Drinking and Driving Assembly Held For Red Ribbon Week



Letter to the Editor......Hurricane Rita Hits Former McLean Family

I live in the city of Port Neches Texas about 7Miles off of the Gulf Of Mexico. With the approach of hurricane Rita we decided to evacuate to Austin, Texas.

On Wednesday 9-21 Cindy. Dustin. and Kaela left the house for Austin which, on a normal day is a 4-5 hour trip. They made it to Bill and Tina Thomas' house in 8 hours, I stayed behind to board up the windows and pickup lawn furniture. I left for Austin 4 hours after my family. As I started down I-10 west out of Beaumont the traffic was running 70-80 MPH.

This all changed when I

got to the 1-10, 1-45 interchange in Houston. The traffic slowed to a crawl. It took me over 10 hours to go through the Houston/Katy area.

The next morning I was out of water to drink, gas was getting low, and I was getting hungry. There was no way to get off of the highway but that did not matter because there was no place to buy gas or food.

Thanks to my LG phone and Verison wireless I was able to stay in touch with Cindy. AT around 10PM on the 22nd I was getting close to Columbus Texas. I call Cindy and she told me that her dad (Bill Thomas) was going to head toward me on

highway 71. I was less than 10 mile from Columbus on I-10 and he was 88 miles away in Austin. He met me about 8 mile North of Columbus He went 80 miles to my 18

Bill brought me food, water, and fuel. Not to mention Tina to drive my vehicle. There also 2 TxDOT employees that pulled up where I stopped They gave me 5 gallons of fuel and some of their own food that they had brought from home. I now wish that I had got their names but I will never forget them.

After I got fuel and something to eat and drink the trip continued although not nearly as slow. I finally

arrived in Austin around midnight. The entire trip took just over 28 hours.

After we found out that Rita had her aim on our town, we made the choice to enroll Dustin and Kaela in school in Ceader Park ISD You would have thought we were back in McLean. These people took the kids gave them school supplies. and personal care items. They set them up with a buddy and the kids hit the ground

Cindy and I called the companies that we work for in Beaumont and they both have offices in Austin. We both went to work the next day. Three weeks later we made the decision to come back to Port Neches. The schools are now back open and we are back to work while we clean up and fix

We were very luck as far as damage goes. We lost about 200 shingles, trees, trampoline, fridge, freezer.

the first night back. We have friends that lost everything.

The people of Texas are GREAT they almost all left when they were told to leave. I have only heard of 5 deaths related to Rita in

Thanks to everyone who prayed for us. (I did alot of praying myself)

Texas rail relocation and improvement fund in the state treasury and would authorize grants of state revenue and issuance of public debt to relocate, rehabilitate, and expand privately and publicly owned passenger and freight rail facilities and to construct railroad underpasses and overpasses.

PROPOSITION 2

BaHot Language - "The constitutional amendment providing that marriage in this state consists only of the union of one man and one woman and prohibiting

this state or a political subdivision of this state from creating or recognizing any legal status identical or similar to marriage."

Brief Explanation

HJR 6 would provide that
marriage in Texas is solely
the union of a man and
woman, and that the state
and its political
subdivisions could not
create or recognize any
legal status identical to or
similar to marriage,
including such legal status
relationships created
outside of Texas.

PROPOSTITION 3

Ballot Language

"The constitutional amendment clarifying that certain economic development programs do not constitute a debt."

Brief Explanation
HJR 80 would provide that local economic development program loans or grants (other than debts secured by a pledge of ad valoren; taxes or financed by the issuance of any bonds or other obligations

payable from ad valorem taxes) do not constitute or create debt. Any provision of state constitutional law that may prohibit or limit the authority of a political subdivision of the state to incur debt does not apply to those loans or grants.

PROPOSITION 4

Ballot Language - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a criminal defendant who violates a condition of the defendant's release pending trial."

Brief Explanation SJR 17 would authorize a
district judge to deny
reinstatement of bail or new
bail to a person accused of
a felony, if the person's bail
had been revoked or
forfeited as a result of the
person's violation of a
condition of release related
to the safety of a victim of
the alleged offense or to the
safety of the community.
PROPOS ITTON 5

Ballot Language - "The constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to

define rates of interest for

Brief Explanation SJR
21 would authorize the
Legislature to exempt
commercial loans from
state usury laws that set
maximum interest rates.
"Commercial loans" are
loans made primarily for
business, commercial,
investment, agricultural, or
similar purposes and not
primarily for personal,
family, or household
purposes.

PROPOSITON 6

Ballot Language: "The constitutional amendment to include one additional public member and a constitutional county court judge in the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

Brief Explanation -

HJR 87 would increase the size of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct from eleven to thirteen members by increasing from four to five the number of public members and by adding a constitutional county court judge. The additions would ensure that the commission has an odd number of members, which is required by another provision of the state constitution.

PROPOSITION 7

Ballot Language - "The constitutional amendment authorizing line-of-credit advances under a reverse mortgage."

Brief Explanation-SJR
7 would authorize new
options for reverse
mortgage agreements for
senior homeowners
allowing them to draw
advances at unscheduled
intervals, if and when
needed, and only in the
amounts needed, during the
loan term. These are in
addition to options that
would allow a lump sum
payment after settlement or
regular periodic.

predetermined equal amounts over a term of years or the lifetime of the homeowner. Additionally, SJR 7 would: (1) prohibit the agreement from requiring the use of a credit card, debit card or similar device to obtain an advance; (2) prohibit the charge or collection of a transaction fee solely in connection with any debit or advance, after the time the extension of credit is established; and (3) prohibit the lender or holder from unilaterally amending the extension of credit.

PROPOSTION 8

Ballot Language- "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by relinquishing and releasing any state claim to sovereign ownership or title to interest in certain land in Upshur County and in Smith County."

Brief Explanation SJR 40 would clear individual land titles by relinquishing and releasing all claims of state ownership interests, including mineral interests, in two local areas, namely, a roughly 4.600 acre area located roughly 14 miles southeast of Gilmer, Texas, and a separate 900 acre area located north of Tyler, Texas

PROPOSITON 9

Ballot Language - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a six-year term for a board member of a regional mobility authority." Brief Explanation - HJR 79 would authorize the Legislature to provide staggered six year terms of office for board members serving on regional mobility authorities, with no more than one-third of the board positions being appointed every two years.
