Groom Population Figures Released

Remember last April when we were all complaining about those "nosey" census forms we all filled out? Well, the preliminary results are in . . . and the news isn't good.

Groom's population has decreased by 124 people. The total in 1980 was 734, for 1990-610 people. What is really sad is that out of 297 houses in town, according to census figures, 44 are empty, that's roughly 13 percent. Now granted, some of those houses may not be in livable condition. Bill Homer, our local real estate agent, says that there are approximately 20 homes for sale at this time. In our own impromptu study we found 51 of these 253 inhabited homes had only one resident and approximately 50 percent of the homes are lived in by people of retirement age.

On group that is not letting this go by unnoticed is the Groom Economic Development Corporation. Once numbering 15 members, G.E.D.C. has had its own decrease in membership. Only four men are currently active.

The seemingly lack of interest has not dampened their enthusiasm. G.E.D.C. is continuing to seek new



businesses for Groom. For the second year they have belonged to S.P.S. Higher Ground, which reports on businesses that are interested in relocating and what kind of communities they are looking for. G.E.D.C. is also working with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission of Amarillo.

Economic development in Amarillo will get a hefty increase this year due to an additional one cent sales tax levied for this purpose. Approximately six million dollars is anticipated to be raised, half of which is expected to come from the

pockets of rural residents who shop in Amarillo. Groom can always hope that it will see some of those revenues return, in the form of overflow, from whatever Amarillo snares in the way of new residents.

G.E.D.C. has accomplished many things since its conception. President Bill Homer said, "What we need is people! People who have communication skills to stay in touch with companies looking to relocate and keep Groom on their minds. We need people with the time and ability to sell Groom."

Groom Tigers Beat Alamo Catholic In Season Opener

The Groom Tigers are off to a running start after their first game Friday night with Alamo Catholic Warriors. Fans were exuberant after seconds into the game Tigers scored.

Robert Miller, senior, had an outstanding evening scoring 4 touchdowns and kicking 5 extra points. He rushed for 223 yards and averaged 11.7 yards per play.

Brian Baker also did very well. Averaging 9.5 yards

per play for a total of 76 yards in all. He also scored 2 touchdowns and intercepted 1 pass.

Matt Fields was on the ball defensively and recovered 2 fumbles.

Bruce Britten made 2 passing attempts and completed with one.

All in all it was a very strong running game. Groom's rushing yardage was 329 compared to only 2 for Alamo. Groom's passing attempts were very weak gain of only 7 yards. The

Warriors clicked off 75 in their passing game.

Enthusiasm was very high after the half even though an unexpected shower cleared the stands for awhile. The game was called minutes into the third quarter because of the 45 point spread rule. Final score was Groom 52, Alamo 6.

Other teams in Groom's District that won Friday were Lefors, McLean and Miami. Tigers will face Patton Springs here Sept. 14th at 7:00 p.m.

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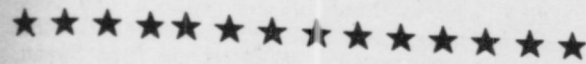
Commander

PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT
OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

Texans that buckling up is vital, both for military people on the move and for those of us who remain at home. "Many people don't realize that traffic accidents have resulted in more loss of life than all the wars in United State history," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokes-

person for the coalition. "Each year, approximately 45,000 people die on our nation's streets and highways. In ninety years of automotive history, we've lost a total of 2.8 million lives. A majority of them were young lives. Many were children. The real tragedy is that almost half of these deaths could have

been prevented through the proper use of safety belts and child safety seats."

