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community's feelings. And even what majority it would take to have McLaughlin change his mind on the issue. Britten made reference several times to the number of phone calls he received compared to the signatures on the petition but declined to give the exact number he had received when questioned from the audience.

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Items compared in the two codes were no mention of belts or socks for boys in the proposed code and sun-

dresses for girls. Also hair length was to be "above the eyes" in the new code not "1" above the eyebrows."

A motion to table the item died for lack of a second and Bud Fields moved to work out the code. The final motion was to keep the policy as it is and delete belts from the boys section. The motion passed with Don Lyles, Bud Fields, Louis Ruthardt and Bill England voting for and Denny Babcock, Hop Britten and Pat Weinheimer voting against.

The board decided to replace the filter for the swimming pool of \$4,000. The filter will take six weeks to arrive necessitating the pool be drained at a cost of \$700. The measure was approved with money budgeted in capital improvements to fund the purchase. Hop Britten voted against the measure.

Zeldon Jenkins was pre-

sent to discuss a proposal to purchase microscopes with some old ones as trade-in. Mr. Peebles stated that the science equipment had been designated by the TEA as needing immediate attention to update the facilities in the last inspection for accreditation. New microscopes comparable to the four to be purchased cost \$950. Jenkins asked for an additional \$500 to trade in four microscopes and purchase four. Bill England moved to trade in two old microscopes and purchase as many as possible and still stay within the \$1000 allotted the program. The motion was approved with Bud Fields and Don Lyles opposed to the measure.

The board also turned down the proposed telecommunication system offered by the Texas Education Agency. Peebles said the move to connect school computers with TEA computers via the telephone will soon be mandated. Denny Babcock said, "Since the system offers no real advantage to our school, we should hold off" for now. The \$1,000 plus system would require addi-

tional costs of \$300 for a special phone line and an average of \$740 annually for timed telephone use and \$300 for a modem. The vote was unanimous.

## 300 Spectators

### View Rodeo

The McLean High School Rodeo, held on Saturday, was a big success according to Mrs. Bill Eads, one of its sponsors. Despite the gloomy, soggy weather almost 300 spectators attended.

There were 137 contestants from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico and they participated in 269 runs.

Events for boys included bareback riding, bull riding, calf roping, ribbon roping and team roping. Girls events were barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying and breakaway roping.

Local boys who competed were Pat Gomez, who took part in the calf roping, ribbon roping and team roping and Willie Cross who was in the bull riding contest. He was injured when the bull he was riding stepped on him. He suffered some severe bruises but fortunately nothing was broken.

Girl Entries were Kim Beaver, who competed in barrel racing and pole racing and Sally Worsham and Cindy Coleman who took part in the barrel racing.

All proceeds from the rodeo will be used to help the top 15 finalists in each event attend the finals in Amarillo in June.

## DPS Involved In Chase

Last Friday turned out to be a much more exciting day than DPS Officer John Holland and Constable Jim McDonald were expecting. That morning, they received a call that law officers from Wheeler and Gray Counties were in pursuit of a vehicle whose driver had stolen gasoline in Shamrock. Upon further investigation, it was also learned that the vehicle was stolen.

When the suspect, Todd Townsend of Missouri, reached McLean Holland and McDonald took up the chase going west on I-40. Holland was able to follow him as he exited at the Lake McClellan off-ramp going north. At one point, Holland caught up to him and observed him reaching down into the seat of his truck for what later turned out to be a gun. Upon seeing Holland catching up

to him, he deliberately rammmed the officer's vehicle, doing considerable

damage to the body and wheels.

After being hit, Holland got out of his car and the suspect attempted to run over him. He then went up the road a short distance and stopped. He fumbled again for his gun and then decided to leave the scene.

With Holland's car out of commission, the chase was taken up by other DPS and Sheriff's Department per-

sonnel, led by Sgt. Jim Powell of Pampa. The suspect was finally cornered in a field about five miles south of Kingsmill where he threatened to commit suicide. He was talked out of the attempt by Game Warden Buck Williams.

After being taken to Pampa, he was charged

with aggravated assault with a vehicle, auto theft and theft of gasoline. It was later learned that he had been pending trial for auto theft and was due for psychiatric examination when he escaped.

Talking about the day's events Holland said, "We owe a lot of thanks to McLean dispatcher Charles Milam. He constantly maintained contact with us and handled himself in a very professional manner. It was real helpful just knowing he was there when we needed him."

