## Reluctant School

## Board Prohibits Prayer At Games

McLean Independent School District Board of Education sfter much discussion, voted to allow a moment of silence before football games if requested by a student. Traditionally a prayer was offered either by a student or clergyman.

In February, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals held that a district policy allowing invbcations or benedictions at high benedictions at high Establishment Clause of the U.S. Constitution. that a school district violates this clause if it villows someone to recite allows someone to recite prayer over the loudspeaker at a football game. It does not matter whether the person leading the prayer is a school district employee, a member of the clergy, or a student. Because the Fifth Circuit Court has jurisdiction over Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi, this decision is binding on all Texas school districts. Although the decision has been appeaied to the U.S. Supreme Court, all school districts must comply with the ruling unless the Supreme Court rules otherwise.

The consequences ot disregarding the court' order could be very serious.
School districts' that continue to allow schoolsponsored prayer at football games are taking significant legal risks. If successful, person challenging the practice could recover injunctive could recover injunctive relief, monetary damages, court costs, and attorneys fees from the district. Individual trustees and shool district employees could face similar practice-immunity would pot be available.
Other options: individual prayer or a moment of silence.
Students may pray on heir own (individually or in groups) at football games - as long as they aren't leading the entire crowd in prayer and as ong as school district ong as school involved. A moment of silence the start of each same may be permissible however, it should be for purposes such as student safety and good sportsmanship and not for religious purposes.
