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

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PTO Urges Safety With New Pick-Up Plan

Groom PTO is asking everyones cooperation in making the school area safe when children are picked up after school.

The PTO devised a plan that has now been approved by both the administration and school board.

The plan submitted by PTO was put into effect last Wednesday afternoon and so far is working very well, according to PTO monitors.

Parents are asked to inform anyone who occasionally picks up children how the plan works to keep it safe.

The area in front of the gym has been striped with a crosswalk for students to come to their rides home. There is to be no parking in front of the gym from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. each day. Vehicles are to park in a single line adjacent to the street. No through traffic is allowed in the same area. Drivers are asked to back up their vehicles and head west on Third Street. Hopefully, this will also take some of the congestion off the Third Street bridge. Traffic can turn north on Newcome or Collier to get back to their

Ruthardt, who currently ranks first in her graduating class, is president of the FHA. She was also active as head cheerleader, student council representative, Spanish club, basketball, track-qualifying for regional and state, tennis and UIL typing-qualifying for state.

Scholarships for 1987-88.
The recently concluded
selection process will result
in a total of approximately
1,000 scholarship awards for
next year.

The extensive scholarship program is made possible hrough funds provided by the Robert G. and Nona K. Carr Scholarship Foundation. Carr Academic Scholarships are awarded annually approximately 1,000 undergraduate and graduate students who enroll at Angelo State. The scholarships may be renewed annually until graduation for qualified students who maintain exemplary and personal academic records.

Now in its seventh year, the Carr Academic Scholarship Program has provided over \$7 million in academic scholarships since the 198182 academic year. Awards are based on the students' outstanding academic records and personal achievements.

The distinctive scholarship program, created by the late Mr. Carr in 1978, will provide approximately \$1.5 million in academic scholarships during the 1987-88 school year to assist worthy and deserving students to pursue their education at Angelo State University.

Mr. Carr bequeathed to the Board of Regents, Texas State University System for the use of Angelo State, all his interest in oil, gas and other minerals with the provision that these properties be held in trust for the establishment of the Carr Academic Scholarship Program.

Charlotte Painter, Rose England and bus drivers Reta Jenkins, Zeldon Jenkins, Frances Payton, Rex Peeples, Kenneth Sweatt, Karen Case, Suzan Sweatt. Salaries were raised 6 percent across the board and in a few instances, brought in line with job descriptions.

Superintendent Rex Peeples also requested salary in-creases for the business manager and principal. He cited a schedule of average salaries for area personnel in the same positions that in-dicated that Groom's pay is below average. The board discussed the amount of raises given these positions in the past several years and the amounts by which they seemed out of balance. The business manager receives about \$10,000 below the average and the principal, \$3,000. Mr. Peeples added that the pay raises could be funded by the almost \$47,000 to be cut from the budget in the coming year by a reduction in staff.

The board voted to give a raise to the business manager in the amount of \$2,200. A pay raise for the principal was voted down 4-3 with Bill England, Hop Britten, Janice Weinheimer and Pat Weinheimer voting to defeat the measure.

Also rehired through the Borger ISD coop plan were speech therapist, Dejuana Rambo and Plan A resource aide Suzan Sweatt. Both received raises that Peeples explained the state controlled rather than the district.

Mrs. Joyce Hutsell gave board members an item per item review of all budget items stating that the payments were running on schedule and that she expects the school's finances to stay well below budget further improving the financial condition of the school going into the 1987-88 school year.

Transfer students were approved with four coming from Grandview-Hopkins and two from Clarendon.

Drug And Alcohol Seminar Unidentified Man Injured **Bring McLean Parents Out**

McLean residents turned out in force Monday night to take the first step toward dealing with the growing drug and alcohol problem in the town. A group of about 60 parents, friends and relatives met at the Lions Club building to hear from Diann Bosch, Program Director of the Adolescent Care Unit at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo and Kim Barlow, Coordinator of Tough Love, a self-help program for parents with problem children. The program was set up due to a recognition by parents that more and more young people in McLean are turning to drugs and alcohol for a 'solution" to their prob-

The meeting began with a talk from Mrs. Bosch who said. "Our kids turn to drugs because the United States is a drug-oriented culture. Our country con-

tains 5 percent of the world's population but we consume 60 percent of the world's illicit drugs. This doesn't include alcohol and prescription drugs.

She said that the average age for kids to start experimenting with drugs and alcohol is 10-12 although, she added, "I have known of five year old alcoholics."