## McLean Band Receives Superior Rating At Contest

For the first time in over 20 years, the McLean Tiger band has received a Division I or "Superior" rating in a UIL marching contest. The competition was held on Saturday in Borger and involved 38 bands ranging from Class A to 5A.

The Tigers performed their usual halftime show which included performances of "Montero", featuring a trumpet duet by Dollie Haynes and Tiffany Lopez; a medley of "Dynamite for Drums" and "Go for It", in which each section of the band has a solo performance; and "Brian's Song", with a trumpet solo by James Wall and a Baritone solo by Ronnie Tidwell.

In the competition, the Booker and Sunray bands were chosen to go to the

regional contest while McLean was chosen as the alternate. In the event that one of the winners is not able to participate, the Tiger band will go to the regionals.

There was also a twirling contest. Tigers Cindy Hembree and Kim Wiginton earned a Division II or "Excellent" rating.

Music Director Roger Myers said the kids deserve a lot of credit for the accomplishment. According to Myers, "The kids not only worked hard during practice, they also got together on their own to work. They were determined to do a good job and they just got out and did it."

The regional competition will be held in Wichita Falls on October 31.

## McLean Sales Rebate Down

The State Comptroller's office recently sent checks totaling \$55.4 million in local sales tax to the 1,033 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax. Payments to date for 1986 were down .6 percent as compared to the payments to date in October of last year.

The October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

The payment to the City of McLean for this period was \$1,135.19, down from the \$1,408.60 sent during a comparable period in 1985.

Payments for 1986 total \$15,987.56, down from the \$16,163.24 sent to date last year. This represents a loss of 1.09 percent.

For all of Gray County, payments are down 10.10 percent for the year. Lefors suffered the biggest loss,

down 30.94 percent, while Pampa dropped 10.34 percent in sales tax revenues, compared to payments to date for last year.

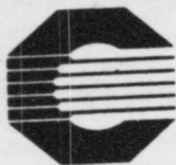
The Comptroller's office said the decrease in checks is a continuing reflection of the downturn in the Texas economy.

The main item on the agenda was a discussion of the policies for the Gifted and Talented Program. According to the policies, gifted children are defined as "children who excel markedly in ability to think, reason, judge, invent or create, and who need special facilities and/or educational services in order to assist them to achieve more nearly their potential, for themselves and for the

increased contributions they make to the community, state and nation."

The program would apply to students in grades K-6. Up to 5 percent of the kids in these grades would be permitted two hours per week to meet in special classes whose purpose is to supplement the things they learn in the regular curriculum.

Nominations for entry into the program could come from teachers, principals, counselors, parents and students themselves. Acceptance would be based on results from test grades, special testing, judgement of school officials and other documentation.

After reviewing the policies, the board approved them unanimously.

In other business, the board:

-Reviewed the collection of taxes, which, according to Business Manager Shirley Johnson, is about \$5,000 behind last year's level of collections.

-Approved an amendment altering the budget to reflect the adoption of a tax rate of \$1.00 per \$100 of valuation.

-Heard a presentation from Mr. Rutherford concerning a compliance visit by State officials. Apparently only 3 minor examples of non-compliance with state regulations were found. These have been corrected.

The next meeting of the board will be November 10 at 5:00 p.m.

## Personalized License Plate Fees Decrease

Want to go out 4 FUN sometime? Well, IM POOR, you see, I O DAD. Besides IM BUSY. But if you GO 4th in your TOY TRK, don't do it while you're TIP-Z.

Those are a few of the messages some 56,000 Texas motorists have invented for personalizing their license plates.

Beginning January 1, 1987, it will cost \$35.00 less to tell other motorists you have NO WIFE, or you're SINGLE. The annual fee for personalized license plates will drop from \$75.00 to \$40.00.

The reduction was approved during the recent special session of the state legislature in an effort to attract some of the nearly 100,000 motorists who cancelled their special plates after the fee was raised from \$25.00 to \$75.00 during the 1985 regular session.

"There were about 154,000 personalized plates registered in the state before the fee was increased," said Dian Neill, director of the Division of Motor Vehicles with the highway department. "Obviously we're not serving all Texans who want such plates. We hope the fee reduction will help us serve them better as well as regenerate the lost dollars to the state."

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation receives \$1.25 from the sale of each special plate, Neill said. The remainder of the revenue goes into the state's general funds.

