## "SUPER TUESDAY" Focuses On Sherifli's Race

Super Tuesday has arrived for Carson County voters to choose a presidencratic candidate for the Democratic and Republican primaries on March 8.
Not only will Carson County voters be selecting a presidential choice on Tuesday but a sheriff's candidate as well, as four candidates are running for that position in the Democratic primary. One Republican candidate will be on the ballot in the Republican primary to face the winner of the Democrats in November. After months of campaigning, voters will choose from incumbent Sheriff Connie Reed, one former deputy of Reed's, Terry Timmons of White Deer and another presently working deputy under Reed, Jerry Gaines of Groom and Panhandle Chief of Police Chuck Flemins. Republican Tam Terry of White Deeer will see his fight come in November when he must face the Democratic winner in the General Election.
Deputy Jerry Gaines has served in Carson County the past 11 years. He has a number of hours in extended law enforcement training and is certified in Texas to instruct police officers in the use of firearms.
"I will do my best to organize and maintain the sheriff's department so that every citizen in Carson County can take pride," said Gaines.
"I urge everyone to vote Super Tuesday,"
Sheriff Reed stated, "I stand on my past record which I am proud of. My department has one of the best arrest and conviction rates in the state.' 'Reed has served three terms as sheriff and was a Carson County Deputy five years before becoming sheriff.
Terry Timmons has been in law enforcement since 1981, transferring to Carson County from Borger.
"If elected, I will do my best and feel my past experience with the sheriff's department will be a great advantage.,

## Appraisal District Files Protest On Taxable Values

Dianne Lavake, Chief Appraiser for the Groom Independent School District, has completed the forms required to officially protest the values of tazable pro-
perty within the district. The appraisal district placed a value of $554,589,793$ on properties within the district and the state has re-valued the district at $\$ 59,945,291$.

In addition to raising the value of homes as previously reported, the State Property Tax Board has estimated that the distriet tax roll carries mineral values of

S22,429, 280 which the SPTB values at $\$ 23,759,831$. The state then concludes that the school district is appraising oil, gas and minerals at a 94.4 percent ratio. 4.4 percent ratio.
"The state uses these figures in computing funding for school districts portion of state aid," reports Joyce Hutsell, business manager for the school district, "and it is vital to the school district that the state board place a value as close to market value as possible."
Oil, gas and minerals are appraised for the Carson County Appraisal District by Pritchard and Abbott of Amarillo. "We can assume

## Commodities

To Be Cut
According to a letter received recently from the Department of Human Services, the commodities program is once again facing cutbacks. As you may know, through this program, economically disadvantaged people have been given cheese, powdered milk, honey, rice, butter, flour and cornmeal.

In recent months, honey and rice have been cut out and now, according to this
recent letter from DHIS, which was received by the VFW Auxiliary, distribution of the commodities cheese and powdered mild are also being cut out. The letter goes on to state that the other items will be available on a "possible" basis and may or may not actually be available in any given month. All of this is given month. All of this is
due to take effect in April. According to Davie Gipson, who co-ordinates the son, who co-ordinates the

Do you have cash in the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund? Texas has the money, The State Treasury is looking for the people. The list of over 75,000 names includes persons from Groom, McLean White Deer, Claude and Panhandle. Anyone wishing to see the list can come by to see the list can come by The Gr
office.
Maybe your Uncle Ned had a producing oil well or two that he never got around telling anyone about. Or maybe a savings account opened when your children were young but never used? "There is no set time limit for making a claim," TAreasurer Ann Richards emphasized. "Please be patient if you are calling on the tollfree number, especially in the first few weeks after March 6 when the telephone
ines are kept busy. You can be assured that if you have money coming to you, you will get it."
Since 1983 when the Unclaimed Money Fund list was first published, the State Treasury has returned 84 percent of all the money ever returned since the law took effect 26 years ago. Under state law, checking and savings accounts, mineral royalties, insurance payments, safe deposit boxes, utility deposits and the like are turned over to the state if accounts are inactive for at least three years.
The state may use the funds for general state services and for education, but he owners or their heirs may file a claim at any time in the future for the money held by the state.
