

The oldest business in the Texas Panhandle will observe it's 100th anniversary next week as the Panhandle Herald meets another Thursday deadline. The paper has pretty much remained a family owned and operated business for the past 100 years. Current owners, Joe and Jean Miller, plan a reception next Wednesday commemorating the century old publication.

The first edition of the newspaper was printed in a tent on a handmade wooden press with a July 2, 1887 dateline. Publisher was H.H. Brookes. A copy of that first edition is on display at the Panhandle Plains Museum in Canyon. There have been 18 publishers of the paper in the past 100rs. The Millers bought the paper in July 1970 giving them 17 years at the helm of the publication. David M. Warren published the paper the longest period of time until his death in 1958. His tenure spanned 25 years.

Miller began his newspaper career in 1935 in Chickasha, Okla. In the heart of the depression he delivered newspapers after school to supplement the family income. He returned to Chickasha after serving in World War II to begin a six year apprenticeship at the Chickasha Daily Express. He was later promoted to mechanical superintendent of the composing and press rooms of the daily publica-tion until resigning his post to purchase his own newspaper in White Deer in 1961. Miller has seen many

Miller has seen many changes in the business since he began his career as a paper boy. He converted both his newspaper and job printing shops to the offset printing method in the late 1960s and further updated with computerized equipment in 1976.

He has often said the ink gets in your blood and once you begin a news career, your dedicated for life. He is





The State Comptroller's office recently sent checks totaling \$53.6 million in sales tax rebates to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Payments so far in 1987 are down 6.5 percent compared to pay-ments made in the same

period last year. Receipts for McLean and Gray County as a whole are still down. During this reporting period, McLean received a check for \$1,479.04 compared to \$1,087.76 for last year. However, our yearly total is still only \$10,166 compared to \$11,294 for 1986. This represents a loss of 9.97 percent.

For Gray County as a whole, the monthly payment was \$77,854.64 compared to \$116,834.32 for last year. County-wide year to date payments are \$684,815.19 compared to \$845,909.76 for __ last year. This represents a loss of 19.04 percent.

Pampa has also suffered a decline of 19.04 percent in yearly payments while Lefors has declined by 47.78 percent in sales tax receipts compared to last year.

July checks represent taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by June 20.



Conservation Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program may be farmers' best bet to make a profit on highly erodible cropland and defray some of the cost of conservation.

"According to USDA rules, compliance with the conservation provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act requires farmers who plan to cultivate highly erodible cropland after January 1, 1990, to develop a conservation plan by 1990," said Lee McDonald, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Pampa. "They must also protect their land against soil erosion with applied conservation practices by 1995 if they want to participate in USDA programs.
These practices may include tillage conservation systems, terraces, grassed waterways, stripcropping, or

CRP offers farmers cost sharing and annual rental payments to convert this highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetation, and a chance to bypass expensive conservation treatment, retain eligibility for USDA programs and ensure a return on this land.

Continued from p.7 highly erodible criteria is not only difficult to protect against erosion, but often produces poor crop yields and has a low profit po-tential," McDonald said. "Most times, payments pro-vided under the Conservation Reserve Program offer farmers greater rates of re-turn to this land."

Under the CRP, farmers receive cost sharing to establish grass, trees, or wildlife plantings on highly erodible cropland. Cost sharing is provided by 50 percent of eligible costs of establishment. Annual rental payments are bid by the farmer and extend for 10 years, the length of the CRP contract. The permanent vegetation must be maintained during this time, and harvesting will not be

The Conservation Reserve is authorized by Congress to continue until 1990, a total of five years, as long as funds are appropriated. Currently, funds have been appropriated through tember of this year.

The latest techniques in farm water management will be exhibited at a field water conservation demonstration day, Friday, July 17, 1987, from9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Roy Carlson farm in Deaf Smith County. The farm is located on FM 1057, three-fourths of a mile west of the intersection of U.S. Highway 385 and FM 1057 at Milo Center.

With an emphasis on sugar beet production, one exhibit will feature Dennis Newton, Deaf Smith County Extension Agent, and Leon New, Irrigation Specialist with Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center, demonstrating low energy precision application (LEPA) and chemigation modifications on pivots. Ambulance Service Requests Funds At Council Meeting

Groom City Council members met last Tuesday to hold a budget hearing for public input on the City budget for 1987-88. No one appeared for the hearing.

Approval of the budget was postponed for another as councilmen decided to take half of one maintenance employee's salary from the general fund rather than raise water rates to cover the salary. Mrs. Ashford was instructed to make the changes in the budget having all figures ready for approval by the August meeting.
Official notification has

come from the appraisal district office on the valuations assigned for the City of Groom for 1987-88.

The appraisal office also estimated that the city could raise the same amount of revenue as last year by setting a tax rate of 61 cents.

Mark Bivens, president of the Groom Ambulance Service, also was present to present proposals to the city for costs of providing paramedic services needed.

Bivens stated it will take about \$10,000 to provide the equipment and supplies necessary for paramedic ser-

He proposed the city either purchase the needed equipment, pay a paramedic \$7,200 annually to serve as and trainer or help pay
of \$6,000 the emergency coordinator annually.

Bivens stated that collections for the service are running about 80 percent and that the group would like to use funds they have toward purchase of a new ambulance when it becomes necessary.

The council tabled action on the matter.

The council adopted ordinance #151 which will allow for the one cent sales tax to collected telecommunications services in the city.

Farm Subsidy **Talks Continue**

Texas farmers and ranchers have a large stake in the Reagan administration proposal made at the General Agreement on Trade and Tariff (GATT) talks to eliminate world farms subsidies,

according to S.M. True, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

The Plainview cotton and grain farmer said the United States has finally put some 'muscle' behind its efforts after being "bullied for sev-eral years by other nations that subsidize farm exports.

"We are willing to negotiate now that we are beginning to be on equal terms," True explained. "But, in the meantime, and until we all play by the same rules, Texas Farm Bureau is going to push hard to help maintain producer income.'

The United States made a determined effort in the 1980s to help American farmers compete in the world trade of agricultural commodities, True said. Federal farms spending was increased from \$3 billion to

about \$30 billion. U.S. farm production was cut, he added, while other nations increased theirs.

"The 1985 Farm Bill also protected US farmer income and at the same time made U.S. farm products more competitive in world trade," he said. "This has other nations very concerned."

"Now is the right time to see if they are concerned enough to eliminate trade barriers and growing gov-ernment subsidies," he add-

Techniques such as marketing loan and export enhancement programs will allow this nation to beat the European Economic Community and other exporting nations, True said. The U.S. will not, however, eliminate its subsidies unilaterally, he
