



Last week we talked about setting goals when we invest. In determining our investment goal-safety, income or growth, it's vital to consider our own personality and temperament. Are we self-assured, comfortable in making our own decisions, or are we prone to be swayed by the opinion of

So, you can see the one who's pessimistic might be uncomfortable with an aggressive growth stock which makes radical moves up and down. #### **GTE Offers Service To Groom Telephone Customers**

Telephone General Company of the Southwest's Memphis Operations Memphis Operations
Manager, Jerry West, announced that an optional touch-call change out will be offered to Groom customers in conjunction with the November 8 conver-sion of the Groom switching center from electro-mechanical to electronic switching. The offering will be made to Groom custombe made to Groom Custom-ers from Friday, Decem-ber 5, 1986, through April 10, 1987. During this time period, the usual one-time handling fee will be waived.

The optional change-out is being offered to single line residential and single line business customers with leased equipment who wish to exchange their present rotary dial equipment for dial equipment. Customers who wish to provide their own equipment with nonleased equipment may also choose to change at this time, at no charge. The equipment exchange is on a voluntary basis, and any customer who wishes to continue with their current ro-

tary equipment may do so.

Customers interested in participating in the changeout may call the Memphis Business office, (806) 259-3521, for rate informa tion. Depending on the style of equipment to customer selects, the monthly customer rental fee may

vary. Regulated customers (those customers who have not changed any of their services since January 1, 1982) who turn in their equipment will change auto-matically to the deregulated rate base, since all regu-lated stocks have been depleted. Deregulated cus-tomers see a slightly higher monthly rental charge. Durmonthly rental charge. During the special period between December 5, 1986, through April 10, 1987, the usual handling fee of \$8.00 for residential customers or \$13.50 for business customers for the exchange will be

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

#### **USDA Releases Soil List**

A list of highly erodible and potentially highly erodi-ble soils was released re-cently by the USDA Soil Conservation Service as mandated by the Food Security Act of 1985.

The list revealed that nearly 66 percent of the land in Gray County is highly erodible and 4 percent is potentially highly erodible.

The conservation corroli

potentially highly erodible.

The conservation compliance provisions of the Act denies most USDA farm program benefits to farmers who farm highly erodible land unless the land is being farmed in accordance with a conservation plan approved by the local conservation district.

The Act allows a grace The Act allows a grace period for those who are not using a conservation plan. They have until January 1, 1990 to develop and begin actively applying a plan. They have until January 1, 1995 to have the plan fully in

effect.

The provisions will have no effect on farmers who are no effect on farmers who are using up-to-date conserva-tion plans. If you are farming highly erodible land with a Conservation plan. Check with your local Soil Conservation Service office to find out if it meets conservation compliance provisions.

Onsite field visits will be Onsite field visits will be needed on land classified as potentially highly erodible to determine if it is highly erodible. Actual steepness of slope and length of slope will affect final determinations. If the land is not highly erodible, a conservation plan will not be required to continue receiving farm to continue receiving farm program benefits; however, all farms will be subject to a soil type certification.

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



wise be unlawful for any person to wear, carry or display any emblem, insignator any other means of identification as member of the Emergency Management organization of the City of Groom, unless authority to do so has been granted to such person by the proper officials. Coavictions for violations of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine not to exceed 1,000.00 dollars.

#### **Commodities Worth Varied**

With the current stockpile of agricultural commodities in the U.S. and this nation's capacity for excess production, market development plays a key role in maintaining market share in expanding commodity demand.

ing market share in expanding commodity demand.

"This is particularly true for commodities that depend heavily on the export market, such as wheat, rice, feedgrains and cotton," points out Dr. Roland Smith, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University. "Therefore, it's important to build a favorable reputation by consistently supplying quality products."

The export embargoes in

the past certainly have hurt this nation's position as a consistent supplier, says the economist.

Foreign market development activities vary, depending upon the acceptance of the commodity in that country, says Smith. Activities may include market analysis, information for decisionmakers, technical information, educational programs and point-of-sale programs and point-of-sale

romotion.

"For example, through the use of demonstrated milling and baking practices Japanese consumers developed expanded demand for wheat flour products over time," notes Smith. "Now,

wheat is used extensively in Japan--even to make buns for its own McDonald's hamburgers. Market development is most successful when it is geared to specific countries and situations."

Market development is an important tool to improve competitiveness of Texas agriculture, adds the economist. However, it takes time and money. The tradition of tastes and preferences in a country overseas cannot be changed quickly. Persistent presence is required to make changes in these habits.

Conducting market development activities is, for the most part, a joint venture of producers, marketing firms and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Many producer groups have approved check-off programs to support market development activities for both domestic and foreign markets.

"In the past, farmers generally have considered only their production costs," Smith points out. "Now, more are recognizing that without a market, production is unsuccessful. Supporting market development activities as groups of producers is the only feasible way to have market impact."

## Farm Bill Fails Farmers & Cost Government A Bundle

The 1985 farm bill may be on thin ice because it's failed to solve the problem of low farm income while costing the government a bundle (cost could approach \$30 billion).

While one year may not provide a true test of several new concepts in the bill, such as the marketing loan, there may well be a strong push to enact a 1987 farm bill early next year.

Some changes would amount to little more than mid-term adjustments, but others would constitute major changes in policy direction, point out economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Ron Knutson and Dr. Ed Smith describe some of the major proposals for a possible '87 farm bill.

possible '87 farm bill.
Government cost could
be reduced by targeting program benefits to farmers
having the greatest financial
need. Targeting benefits on
the basis of need has never
been a feature of farm
programs. Instead, benefits

such as target prices have been allocated on the basis of production. Attempts to limit payments have not been successful. Most other government social programs, such as food stamps and social security, operate with specific eligibility criteria. Such criteria would have to be developed for farm programs as would farm program objectives.

An effort could be made to reduce commodity stocks with mandatory farm production controls as proposed in the so-called Harkin bill. Based on farmers' past production, mandatory controls would be installed if, for example, a majority of the farmers voted for them. The recent wheat poll reflected favorable on mandatory controls and brought renewed interest in the issue. In Texas 75 percent of the voting wheat farmers favored mandatory controls. Mandatory controls would raise domestic prices while exports would decline as U.S. prices moved above

world market levels. Farm program costs would fall and consumers would pay higher food and fiber prices. Milk and sugar would be likely commodities for experimental mandatory controls. A decisive effort could

A decisive effort could be made to reduce commodity stocks by making prices more competitive in exports markets. Rice and cotton exports were expanded through the marketing loan which allowed market prices to fall to world levels. Such an initiative could be extended to wheat and feed grains. This would also mean higher government costs.

The most direct means of dealing with high government costs would be a reduction in target prices. Lower government expenditures, however, would come at the expense of reduced farm income, the major issue at hand.

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
