Salary Step plus \$900 for her masters degree.

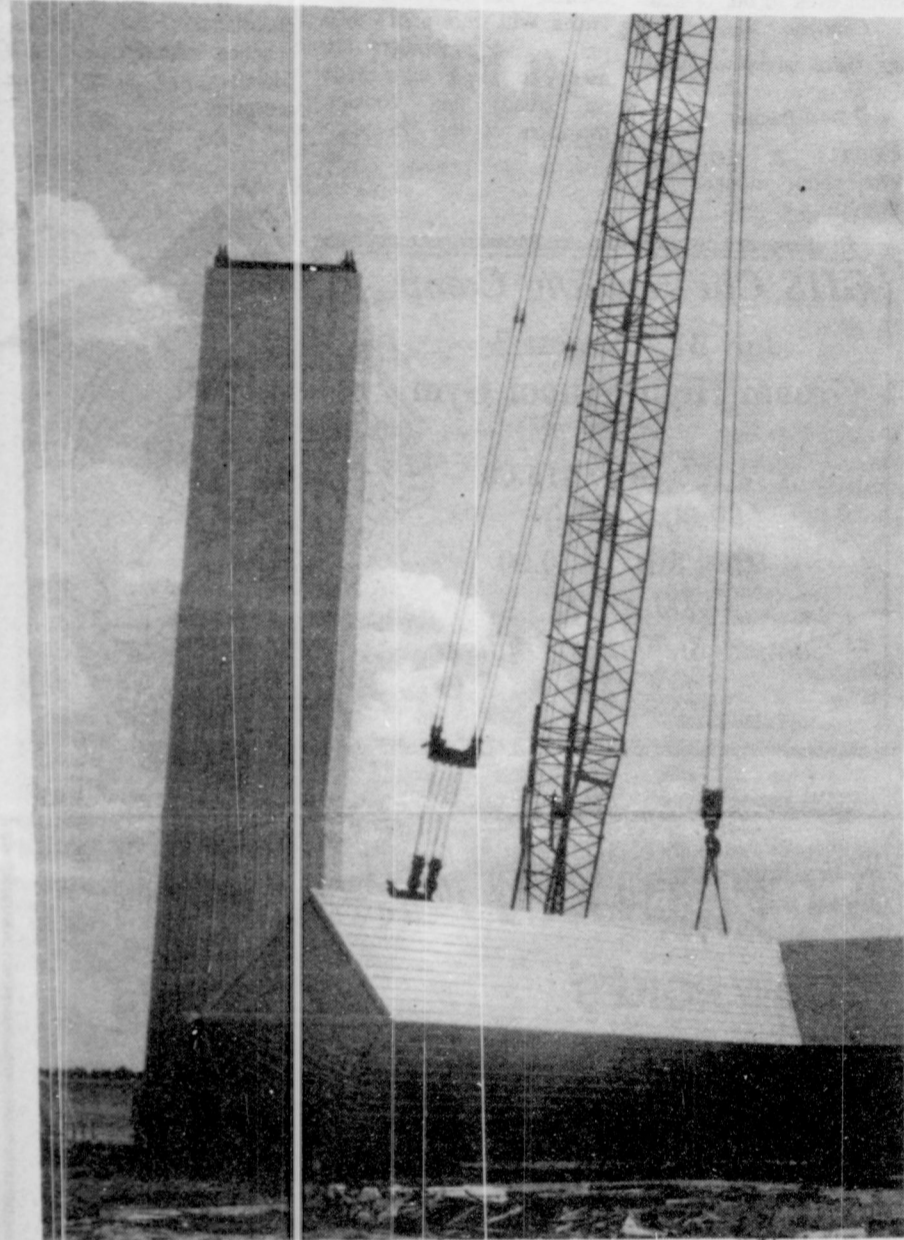
Crowell, who has served as a 1/2 time teacher and a 1/2 time aid in past years, will now be assigned as a full time teacher at the appropriate levels.

The board extended a letter of engagement to Billy Baker, C.P.A. for their annual external audit.