Talking about how kids learn of drugs and alcohol, Mrs. Bosch said, "Television is a great babysitter, but it is also the primary means through which our children learn about substance abuse. We see commercials with young, macho men drinking beer and gorgeous women drinking wine coolers. The implication is that if you want to be one of the "beautiful people" and have a good time, you have to drink."

"Also," she added, "There are ads on all the time for pain killers. According to the TV, there is pain relief for everything and every part of the body

A second way to learn about drugs and alcohol is through parents. Says Mrs. Bosch: "The kids see their parents drinking socially while they entertain friends.

They seem to be having a good time. So when the parents are away, the kids try it too so they can have a good time. Or they see parents take a tranquilizer to calm down so they get the idea that if they take one maybe they will feel good

The final means of exposure is through siblings and peers. Mrs. Bosch said, "This is an especially strong source. Adolesence is an extremely painful time and kids just want to be accepted by those in their own age group. They are trying to fit in and establish themselves as somebody. They are also going through the experience of dating and sometimes face rejection. Drugs and alcohol, they think, take away some of the pain of growing up. When they try it once, and see that lightning isn't going to strike them, they turn to it again and again.

Citing some very dis-arbing statistics, Mrs. statistics, turbing statistics, Mrs. Bosch said that at least 1 out

of every 5 kids is usually deeply involved with substance abuse and 39 percent of all graduating seniors are problem drinkers. Once the abuse starts, it can lead to other problems such as change in friends, withdrawal from the family and irresponsible behavior. "Also," she said, "I have seen kids with a \$350 a day habit. In order to support it, they either have to deal, steal or prostitute themselves. The prostitution and the use of drugs that are injected can lead to all kinds of other problems such as

mission of AIDS and other diseases, some of which can affect a family for several generations through chromosome damage."

When asked how to get a community involved in facing the problem of drugs and alcohol, Mrs. Bosch says, CHANGE CONTRACTOR OF THE CONTR

"Usually, the only way is to get somebody killed. We have to realize that if we don't take the problem seriously now, then we don't have a future. We have a generation coming up that could be illiterate because of its drug and alcohol abuse. With no literacy, we can't have democracy. We can either ignore the problem or we can do something and try to make a difference. We can't pass the buck and say it's the school's responsibility. Everyone, parents, teachers, city representatives, the churches and the kids themselves have to get involved. We all have to be educated about the problem and we all have to take our share of the responsibility.

can be done.' Also speaking during the program was Kim Barlow, the Coordinator of Tough Love in Amarillo. Himself the parent of a problem teenager, Mr. Barlow said, "The only way to solve the problem is to get out and work. Only three percent of the parents at this meeting tonight will actually do some-thing about it. One of the things they can do is form a Tough Love group. This program is a self-help group for parents, not kids, and it helps them to work together to deal with a common problem."

That's the only way anything

"Tough Love," Barlow continued, "works on the principle that parents have responsibilities but they also have rights. They don't have to take all the blame for a child's problems. The kid has a choice also. Parents often feel guilty for punishing a child but we try to teach them that they have a right to expect certain things. We teach them to think in terms of privileges rather than punishment. In other words, the use of the car, phone, etc. are privi-leges. If a child carries out have these privileges, If he doesn't, he is not being punished, his privileges are simply being taken away.

Barlow added, "We also teach parents to form contracts with their children. If they don't meet the conditions of the contract they have to accept the consequences. We also explain to parents that they have to back up what they say. They can't talk to a child about punishment and then not back up their words with actions.

Mr. Barlow agreed with Mrs. Bosch that it is not the responsibility of a single group to deal with drug and

Last week was a busy one for McLean DPS officer John Holland and the McLean Ambulance Service as the area was plagued with a series of accidents.

The most serious occured very early Friday morning. At 2:05 a.m., Officer Holland received a call that a hitchhiker had been the victim of a hit and run accident about four miles east of McLean. He had been found lying alongside of the highway. His right arm had been severed below the elbow, both legs were broken and there were some minor internal injuries. He was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital where he is still unconscious and in very serious condition.

When found, he had no identification. The only item


found on him was a letter that was assumed to belong to him. Its writer said that they did not know where he was but were glad that they had received a postcard from him postmarked in Los Ang-

The victim is a male of American Indian or Spanish descent, approximately 5' 10" tall and weighing about 180 lbs. He has a medium to heavy build. He was wearing a bright blue vest, gray sweater, gray pants, gray Nike shoes and had a pair of folding sunglasses.

According to Officer Holland, the vehicle which hit the man left the scene of the accident. There was no evidence to suggest what kind of vehicle was involved. 
