The minutes of the July meeting were approved.

All motions wee unanimously approved unless otherwise stated.

City water item were-The survey shows that there is one good area with water in the southwest corner of the 80 acres where the Williams well is located. We are now just waiting for the grant process.

Sewer Plant item-The City had their meeting with TNRCC representatives, and Jon Voller. our engineer. TNRCC told them that what they needed was a detailed plan of action from our engineers before the deadline in January. They told them that they needed to see that we were being aggressive in handling this problem and not just ignoring it. This plan of action needed to state exactly what our steps were going to be towards getting the sewer plant back in conformance with their regulations. Our engineers assured TNRCC and the City that the plan of action would be taken care of.

West Nile Virus Found

On June 29, 2002, a horse was euthanized near Katy. Texas in far west Harris County because it was infected with the West Nile Virus. The Texas Department of Health is urging horse owners to take steps to protect their horses w from the disease.

A form of encephalitis or

'sleeping sickness," the West Nile Virus was first detected in Texas on the northwest side of Houston in two dead blue jays on June 18. Since that time, the disease has been found in twenty-nine birds.

West Nile Virus is spread by mosquitoes and poses a danger for birds, horses, and in some cases, humans. In three years, the disease has been responsible for the deaths of at least twenty people. The disease is spreading across the US faster than scientists expected and poses a growing risk

Dogs and cats appear to be resistant to the disease. Although there is no vaccine for humans, there is a vaccine for horses. Besides vaccinating your horses, watch for signs such as staggering, falling, or the inability to rise, sudden death, blistering around the animals lips, teats, or hooves. Look for unusual ticks or maggots. You should watch for dead birds.

If you are picking up a dead bird, wear gloves and wash your hands afterwards. Call the Texas Department of Health at 1-512-458-7255

The council said that they would have to think about this and try to draw up some guidelines on a policy, but that the policy would not be retroactive. This item will be put on next months agenda.

Doyle Lee entered the meeting at this time.

Motion was made by Joe Lamb to fill the vacant alderman position. Motion died for lack of a second. Motion was made by Jim McDonald and LaVon Watson. Voting against was Joe Lamb.

The council discussed the Ad-Valorem Tax Rate. The general consensus was to go with the rollback rate of 305590 per \$100.00 value. The property tax valuation is up this year, so the rate has gone down and the residents will not be paying higher taxes. There will be a special meeting on August 26th at 5:00 pm so that the council can adopt the tax rate.

The council voted to adopt Ordinance #285- the drought Contingency Plan that the City has to have on record in case of a drought. It was brought to the council's attention by the Mayor that the Water sewer and gas fund came up short last month and we had to transfer \$5,000,00 from

General Fund into the Water

wer and Gas Fund to be

able to pay the bills. He also informed the council that according to our bond, the City has to charge enough from the Water Sewer and

Gas dept. so that this department can be maintained properly and so that we can also pay our yearly bond payment. This year we are still \$13,500.00 short of having the bond payment.

Bob Martin explained a handout that he had drawn up comparing the different cities and their water and sewer rates. The average cost out of 15 cities around our size for water for 5000 gallons was \$14.07- our cost is \$10.25 The average cost for sewer for 5,000 was \$9.47- our cost \$6.00. He asked the council to take a look at these figures and this item would be placed on next months agenda

Doyle Lee had put blind intersections on the agenda. He stated that there were several corners in town that had trees or bushes on them and you could not see oncoming traffic.

The council decided that when the city employees noticed these blind intersections to report these to city Hall and letters would be sent to the owners of the property to ask them to clear

Doyle Lee also put the EMS on the agenda. He just wanted to give the council an update on how the EMS was doing. He said that financially the EMS was in better shape than they had been in years, but that they were extremely low in

personnel. Because this is a volunteer EMS, it is extremely hard to get people to help. The EMS desperately needs EMT's. At this point in time they only have 3 that go on runs and he said there was a

possibility that he would be leaving in December and there would be only 2 left and the Texas Dept. of Health will come in and pull the license off one of the ambulances. There has to be 4 EMT's per ambulance. If we do not get the volunteers to help run our ambulance service, the city would have to contract with an outside company that would cost the city an astronomical amount of money that would then have to be passed on to the residents to help pay for the service. If anyone would be interested in becoming an EMT please contact Doyle

West Texas Gas had given the City some figures if they wanted to lock in on a gas price for the winter, but the council decided to wait until next month and see if the prices go down a little bit more before they lock in

The council regretfully accepted Steve Bowlin's resignation at the Director of Public Works Steve is going to work for the City of Electra His last working day will be August 19th, the council expressed their appreciation to Steve on the job that he had done while here and that they had enjoyed working with him.

Lunches Need To Be Paid For In Advance

The 2002-2003 s year will begin next and the administration has announced that school meal will need to paid in advance. charge accounts will be allowed, although students who forget their money will be provided meals on an emergency basis.

Pre-pail meals can be purchased in the cafeteria on Monday and Tuesday mornings and can also be purchased in the school business office. Payment for on meal may be presented in the meals line.

This policy makes participation in the Federal Meal programs have been announced for the 2002-2003. The District participates in both the

breakfast and lunch programs. The entire range of income eligibility guidelines is published the week in The Groom News, reporting weekly, monthly, and annual income figures. monthly, and income figures.

income figures.

An example of eligibility would be: a family of four with a total income less than \$2,791.00 will qualify for reduced priced meals: if the income is less than \$1,961.00 the family will qualify for free meals. The income figures qualify Groom School students for participation in the program. Contact the business office for the price of free and reduced meals. the price of free and reduced meals. Nutritious meals are served each school day. The 2002students business students begins August 19, 2002 August 19, 2002 and ends on May 29, 2003. Children may buy lunch for \$1.75 and breakfast for \$0.75. These meals MUST BE purchased in advance. The school will

no longer maintain charge accounts and accounts receivable.

Any family now receiving TANF or food family stamps can re breakfast and lunch receive for its Groom School students. Persons qualify under the published income eligibility may also guidelines may also receive free meals.

Parents are encourage to consult the published guidelines to determine if the household is eligible to participate in the Federal program; a number of federal and state programs are fun on the number of free and reduced-price students in the District. Signing

up for the program insures the school of additional funding.

Special situations such as foster children or handicapped students are also covered under policy rules. rules.

Once an application once an application has been completed households have an obligation to advise the school of any change in household size or income.

Applications are under the direction of Joyce Hutsell, Business Hutsell, Business Manager of the School, and any questions should be directed to her at 806-248-7251. Families should also be advised on the status of the application on file.

The information used to determine eligibility for the meals programs is confidential and the confidentiality is protected determine eligibility by the application and meal record process.