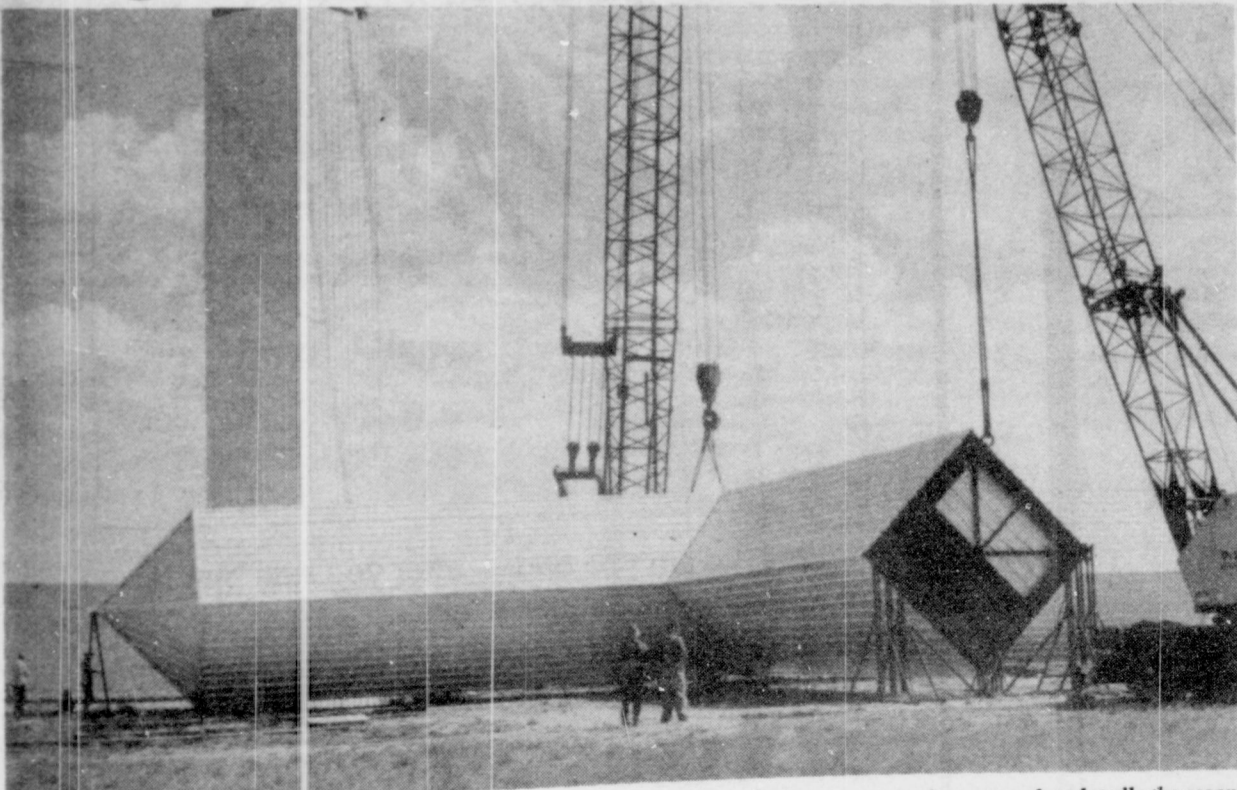
The State National Bank was approved as the school official depository, with all in favor, save Adela Kotara who abstained, since she is an employee of the bank.

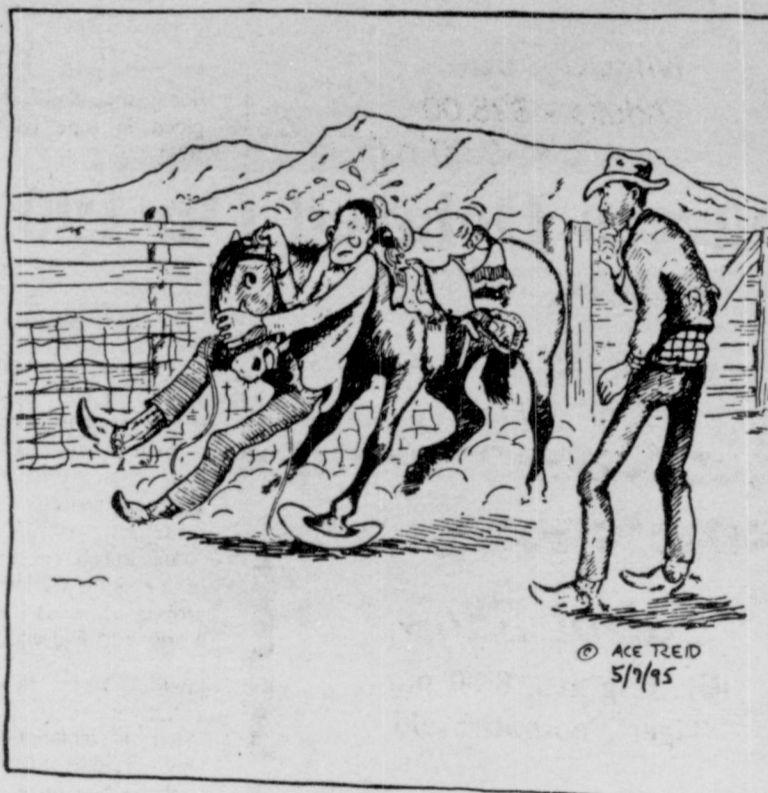

Grandview-Hopkins Board Reviews Transfer Policy

Members of the Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District Board of Education reviewed the 1995-96 budget at their Tuesday regular session meeting, according to Superintendent Norman Baxter.

The board looked at increases in teachers' salaries as a result of Senate Bill 1 and increases in the amount of money to be spent to comply with wealth-equalization laws.

No action was taken to adopt the budget. That is expected to occur at the next meeting, says Baxter.

