

### **CED 3 Votes To Increase Taxes 12%**

Board members of County Education District Three Tuesday gave tentative approval of a 11.9 cent tax increase over last year, 10 cents of which was mandated by the state.

Dr. Mike King, superintendent of the Canyon Independent School District, said the required 10 cent increase put the trustees in a peculiar spot.

"By law we are required to raise, by law, our tax from 72 to 82, which by definition, is above the rollback rate," he said.

King explained that a recent decision by Attorney General Dan Morales said that the CEDs are considered under the same

legislation as school districts, which limit raising taxes to 8 cents above the prior years' rate.

The new rate of \$0.8881, up from last year's \$0.7691, covers a budget of \$11,556,476. Last year's budget was \$10,195,361.

Of the money going to districts, Canyon will receive local fund assignments of \$6,550,738 from the CED, while Claude ISD gets \$563,384, Groom gets \$413,148, Panhandle gets \$2,340,210 and White Deer gets \$1,688,996.

A public hearing to set the actual tax rate, will be held September 4 at noon in the Canyon ISD Central Administration Building.

### **1992-93 School Year To Be Last For Alanreed**

The County Education District appears to be standing by as Alanreed ISD is going down for the third time. With only 10 students, 5 who are transfer students from McLean, School Board President Dick Bode stated, ".... This is our last hurrah."

Alanreed, along with McLean and Lefors discussed the possibility of merging last year to the tune of two different votes on the subject. Residents gave a resounding "no" at that election.

"In my opinion," said Bode, "the handwriting was on the wall when the consolidation measure failed."

Both President Bode and Superintendent Billy Bob Adams will resign at the end of the school year. Adams will take retirement and Bode stated that he had had enough of a job that no one was grateful for.

About 30 people attended the school board meeting, during which a public hearing was conducted on the 1992-93 budget of \$252,961, which

was adopted by the school board.

A tax rate of 35 cents per \$100 property valuation was also adopted by the board. The 35 cents represents a 13.5-cent increase over last year's rate of 21.5 cents per \$100 valuation. That rate is subject to a tax rollback.

The board had published a notice in The Pampa News which stated that it was proposing a 39 cents per \$100 valuation, but Adams recommended Thursday that the board adopt the 35 cents rate, which was unanimously approved. No one attended a public hearing on the tax rate held Aug. 27. The notice of the hearing was published in The Pampa News, but those attending the meeting Thursday said they do not subscribe to the newspaper and were unaware of the meeting.

Most of the tiny school district's problems with staying in operation were blamed on the unconstitutional County Education Districts. In the 1991-92 school year, Alanreed ISD taxpayers paid in \$172,000 to CED 14 and received only \$56,931 from the CED, a loss of \$115,069. The school district was scheduled to receive \$85,511 back from the CED, but due to a loss of students, an average daily attendance drop from 19.6 to 13.85 in 1991-92, more had to be paid to the CED. One person asked what would happen if Alanreed

ISD did not pay the money to the CED. Bode said, "If we did not pay the money to the CED.

they would close our doors." Others then questioned why the school was going to stay open.

Bode responded, "We had two elections and the

decision by the local people is that they want to continue to operate the school because the taxes here, have been in the past,

lower than the district we might have merged with." One taxpayer responded,

"We didn't know how fast we were going to get that doubled, did we?"

Bode said, "Just because I'm on the school board, that doesn't make me exempt from paying taxes, that doesn't make me exempt from having an opinion about the CED... It's very simple when you get right down to it ... we have to comply with state law or be closed. The community decided they wanted a school, they're going to have to pay the taxes."

Adams said that if Alanreed did not have a school district, the taxpayers would have paid a total of \$1.235 cents per \$100 valuation last year (to McLean ISD), compared to the 97 cents per \$100 valuation they actually paid to Alanreed ISD.

Jimmy Shaw said, "I think the first meeting we had up here about combining these schools, the statement was made that there would probably be no reason for us not to have school here another year without raising any of the taxes without any problem."

Monte Johnson, an Alanreed ISD taxpayer of Amarillo, asked, "Do you think you might have ballooned this budget a little too much when we're \$18,000 more than last year and we had more students then." Bode said that the budget

did have some fat, but that was because the district did not want to have a shortfall prior to school being out.

The school district's fund balance (reserves) at the beginning of the 1991-92 school year was \$241,473. At the end of the '1991-92 school year, that fund balance stood at \$131,692 and it is expected to be depleted by the end of this school year, Adams said.

Delbert Trew said, "1 think you've done the best you can under the circumstances. . . I'll even commend you . . . I'm not going to like it, but I guess I'm going to have to pay it whether I like it or not. I'm going to pay for my ignorance of what was going on.

"... You've done it legal. It was posted so there's no problem. But I think I was certainly misled and I'll blame that on my ignorance. My question is how far are we going? ... I'd like to know where we're going to shut this thing off?"

Bode responded, "We are elected by the community. The majority has decided that there would be school. We, by oath, have committed ourselves to serving this community's See School, pg. 10

The grants are administered by the Governor's Criminal Justice Division; for more information, call that division at 512/463-1919.





Most of the Company's residence and business customers who subscribe to Custom Calling Features and Touch-tone service will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring.





Trew said later, "I'm willing to give you a check right now for my taxes this year because I don't think there's anything I can do about it, but I'll tell you next year it's going to be a damn fight, Dick (Bode)."

Adams said, "My recommendation to this school board is there is no way we can justify having school with four students (next school year)." This year there is a loss of almost \$750,000 in property tax values, Adams said. Last year's taxable value on property in the district was listed as \$23,192,735. That figure dropped to \$22,482,940 this year. The 35 cents tax rate will bring in an estimated \$76,330.

Bob Sherrod said, "I'll tell you what it boils down to. They had a chance to vote to consolidate, they didn't do it, so consequently the people are going to pay whatever it costs to educate five or seven little kiddos, that's the way it's going to be. It's already done so there's no use fussing about

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new <u>optional</u> call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Beil is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press \*67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

\* These rates are in addition to the initial installation charges and monthly basic service rate. For residence customers, installation charges are \$2.70 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$5.40. For business customers, the charges are \$5.40 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$10.75.

\*\* Anonymous Call Rejection is \$3 per month if purchased without Caller ID and is \$1 per month when purchased with Caller ID Name or Number.

This proceeding has been designated Docket No. 11362, and a hearing on the merits has been scheduled for November 16, 1992. The PUC has jurisdiction to consider this matter pursuant to Sections 16, 18, 37 and 38 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA). This application was filed pursuant to the provisions of the PUC's Substantive Rule 23.24. Among the issues that will be addressed in this



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

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
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
