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

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



While back to school needs often include notebooks, pencils and paper, clothing, shoes, backpacks and lunch boxes, one of the top items required is an up-to-date immunization record for children in schools and child-care facilities.

I m m u n i z a t i o n requirements remain the same for this year with one exception, said Monica Gamez of the Immunization Division at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). "TDH is deferring for one school year the requirement that students have a booster dose of tetanus and diphtheria (Td)." This 10-year booster is usually given to students at about age 14.

The action applies to Texas schools from July 1, 2001, to August 1, 2002. Once the deferment is lifted, all students will be required to show proof of a Td booster. The deferment is due to a national shortage of adult tetanus and diphtheria vaccine that resulted when one of two manufacturers discontinued prochetion.

discontinued production.

Vaccines required at various ages for all children are polio; diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis or acellular pertussis (DTP/DTaP); Haemophilus influenza type b (Hib); measles, mumps and rubella (MMR); chickenpox (Varicella); and hepatitis B.

A hepatitis A vaccine requirement affects only children attending school or child-care facilities in 32 counties along the Texas-Mexico border.

Children with proof of a pervious hepatitis A infection do not need to be vaccinated.

be vaccinated.

All children attending public or private schools are licensed, certified or registered child-care facilities must have the required immunizations for their age group completed by the first day of attendance. State law gives local school districts and child-care facilities the option of allowing children to attend if at least one immunization in each series has been received, but the remaining required immunizations.



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



When I was in elementary school, there were very few options. A "Big Chief" tablet and a fat pencil were about all you needed. Sometimes you got to have your own box of 8 crayons, but there were no choices of colors Red, Blue Green, yellow, orange, black. brown & purple (Although, you could opt for the ones that were round or the ones that were flat on one side, although they were more expensive, so we never got to get those.) Paste was paste. No purple or blue sticks, roll-on, bottle or tubs.

The fat pencils were all red unless your mom went to some office supply and got green ones. The only real decision you got to make was which of your dad's old shirts you were going to take for an art smock. (Yes. there were some rich kids that got to have a real smock that actually fit) There were no nap mats. We sat on the cold floor, in warm weather and cold (Only dresses for girl back then too.)

When we finally graduated to skinny pencils we also got to buy map pencils and spiral notebooks. There was no tearing out of pages. If the list said 80 pages, that's what you got. If you were lucky, you did get to pick vour favorite color. Your options again were usually red, blue or green.

By the time we finally graduated to pens, (about the 5th or 6th grade) you had only one option. Bic. If the teacher didn't specify, you did get to pick blue or black ink There was no gel, roller, o-gravity, smelly ink, or anything but fine or They were all medium clear and if you took the guts out of them, they made a heck of a great paper wad shooter (I still hold a couple of precision shot records at Stephen F Austin School in Amarillo to my knowledge.)



Under this proposal, taxes on the average homestead would decrease by \$22.57 or 15.68 percent compared with last year's taxes. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.
