# **Reluctant School Board Prohibits Prayer At Games**

McLean Independent School District Board of Education after much discussion, voted to allow Education of silence moment before football games if requested by a student. Traditionally a prayer was offered either by a student or clearway

was offered either by a student or clergyman. In February, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals held that a district policy allowing invocations or benedictions at high school games violated the Establishment Clause of Establishment Clause of be U.S. Constitution. The court made it clear that a school district violates this clause if it violates this clause if it allows someone to recite a prayer over the loudspeaker at a football game. It does not matter whether the person leading the prayer is a school district employee, a member of the clergy, a student. Because Fifth Circuit Court the jurisdiction over Louisiana, and Texas. Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi, this decision is binding on all Texas school districts. Although the decision has been appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, all school upreme Court, all school districts must comply with the ruling unless the districts Supreme otherwise. Court rules

The consequences of disregarding the court's order could be very serious.

School districts' that sonool districts that continue to allow school-sponsored prayer at football games are taking significant legal risks. If successful, a person challenging the practice could recover injunctive could recover injunction relief, monetary damages, court costs, and attorneys fees from the district fees from the district. Individual trustees and school district employees school district employees could face similar penatics for allowing the practice-immunity would not be available. Other options: individual prayer or a moment of silence. Students may pray on their own (individually or in groups) at football cames - as long as they

their own (individually or in groups) at football games - as long as they crowd in prayer and as long as school district employees aren't involved. A moment of silence at the start of each game may be permissible.


