Texan Hotel celebrates it 80th birthday this year. An advertisement in an April 1926 Panhandle Herald announces "Hotel Downs, now open to the public with new furnishings, 32 rooms, strictly modern, hot and cold running water with/without bath"

Today, the little hotel is still open and advertising six completely furnished apartments, 5 B&B rooms, some original furnishing and a "touch of the past".

From her beginnings in 1926, through depression, wars, the dust bowl, drought, violent storms and eternal (infernal) wind, hosting a myriad of guests, including teachers, travelers, cowboys, Indians, families, artists, authors, and of course, for spice a sprinkling of scoundrels and rogues. There have been weddings, deaths, birthday parties for children, and on a lighter not, even an all-night poker party in the lobby, during a blizzard where the proprietor's relatives kept their refreshments outside the front door to keep it


handy and cool. C.B. and Margaret Downs built the hotel in 1926. In 1932, it passed from the Reconstruction Finance corporation to J.H. Paul (operated by Mr. and Mrs. Jim McCaskey).



Samuel K. Lanning purchased the hotel in 1942. It was briefly owned by O.Z. Light from 1956 until 1965, when ownership returned to Lanning. In 1974, the hotel was sold to Clarence and Betty Luby Rhynehart. Clarence died in1989 and the hotel is now owned and operated by Betty.

The one thing common to the owners was the TLC the hotel received. Today she is like her doting caretaker - slightly dowdy, a bit haughty and proud, treasuring memories and looking forward to further adventures.

A reception in her honor will be hosted by Betty and friends on Sunday, October 29th, 2:00 - 4:00 p.m. All are invited to view the hotel and seminisce a bit at 117 E. Brostway in Pathandle.
