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



Carson County Sheriff's Report

By Loren Brand, Sheriff Like many neighboring sheriff's departments, we have had an ever-increasing workload with cases of violent behavior and contact with persons who have a lengthy criminal history. I've written before to caution residents against having contact with these transients who solicit rices and money along Interstate 40 and U.S. 60. Our contacts with these transients have been increasing by quite a We check into the criminal background of these people whenever we have contact with them and we've found a large number of persons who have been previously convicted of homicides, sexual assaults and other violent acts. If a stranger comes to your door, call our department and we'll send someone out to check on them. Don't risk your safety and that of your family.

Our department was contacted by the Amarillo Department of Public Safety with a report of a vehicle travelling west on U.S. 60 from White Deer. Several witnesses had seen the passenger of the car firing a handgun out the window. A Carson County Sheriff's Department officer was just returning from Amarillo after taking a transient to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center for mental evaluation and he encountered the suspect vehicle at the east city limits of Amarillo. The vehicle contained four suspects and was followed into the north Amarillo area until additional officers from the Amarillo Police Department arrived to assist in checking the vehicle. One handgun was found and charges are pending against the shooter. All four suspects were on parole. The driver was taken into custody on outstanding warrants.

Our deputies responded to several calls of domestic violence this week. In one case, a subject was arrested

who had been previously indicted for Aggravated Assault and who was in violation of a protective

The Sheriff's Department is assisting the San Antonio Police Department with an investigation alleging parental kidnapping. Our officers assisted the Panhandle Police Department with a report of an open door at a residence where the owners were on vacation and at a local convenience store where two out-of-town subjects had been causing a disturbance.

We responded to a report of persons stealing the contents from a disabled vehicle parked along U.S. 60 and a disturbance in Conway where a person was refusing to pay for food or services at a local business.

Our officers recovered several items of stolen merchandise from a local business and investigated a burglary of a residence in Fritch. We are currently investigating the misappropriation of funds an employee at a business place in the county. Also included in this investigation are several hundred dollars worth of telephone calls made by the employee to a "phone sex" number.

Carson County deputies arrested a man wanted by Louisiana authorities. We are holding this subject until he can be picked up and returned to Louisiana to face charges.

Sheriff's Department called
for our assistance to deal
with a hostage situation
involving a man with a
shotgun. The subject was
taken into custody and
jailed in Armstrong County,
but later started a fire in
the jail. Our officers
assisted Armstrong County
in the matter. The suspect
was taken to Amarillo for,
treatment of smoke

Our officers assisted the Texas Highway Patrol and the White Deer City

Marshal at the scene of a one vehicle rollover west of White Deer. The White Deer EMS took one person to the hospital.

Carson County deputies also assisted the Texas Highway Patrol at the scene of a two vehicle traffic accident on Interstate 40. Medivac 1 was called to fly one victim from the scene to Amarillo.

We assisted with a one vehicle rollover near Skellytown where one person was taken to an area hospital for treatment of a head injury.

Our officers investigated a report of a vehicle trespassing on federal property near the Pantex Plant.

We are investigating reports of gypsy contractors who are contacting local residents for "low cost" blacktopping and roofing. The "low cost" claim has been investigated and found to be an accurate description because there has been absolutely "no cost" to the suspects. They have no materials and no intention of completing the project other than making sure your checks clear the








Handbook Final Authority For School Policies And Procedures

McLean High School and Junior High students received an updated copy of the McLean ISD student handbook last week, according to Rick Reeser, principal. The 36-page handbook contains the latest version of rules and regulations governing the school.

"We hope parents will go through the handbook with their students to be sure each understands the policies that we operate under," Reeser said.

The handbook details information about attendance, discipline, fundraising, graduation requirements, student complaints, code of conduct and other policies of the

school district.

"When there is a question about our decisions on certain subjects, we use the handbook as the final authority," Stanley Lamb, superintendent of schools, explained.

"These are policies that the Board of

Trustees have discussed and approved."

One policy that has been re-emphasized this year is student's use of vehicles during the lunch hour. "Because of the safety factor, we do not allow students to drive their vehicles during the lunch hour," Lamb said. "This is a change from last year, but it really was a long standing policy for McLean schools. a student drives a vehicle to school, that vehicle should remain parked until the student leaves for home. That applies to vehicles that are parked off campus also."

Lamb explained that the close proximity of the high school parking lot and the elementary school is one of the reasons for the rule. "The safety of the children is our most important priority," he said.

Parents can find the answers to other questions about policies in the handbook.

100 Elementary Students Evacuated During Blaze

Repeated fire drills at the schools paid off last Friday when about 100 elementary students were safely and quickly evacuated from the building. A dozen McLean Volunteer fire fighters, two pumper trucks and a rescue truck responded to a call Friday afternoon at the McLean Elementary building about 3 p.m. after school officials noticed smoke coming out of the roof of the building.

Because of the peculiar smell of the smoke, officials at first feared an electrical fire. After school personnel and fire fighters searched the ceiling of the building looking for an electrical fire, the source of the blaze was found in a trash can in a

bathroom located between the first and third grade classrooms. The burning plastic liner caused the peculiar smell, fire fighters said.

School officials said that wooden matches were found in the trash can that was filled with paper towels. There was no damage done to the building.

"We want to emphasize that there is no problem with the wiring in the school," Stanley Lamb, superintendent, said. "We're currently investigating to learn who deliberately or accidentally

started this fire, and disciplinary action will be taken."



The board also voted to set a cut-off date for payment of vouchers to the school.


At the August 23 meeting, the board approved the projected budget for the school, and an effective tax rate of \$1.25 per \$100 evaluation.