In other action, the board reclassified funds in the 1994-95 budget, approved Billy Baker from Borger as the auditor for the school, adopted a transfer policy for students entering the school

district and approved a supplemental duties contract for Rene Ann Chavado so she could coach the pee-wee basketball team.

The board heard a report from Baxter on the district's investment pool, on an Option 4 agreement with Pampa ISD and a briefing on Senate Bill 1.

The board also had a second hearing on a transfer policy for students transferring out of the school district and learned that the 1995-96 school calendar is in compliance with new state guidelines.

In executive session, the school board heard a review on a pending appeal to the Texas Employment Commission on a former teacher who retired and later sought unemployment benefits.

County Commissioners

Commissioners approved a request from GTE to bore under a county road in Precinct 1 in order to install a communication line. The depth of the line below the lowest part of the ditch has been changed from 30 inches to 36 inches.

A PCC would have a pre-established value, paid for in advance, that would decrease in value as calls were completed. This service would be similar to SWBT's current Calling Card Service in that SWBT would carry the local and intraLATA calls originating in its region. InterLATA and international calls would be carried by the Interexchange Carrier selected by the customer. Prepaid Calling Cards would be sold in varying denominations, such as \$10.00, \$20.00 and \$50.00. The rate for local and intraLATA calls would be \$0.40 per minute for all times of day. The rates for interLATA and international calls would be determined by the Interexchange Carrier that handles the call. First year revenues from PCC are estimated to be approximately \$11 million. SWBT proposes that this application become effective on August 7, 1995.



Carson County Sheriff's Report

Sheriff's Department deputies were called to Interstate 40 near Groom on a kidnapping report Friday morning. It was apparent that one of the suspects was enjoying being arrested by Trooper Longway more than would be expected. You never know what kind of friendship can blossom on Interstate 40.

The Sheriff's Department responded to a child custody dispute in Panhandle with the assistance of Officer Gary Robertson. The dispute stemmed from a visitation agreement.

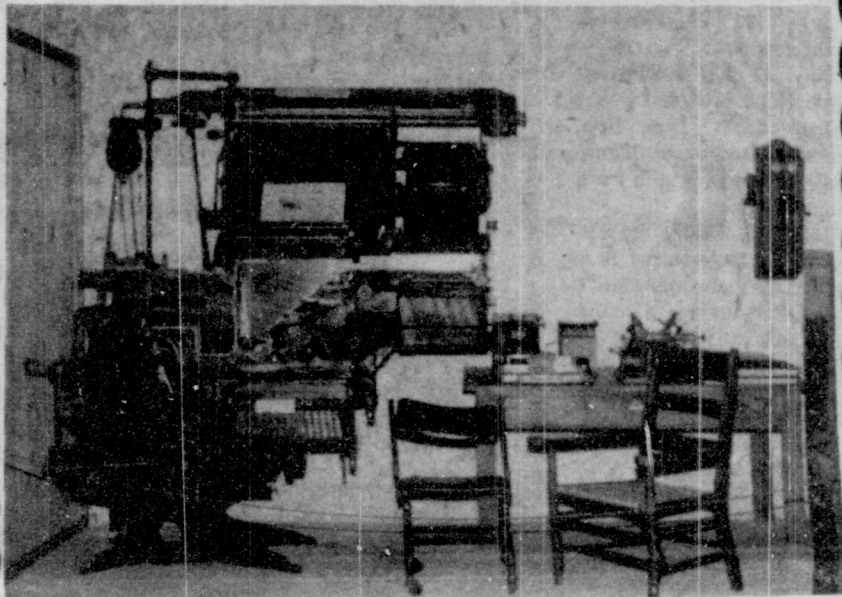

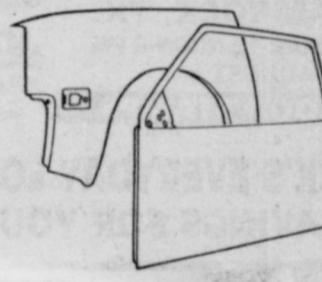

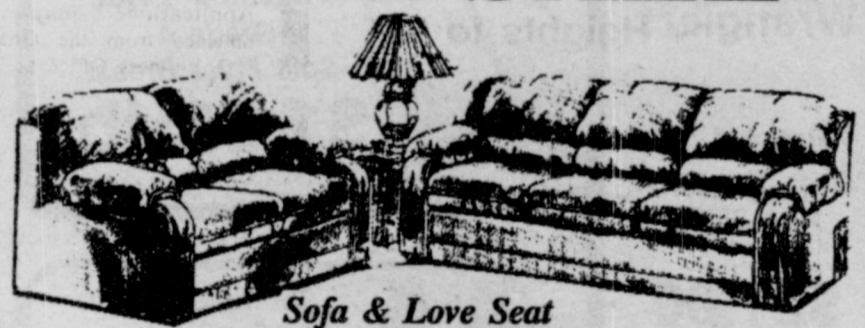
