 comes to us from the desk of the City Secratary regarding the recycting efforts recently passed by the Groom City Council] by the Groom City Council.] The letter was dated February 26, 1997, addressed to County Judges, Mayors, City Managers, and City Secretaries, from John Kiehl, Assistant to the Executive Director of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.Some while back, PRPC staff began a process staff began a process
intended to revive the intended to revive the
regional recycling program. regional recycling program.
For a brief time, the program had provided the region's local governments with no-cost collection of their recyclable materals. Until last July, CEG Industries had been performing this service under a regional contract with the PRPC. It was in July that CEG notified the PRPC that the regional contract was being terminated due to financial misfortunes. PRPC staff then began soliciting proposals from otter companies who might be able to fill the void left by CEG's depart by Simultaneous to that, PRPC Simultaneous to that, PRIC staff prepared a solid was te grant application to obtrin funds needed to ensure tie continued availability of nocost recycling opportunitiss to the region's local governments.
Following - an - elongate d sproposal'process," the PRPC, under the advisement of the Regional Solid Waste Management Advisory Committee (RSWMAC), accepted the offer submittel
by an Amarillo-based waste hauling company, Amarillo Waste Management (AWM). AWM was the only company to submit a proposal to pick up materials directly from each recycling collection point as once had been done by CEG.

Though the company had no previous experience with large-scale recycling operations, the owners felt that they were prepared to branch off into this new venture. The owners also believed that the company would be able to provide a level of service that would adequately satisfy the recycling needs of the region's local governments.

It is with deep regret and much disappointment that I must now report to you that the contract that had been. tendered to Amarillo Waste Management has been canceled. In other words, the paper recycling programs that were offered to you several weeks ago will not be available at this time. However, the oil and oil filter recycling programs are still being made available since those services will be provided by another recyeling company.

However, the RSWMAC is not abandoning the regional recycling program concept. In fact, the Committee has already taken measures to strengthen the possibilities strengthen the possibilities for the creation of a self sufficient program in not too distant future. In the meanwhile, I do
apologize for any apologize for any inconvenience this decision may cause you or your residents.

It sounds real simple on the surface. Allow Texans to borrow against the equity in their homes, something currently prohibited under currently prohibited under Texas law. This will free up an untapped source of collateral that would bring new life to the credit market. Suddenly, there is money for education, medical bills, business startups or whatever. It's a financial magic bullet, at least until the bills come due. After all, that value belongs to the homeowner, right? Of course it does, and that's exactly why the Texas Farm Bureau opposes changes in the home equity lending law Proposals lending law. Proposals under consideration in the Texas Legislature would change the law to allow homeowners to borrow against their equity. It would be a mistake.

Countless stories, books, and movies have been based on the plot where a rough cowboy woos and weds a fair "gentle" lady from the big city. Her heroic fight to maintain her gentle ways and raise her family as ladies and gentiemen has provided reading enjoyment for all.
A modern version of this plot was enacted on a neighboring ranch a few years ago. Of course we will not use real names.
Miss Cory, from Boston, fell madly in love with young Jake from Texas and agreed to marry him. Forewarned and confident she fought hard to maintain her Boston demeanor on the west Texas ranch she called home.
Her young son was raised with discipline and polite mannerisms. He was four years old when Cory went to the hospital to deliver her second child, leaving her son with his father and the ranch cowboys.

loans against home equity would create new choice and flexibility for potential borrowers. for potentia believe that changes in the law would have the opposite effect. Once the barriers to collateralizing homesteads are removed, we believe that inclusion of the home's value will become almost automatic in virtually any automatic in virtually any loan that carries substantial risk.
Bankers are not bad guys here, but they have an obligation to protect the interests of their shareholders, and to satisfy bank examiners. They will ere on the side of caution and get every bit of and get every bit of collateral they can before making a loan. You may have the choice to use your not have the choice to do anything else.


A recent conversation with a banker friend of mine drove this point home for me. He posed hypothetical situation of a farmer with limited financial options. He described the mythical but bleak financial picture, and said, "If I could have the house for collateral, I could go with him for another year." This another year.
This situation has happened often enough in real life and there is pienty of heartache associated with it. I had to tell my friend, "Don't you think it would be better to say no now and leave this person with his house and maybe enough assets to start enough assets to start over? As long as a fat pool of equity exists in the form of a house, many bankers will be tempted to extend loans when they probably should not.

Farmers and business owners who got loans last year will suddenly find that the same loans will not be renewed unless they put up their homes as collateral What a choice. Lose the farm now, or lose everything next year, balanced against the hope of making enough to save it all.
At such a time, judgement often fails. How many bankers will call a halt to unworkable financial risk? Some, to their credit, Some, to their credit,
probably will. Others will probably will. Others will
go "one more year, as long go "one more year, as long
as we have the house." as we have the house. Next year, however,
eventually comes and loans always become "due and payablen "Next year" could, in fort, could, in fact, be the last year, but if we change the law, the house will be gone.
As the law is currently written, a family always has a home, as long as the payments are made. With the proposed changes in the home equity laws, that security could quickly security could quickly
disappear. This is not disappear. This is not
flexibility. It's a potential flexibility.
disaster.
As I've made this argument in public forums across Texas, I am often told, "I can decide for myself whether to use the myseif whether to use the
equity in my home as collateral." I certainly agree with that, but I think it is far more likely that you will be required to use the home equity for virtually any substantial loan you any substantal The choice and flexibility you anticipated will quickly become secondary as lenders scramble to protect themselves.

The Texas Home Equity Law was written to protect the sanctity of the home.
