Local Voters To Elect City, School Officials Saturday, May 7

Groom voters will be going to the polls on Saturday to elect three aldermen for the City Council and two trustees for the Groom School Board.

The City election will be of little interest as incumbents Jimmy Britten, John Eschle and Bill Homer all filed to serve another term on the council. All run unopposed in the election.

In the school board race there will be three persons vieing for two open posi-tions. Incumbents Don Lyles and Pat Weinheimer are being challenged by Gary Friemel.

Don Lyles is seeking his third term on the board of education.

"I'm interested in the kids getting a good education, and in these hard times this is hard to come by," said

Lyles.
"I have always tried to be fair in my decisions and my decision has sometimes been swayed by the laws that effect education."

Lyles added he feels it is important that a board work together to make good deci-

He is employed at Mason and Hanger as a quality engineer. Lyles holds a B.S. degree from West Texas State University. He and his wife Mary Sue have three daughters, Julie, Aimee and Darcee

Pat Weinheimer currently serves as president of the board. He has served on the board nine years and sees himself very involved in education in the community with two sons graduated from Groom High School now in college, Pat at West Texas State University and Tim at Texas Tech. His children, Matt, 17, Ben, 15, Luke, 11 and Jarret, 9 are all students at Groom Schools and Paul, 3, will graduate in 2002.

"I am involved in every level of education, and will continue to work for high instructional quality programs as well as working toward establishing sound business and fiscal practices for the district.

Weinheimer added that not all decisions he has made as a board member have been easy. "I join the board and do not attempt to operate as an individual."

He and his wife Maggie have made their home in Groom and are involved in farming operations.

Gary Friemel is also a farmer and rancher. He and wife July have two children, Melanie and Jessica, both students at Groom Schools.

Friemel says he would like to see cooperation among board members to achieve a good education for students at Groom School.

"I am committed to coordinating work of the board, teaching administration, staff and students to achieve academic success in our school system."

He also would like to be as fair as possible and would welcome views and opinions from those interested in the educational system in Groom to help in making sound decisions as a board member.

Voters have their chance to voice their opinion on Saturday, May 7. The election will be conducted at the School from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. in both the City and School election.

Joyce Hutsell, business nanager at the school, reported that six absentee ballots had been cast along with three mail in votes. This is a smaller number of absentees which usually average about 15 votes.

Brothers Arrested West Of Groom On Aggravated Robbery Charges

Two brothers were being held in the Wheeler County Jail Monday on bonds of \$25,000 each. The two were arrested in connection with aggravated robbery which occured earlier Monday at the roadside rest area east of McLean.

Lee Otha Chavis of Los Angeles, Ca. and Anthony O'Neil Pommer of Norfolk, Va. were arrested west of Groom by DPS officer Gary Davis.

Davis spotted the suspects vehicle traveling west on I-40 about 4:40 p.m. Monday. In the car, Davis, found two sawed-off shotguns, and the victim's keys were in a blue bag along with one of the shotguns. Davis was assisted by officer Kevin King of Shamrock who was enroute back the Shamrock from Amarillo.

The two were later identified by the victim, Jerry Wayne Cloud of California. He told police he was in the restroom at the rest area when two men approached him and robbed him of money and credit cards. Cloud told authorities he was threatened with a shotgun, but never saw the

weapon. Cloud was bound with duct tape and left unharmed in the bathroom.

A witness, Charles Bear of California, entered the bathroom as the robbery was taking place. He told police he was ordered to get against the wall but was not injured or robbed.

Davis said both have previous arrest records and will be charged in Carson County with possession of prohibitive weapons. The pair had bond set by Justice of the Peace Max Wade before being taken to the Wheeler County Jail.
