Britten again passed to Hickey for 7 yards and a touchdown.

Just before halftime Britten fired Hickey a 30 yard pass into the endzone for a touchdown, bringing the halftime score to 38-0.

School Tax Rate Set... Combined Rate \$1.25

The Groom Independent School District Board of Trustees met last week in regular session.

One of the main items of business was to set the tax rate for the 1991-92 year. The board unanimously voted for a .4809 tax rate which when combined with the County Education District will tally 1.25 for \$100 valuation for property owners. The effective tax rate, 1.28, is the rate which applied to this years property values will generate the same amount as the actual rate and is dependent on total taxes collected, operating expenses and state funds. The trustees voted to stay .03 under that rate.

In other business, Jess Baker was appointed to serve as a third appraiser for teacher appraisals.

Ken Burger was appointed district representative to the Carson County Appraisal District Board of Directors.

The attendance committee which oversees problems with students who attend less than 80 days was appointed. They are Marcia Davis, Shirley Fields, Charles Burk, Jay Lamb and Judy Babcock.

In unrelated business the board voted to increase substitute teacher pay from \$30 per day to \$35 per day.

They also voted to enact plan no. 457 to cover social

security benefits for part time and substitute employees who are not covered under the Teacher Retirement System.

The trustees will take bids on two buses the district will sell and bids on computer networks and software programs.

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New Number For Social Security

The Social Security Administration (SSA) will change its toll-free telephone number as of October 1, 1991. The new number is 1-800-SSA-1213. (1-800-772-1213).

SSA is giving early notice so that people will not be taken by surprise when they call. We want people to be on the lookout for it and note the change before they have to use it.

The SSA number change resulted from Congressional legislation that requires Federal Government agencies to convert to a new telecommunications system called "FTS 2000". Since the new system is managed by a different service carrier than the agencies had used in the past, SSA had to change its toll-free number.

Since its nationwide implementation 2 years ago, the 800 number service has become a popular option for people who have Social Security business. Callers find that their requests can be handled easily,

conveniently and expeditiously by phone. In many instances, their business can be completed at the time of the initial call. Recent studies show that more than two-thirds of the 800-number callers prefer using the telephone over having to visit a Social Security office in person.

SSA also offers a telephone response unit that uses an automatic script to speed the processing of certain routine requests. Using a pushbutton telephone, you can: request an application for a Social Security number; obtain a request form for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement; request written verification of the amount of your Social Security benefit or Supplemental Security income payment; order publications; and listen to general information about Social Security programs.

With the assistance of a teleservice representative at the 800 number, you can change a mailing address, make an appointment to apply for benefits, report a missing check, or simply ask a question.

Service on the 800 number is available weekdays from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM. But, the best times to call are early in the mornings or late in the afternoon, Wednesday through Friday after the first week in the month.

The local Social Security office is located at 125 South Gillespie, Pampa, Texas. Office hours are 9:00 AM until 4:00 PM Monday through Friday except on national holidays.

CED Awards Bid To Canyon Bank

CED 3, composed of Groom, White Deer, Claude, Panhandle and Canyon, met Monday to award bids for the districts depository bank to the First National Bank of Canyon.

Canyon Independent School District Superintendent Mike King


told the board that all banks located in the CED were contacted about bidding, but only one bank responded by the original Sept. 13 deadline. The bank responding told King that it could not submit a bid unless the deadline was extended.

The deadline was extended to Sept. 19, and King said First National Bank of Canyon and the Canyon Banking Center, First National Bank of Amarillo were the only banks submitting bids.

King said the recommendation to go with

the Canyon bank was based on the cost of providing services and on the monthly fee charges.

The CED will have only one checking account through which all monies will be received and disbursed. King said the board will select a bank depository every two years.

McLean, Alanreed, And Lefors Boards Discuss Consolidation

Members of the school boards of the McLean Independent School District, the Lefors Independent School District, and the Alanreed Independent School District met at 7:30 p.m. on September 17, 1991 in the McLean School Cafeteria to discuss the proposed consolidation election for the three school districts. Others present for the meeting were Stanley Lamb, Joe Roper, and Billy Bob Adams, superintendents of the three districts, and several other school faculty members and visitors.

