Motion by Billy Bybee, second by David Fuller for Mr. Sraith to purchase a new bis to be used on a route and for activities. Motion carried. Blue Bird had placed a bid for $\$ 37,745.00$ and Mid-Bus had a bid of $\$ 37,280.00$ which included rear air
