County is authorized to purchase from TIBH's published catalog when items meet County specifications and the price does not exceed current established prices.



54th Annual Convention of Dioscean Council

The 54th annual Convention of the Dioscean Council of Catholic Women met Oct. 19th and 20th at St. Vincent's Catholic School, Pampa. The theme "Someday Begins Today" was featured on a film showing some of the programs the National office is promoting to help the home bound, their caretakers, needy and handicapped persons, etc.

Alta Byars, keynote speaker, addressed the group on this same theme and reminded the audience, "Someday Is Today." She challenged, "Is your Christian label showing? Your Christianity shows when you do God's Will."

"Rainbows for all God's Children" was the workshop presented by Belinda Roberts. This workshop covered the grieving process involved in the separation of a loved one through death or divorce from a child's point of view. The film on this workshop can be obtained from the dioscean president. Clementine Penner,

Clementine Penner, Spearman, was awarded the distinction of "Woman of the Year" with a plaque at the Friday evening Mass. Afterwards a buffet/reception was held in her honor and Gerardo Andreu spoke on "The Price of Freedom." Andreu, a native Cuban came to Miami in 1961 on a freedom flight. He came to Amarillo and joined McCurdy Hull Inc. as a delivery clerk and is now president and chief operating officer of this company. He feels strongly about the opportunities and freedoms in this country and casually taken for granted. Karen Britten has been employed as a sheriff's deputy for Parmer County, and will be the instructor for Project D.A.R.E. in Parmer County schools.


The program emphasis for Project D.A.R.E. is to help students recognize and resist the many subtle pressures that influence them to experiment with alcohol and drugs. In addition, program strategies are planned to focus on feelings relating to self-esteem, interpersonal and communicative skills, decision making, and positive alterntardiness, and a higher respect for authority. Also, there has been a marked decrease in school vandalism in may of the participating schools.

Ms. Britten's instruction also will focus on resisting peer pressure, building selfesteem, managing stress without taking drugs, alternatives to drug abuse, and taking a strand.

The classes will be 45 minutes in length, and will be part of the school curriculum. Various classes will devote their class time to the D.A.R.E. project.

The project is to be funded through a joint effort of Parmer County, the City of Friona, and the school districts of Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie.

In addition, a grant for the program has been received from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC).

The man then pulled out a one hundred dollar bill and said "This is the smallest I have I don't guess you can change it can you." Well one hundred dollars, in any form, was a lot of money back then but I turned around and went back where dad was in the back room and showed him the bill and ask what to do. Dad said he could change it but it would take all he had. Why didn't I run up to the bank two blocks away, and see if Clifford (Clifford Allison) would let me in and change it for me.

When I came out and started out the door the man said "Where are you going with my money, if you cannot change it give it back and I will go on.

I told him I was going to the bank to get some change. Well the man

almost had a fit. He said "It's after three and all the banks are closed." About that time dad came out and told him that the banker knew me and would let me in. The man started trying to say maybe he did have something a little smaller but dad said go on. I ran to the bank and sure enough Clifford was still there and let me in.

When I told what had happened he gave one hundred, one dollar bills. When I got back to the station and counted the man ninety-eight one dollar bills, I thought he was going to have a heart attach he was so mad.







A Treasure Trove Of Information By Claire Kuehn, Archivist/Librarian Housed in the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's Research Center, a very special library and archive. are collections of books, manuscripts, interviews, maps, photographs, periodicals and much more. Researchers requiring historical documentation discover here a virtual treasure trove of information on the development of the Texas Panhandle and the Southwest from prehistoric

times to the present. These researchers range in age from grade school children to senior citizens and in levels of interest from class assignment to scholarly research. Inquiries come from the far corners of the globe, from Europe, Asia, Africa, (would you believe Zimbabwe?) and, of course, from all over the United States.

Of ever increasing public interest are the collections of photographs and film footage in the center. With the development of the videotape recording industry comes requests for early ranching and oil related scenes, from both still photographs and motion pictures. Centennial celebrations in the Panhandle, such as those in Potter, Randall, and Swisher Counties generated the need for early images, useful for reproduction in special editions of newspapers, exhibits, county and church histories and school projects. Copies of photographs, selected from over 250,000 on file, have appeared as illustrations in books and magazine articles, others decorate the walls of homes and businesses. Artists have secured working copies in order to achieve desired images for painting and illustrations.

Of great value to historic preservationists are early photographs of homes and buiding in the Panhandle found in the Guy A. Carlander and John E. Hill Collections, for example. These are, at times, supplemented by holding of architectural drawings in the Carlander and E.F. Rittenberry collections.

The center is currently seeking photographs of people and places along old U.S. Route 66 in the Texas Panhandle for a proposed museum exhibit in 1991. Anyone having photos along the route from the late 1920's through the early 1960's is encouraged to call (806) 656-2261 or write to the Research Center, Panandle Plains Historical Museum, Box 967, W.T. Station, Canyon, Tx. 79016. Needed are scenes from Shamrock, McLean, Alanreed, Groom, Conway, Bushland, Wildorado, Vega, and Adrian. Amarillo is wellrepresented in the archive, however, there may still be photos in private hands that would be invaluable in the interpretation of "America's Main Street" through the Panhandle. If the owners of the photos are unwilling to part with them, the center would like to borrow them and have copies made.