Prior to the discussion, Thacker Haynes led the opening prayer for the meeting.

James Hefley, McLean Board president, welcomed the group and called the meeting to order. Mr. Hefley explained that the purpose of the meeting was to discuss concerns of the communities and boards regarding consolidation issues. He stated that one of the areas of primary concern seemed to be representation on the board of the district should the consolidation election pass. Mr. Hefley reported that according to the law as we understand it, if the election carried in all three districts in November, 1991, the actual consolidation into one district would occur the following July. At this time, the McLean ISD Board of Trustees would become the governing board according to law due to the fact that this district has the largest pupil enrollment, and this board would govern until the following May, at which time a new board would be elected from the entire consolidated district. Hefley stated that the McLean Board had agreed to voluntarily give three places to board members from the other districts, beginning July, 1992, and that it was our feeling that at this time there should be two members on the board from Lefors and one from Alanreed, with four members remaining from McLean.

Mr. Robertson, president of the Lefors ISD Board, stated that the community of Lefors would like three representatives on the board

of the consolidated district, and that it was their belief that things would run more smoothly this way. Mr. Bode of Alanreed commented that the issue of representation was very important, and that he believed that consolidation would be more acceptable and that it would help in the vote to assure passage if the people know they will have board representation in the consolidated district. Mr. Hefley stated that at the present time, the McLean Board does not feel that it would be doing right to give up more than half of the board representation when technically we will be the receiving district. He also pointed out that we will have three members due to be elected in the May, 1992, election, and that there could be a remote possibility that some of the newly elected members of our board could object to giving up seats on the board. He reiterated that he did not believe that it would be a problem, but that he wanted to point out this possibility.

The Lefors representatives pointed out that they felt that assurance of proper representation on the board would be more enticing to the Lefors voters. They said that at the present time it was a fear with the Lefors people that if McLean had total control of the board all students from Lefors would be required to come to McLean to attend school. Mr. Hefley stated that once consolidation occurs, our next goal is to try to build a school between McLean and Lefors, but that this issue again would be strictly a decision of the voters. He assured the group that the McLean Board is committed to pursuing this goal.

Bill Thomas inquired as to how many students the consolidated district would have. It was reported that at the present time McLean has 218 students, Lefors has 151 students and Alanreed has 7 students, for a combined total of 376 students.

Mr. Hefley assured the Lefors group that during the period from the time of the consolidation election to the following July and until the following district wide

election the McLean board would welcome members from the Lefors and Alanreed boards and other community members to act as consultants and advisors to the McLean Board. He said that it is our commitment and goal to maintain faculty jobs with the hope that attrition will take care of excess employees, if any.

Mr. Robertson asked if there had been any discussion or feelings on the size of the proposed new building, and if there had been any indications on whether or not grades K-5 or 6 would be kept in both communities. Hefley affirmed that this might be a very viable option, especially for the first few years. Lefors representatives stated that they had envisioned a swap-out on activities and facilities, with some sports and extracurricular events taking place in both McLean and Lefors on an alternate basis. Jake Hess II stated that this was an important issue to the communities involved, and that we had also envisioned using the facilities alternately. He said that we all need each other, and that we must be committed to working together to make this advantageous for all.

