Groom, trailing McLean 117-105, had to finish at least three places ahead of McLean to tie for fast. But with Silverton out of the race, the 1600 relay field was reduced to three teams and McLean's victory was assured.

In the end, Groom clocked a 3:41.74 to win the relay, but still lost the war. Mc ean was second in 3:44.66, good enough to win the boys' title with 133



are acting in their behalf. I have not heard any comments of people "feeling as if they live in a Russian Community". Anyone who does should approach their council or attend meetings and make their feelings known.

We do not have five lawmen. The City has one part-time law officer, then we have two county law officers and two State officers all of which we are fortunate that they happen to live here. The City Judge is an appointed position and receives no salary, the J.P. is an elected position and is

paid by the county. All of the above (law officers and judges) must attend school and complete the required hours in order to maintain their positions. There are some situations that the two entities have the same jurisdiction, but there are other situations that only that one entity has jurisdiction over. Therefore, all entities are necessary. When you are dealing with people you know well, some who are your friends, two heads can be better than one simply because of human nature.

This is a time for progress, not stagnation. are facing in the right direction now and we need to sontinue on that path. I happen to think a woman mayor just may be what we need right now. Without a progressive attitude shown in a community making progress is like walking through a maze blindfolded.

I encourage every one to vote but think about what you really want for the future of your community; a down hill slide like what has brought us to where we are now or an uphill climb that we are on the path to. This decision not only applies to the mayors position but is very important for the council members. Don't base your decision on friendship or length of time as resident or what someones father was