Personalized plates were first offered in Texas in 1965. More than 5,000 were issued the first year. Names, phrases and words relating to the driver's alma mater are among the more popular choices in individualized plates.

"Personalized plates are fun for both the vehicle's owner and for other motorists," Neill said.

Up to six letters and two spaces can be used in personalizing a license plate, she said. Requests are screened to see that they don't duplicate an existing

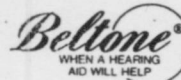

**Ag Dept. Public Hearing on Farm Bill**

Public comments on provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act, commonly referred to as the Farm Bill, will be accepted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture until October 25, 1986.

The Act affects farmers if they produce crops on highly erodible land without following an approved conservation plan or if they produce crops on converted wetlands.

The provisions, widely known as "Sodbuster," "Conservation Compliance," and "Swampbuster," deny many USDA farm program benefits under certain conditions.

Sodbuster applies to highly erodible land broken out of grassland or woodland and cultivated for crop production after December 23, 1985.

Conservation compliance, another part of the highly erodible land provision, applies to land that was planted to a crop at least one year during the years 1981-1985.

Sodbuster and Conservation Compliance require farmers who request as required for the pole vault pit at a cost of \$550;

certain USDA farm program benefits, and who are farming highly erodible land, to plan conservation plans approved by local conservation districts.

There is, however, a grace period for the Conservation Compliance provision. Farmers not using a conservation plan have until January 1, 1990, to develop and begin applying an approved plan. They have until January 1, 1995, to have all provisions of the plan in effect.

The other provisions, Swampbuster, does not allow farmers to convert wetlands to croplands and remain eligible for USDA benefits regardless of whether or not they have an approved conservation plan.

The public comment period on the interim rules of the provisions will last until October 25, 1986. Comments should be addressed to Director Cotton, Grain and Rice, Price Support Division, ASCS-USDA, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013, and they must be received by October 27 to be considered.

Additional information can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Farmers Home Administration, or the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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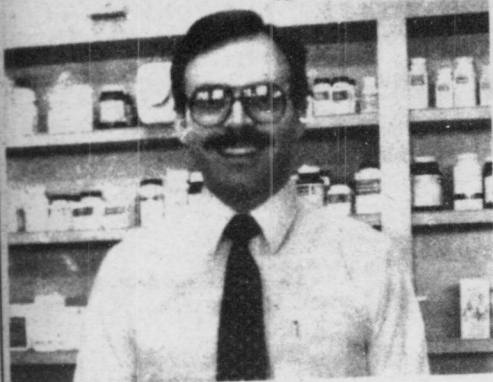
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### Groom City Council Chooses Computer and Software for Accounts

Groom City Council made their choice for a computer and software for operations of accounting procedures at the city during their regular meeting on Oct. 7. The system will be purchased from Municipal Data Systems at a total cost of \$5,000. Initial expenditures will be \$1,900 for the computer; \$2,500 for software and \$599 for a printer.

The Ambulance Service asked that workmen's comp and medicare payments for insurance benefits be extended to cover volunteer drivers. Brent Stephens stated that the coverage is already provided firemen and with a few additions could also cover all ambulance drivers. The council elected to decide what to pay as the need arises.

The City agreed to pay the cost of materials needed for construction of a ramp at the hospital building. The labor will be provided by the FFA boys who volunteered their services. A guard rail will also be installed and a handicapped parking space will be painted at the facility by the ag boys.

New water right possibilities were discussed by the council. Member Bill Homer informed the council on the state requirement concerning the need to acquire tracts of 160 acres or more to drill a well of 8 inches. Mayor Homer was appointed to seek an agreement with Chris Britten or Louis Ruthardt to sell rights to the city for future water needs.

Ordinance number 145 was approved as read. This ordinance allows retirement payments for city employees be figured on salaries paid during the last three years of employment.

Also discussed was the feasibility of a slogan contest for placement on billboards to attract travelers to Groom. It was decided to contact State Highway Dept. officials first to determine requirements that must be met in placing signs along I-40.

In other action, bids were solicited for repair to city streets. A special meeting was called for Wednesday night to determine what action to take.

In other action drainage problems in front of Red Latta's house were discussed and a dispute over utility charges at the J.P.'s office were discussed with the city to make all charges for utilities to the JP.

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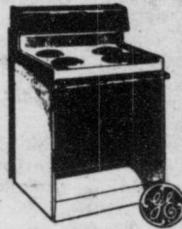