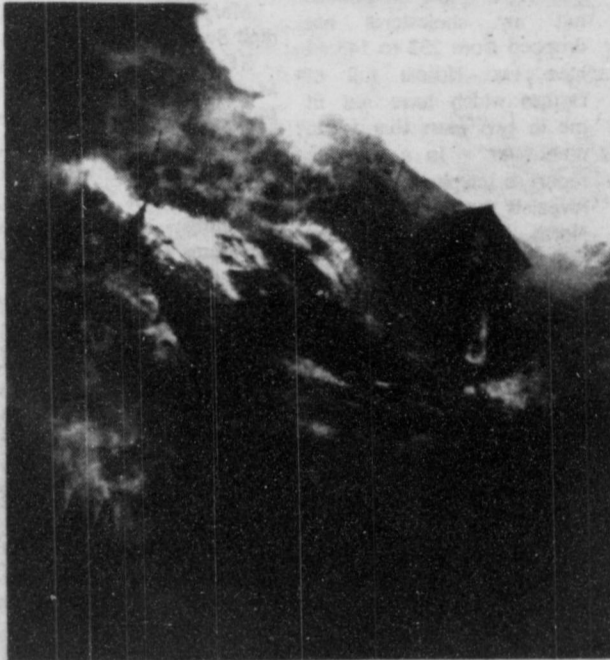
Several building questions were asked, and Gwen Henley noted that a bond issue to build a building

would depend strictly upon a vote of the people. Mr. Hefley stated that it was his belief that if the election carried in November, all communities should appoint a joint committee immediately to begin pursuing the issue of a new building.

Joe Magee told the group that we must all trust each other and bond together to work for the good of our communities and the education of our children. He stated that McLean has a good board and that we will give our word to do everything in our power to

assure a solid education and future for the school. He said that we feel that with our number of students and our financial reserves, that

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON - A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named product Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the discovery has been a windfall for

overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 15 days on the product and was never hungry.

McLean piled up 354 total yards with balanced offense that included scoring runs of 2 and 4 yards by Sanders and 11 and 3

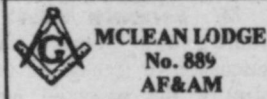
yards by Harris.

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket No. 10461.

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$3 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the Commission.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but not later than October 15, 1991. McLEAN SCHOOL BOARD MEETS

On Sept. 16, 1991 the McLean School Board met in regular session at 5:30 p.m. in the business office.

All board members were present except Thacker Haynes.

The School District's Board of Trustees adopted an ordinance to set the 1991 tax rate at .48 cents per \$100 valuation during the meeting.

That rate combined with the 75.5 cents per \$100 valuation set by County Education District 14, will bring the McLean ISD taxpayer's total rate to \$1.23

1/2 per \$100 valuation. In related action, the board voted not to allow discounts for early payment of ad valorem taxes.

Consolidation

We must be careful, but that we support a building program and will do everything we can to try and make sure that a building can be built. He added that if this was not possible we could guarantee that there would be some part of the school system in Lefors. Magee noted that if consolidation occurs, each

community would lose some identity, but that it was our wish and desire that our three communities could unite and combine into one educational entity while allowing each community to retain some identity. He said that we must be as positive as we can, and that by consolidation we can do what is best for all our children and have the finest school around.

Bill Thomas stated that to be successful the expertise of all three boards would be needed and that input from each board would be needed on teachers, programs, etc. Mr. Hefley reminded the group that the thought of losing local school systems is very distressing to everyone,

and it was generally agreed by the group that if we do not work toward combining our resources, we will all eventually be not closed up, but "starved out" by the state, and that our children will be forced to attend school wherever the state mandates, which would probably be Pampa. The point was brought out that we have a very short time in which to get all petitions filed so that an election can occur in November. Ted Simmons, Gray County Commissioner, addressed the group and stated that there had been discussion on combining these schools for many years. He said that he believed that we must all look to the future,

and that the matter of where the majority of the board comes from should not be the matter of concern. Simmons said that we should all put education and kids first, and at the first election in the consolidated district, the representation will come from the overall area. Mr. Hefley stated that it was the belief of the McLean Board that by consolidation we can have an expanded curriculum and extracurricular activities and provide a good solid education for all students, and that each community can benefit in the future from this.

At this time, the meeting was recessed for

refreshments and to give the boards time to talk collectively and individually. The session was reconvened at 8:50 p.m. Mr. Hefley announced that he believed this session had resolved some issues, and that some issues still remained to be resolved, but that everyone had reached the general agreement that all petitions would be filed so that the election could occur. He stated that between now and election time, the three boards would work closely together to resolve the issues and to give the voters some positive information upon which they could base their voting decisions. The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.