NOTES & TALES From OLD ROUTE 66 by D. Trew

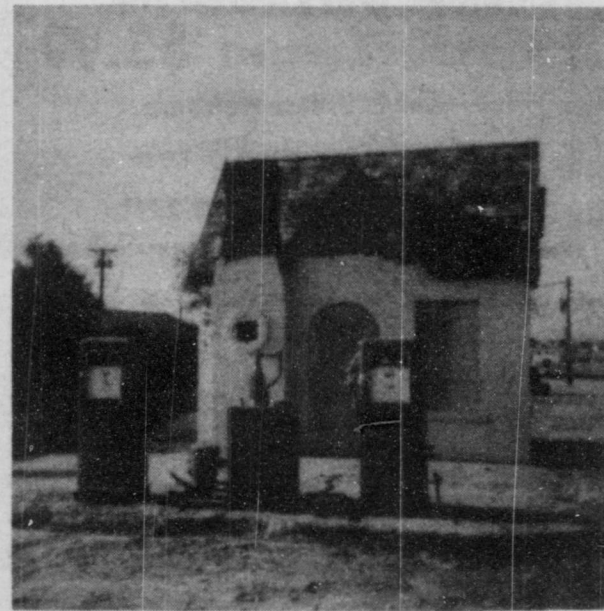
Old Route 66 was born in 1926 with a law passed by the Congress. Construction started in 1927 and many people say it never stopped until Rt. 66 was changed to I-40. Between politics, competition for the actual route and road equipment yet to be invented, it was truly a miracle that it was ever finished. Many of the right-of-way procedures of today started with Old 66. Equipment was developed as a result of this experience and maintenance departments were created because of Old 66, so it has a very important place in our history.

Many people did not know how to drive. Even though cars had been around for awhile, the majority of the people could not convert from teams and wagons over to the "dat-blamed" jalopy, as they called it. One lady near Groom tells of her grandfather, whom we won't

name, never quit yelling "whoa," every time he stepped on the brake. At first he had to take the back out of his garage because he kept running through it every time he drove in it. That could have been the first carport, who knows? The late Mrs. Ida Garrett spent every summer as a young woman driving families on vacations. They had a car, but were afraid to drive.

Bill Stubbs of McLean, tells about his grandfather, F. R. McCracken, and wife Maude who lived in Alanreed. Although he drove, he never did learn to drive very well. He was teaching Maude how to drive and she was having trouble staying in the road. He got her out on Old 66, in about 1934, and told her just to straddle that stripe in the middle of the road and she wouldn't have any trouble going straight. I'll bet that led to some interesting meetings along Old 66. I think I met one like her myself once.

Old Route 66 Landmark Station Being Renovated Back To 1930 Style



Texas Historical Site...

Renovation work began Saturday on the old Phillips 66 gas station that has stood on the corner of First and Gray Streets in McLean for more than 60 years. The tiny brick structure once served Old Route 66 customers.

The 9-by-13 building is being restored as a "video viewable" site, said Delbert Trew, a member of the McLean Chapter of the Texas Old Route 66 Association of Texas said.

"The building is already used as a photographic site by tourists," said Ruth Magee, McLean chapter member. "People traveling through like to take pictures on historic route 66 sites."

Workers began renovation on the station at 9 a.m. Saturday, Trew said.

"We are going to restore it back to the 1930s era," he said.

Trew said the building actually was built around 1925, but equipment earlier

than the 1930s is too expensive.

Most of the equipment has been given to us by local residents," Trew said. "Some of the items includes gas pumps and a drive-on grease rack."

The gas station is very nostalgic for many McLean residents, Trew said.

"Many residents are former employees," he said.

One McLean resident who worked at the station from 1933 to 1940 was S.A. Cousins.

"I was just out of college and very glad to have a job in 1933!" Cousins said.

Renovators were busy Saturday, Trew said, putting up the original sign post, painting and sealing the windows and doors.

We hope by sealing them it'll cut down on vandalism," he said.

Trew said half of the restoration work was completed on Saturday,

including re-roofing the station.

The McLean Chapter of the Texas Old Route 66 Association brought the day to an end with a watermelon feed in the nearby parking lot of the United Methodist Church.

Trew said the reason the group is hurrying to complete restoration on the station is the fact that it's one of five McLean checkpoints for hundreds of vehicles participating in the Elk City, Okla., Classic Car Cruise and Poker Run scheduled for September 15.

Trew said part of the cars will travel 66 miles west from Elk City on Old Route 66 while the rest will drive 66 miles east, McLean, Trew said, is the turnaround point for the cars traveling west.

"The newly renovated station will be nice stop for drivers to get a glass of lemonade," he said.

Trew said the station will be the first site in the state to be recognized by the Old Route 66 Association of Texas as a historic spot on Old Route 66.

"We are also going to apply for a Texas Historical Marker," Trew said.





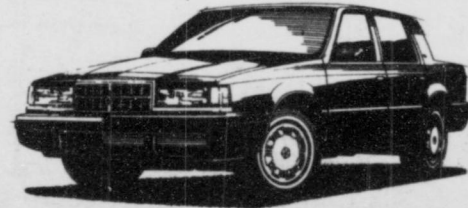
