Sims Sworn In

On December 15th, 1994, Randall C. Sims of Wellington was sworn into office as District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District. The ceremony was held in the courtroom of the Seventh Court of Appeals with Chief Justice Charles Reynolds administering the oath of office.

"Chief Justice Reynolds has previously served as District Judge of the 100th Judicial District and is a highly respected member of the judiciary across this state. I consider myself

most fortunate to have had him administer to me the oaths as an attorney, assistant county attorney, assistant district attorney, and now as district attorney," Sims said.

Sims won the Democratic Primary in March of this year and was unopposed in the general election held in November. Since the election was to fill the unexpired term for district attorney, Sims could take over before the first of the year.

As District Attorney,
Sims will be responsible for
the prosecution of felony
offenses in Carson,
Childress, Collingsworth,
Donley and Hall counties.

There will be satellite offices in each of the county courthouses as they do their weekly rotation throughout the district.

Top News Story Named For 1994: Ten Resign From Groom School

With 1994 taking it's place in the pages of history, 1995 begins full of promise like a sunny new day.

The world reflects on the events that made 1994 a year to remember. While Groom had no "O.J. Simpson case", Flood, Famine or Pestilent; everyone marks the passing of a year by their own personal triumphs and tragedies.

The top story of the year has to be the one that caused the biggest sensation. That was the resignation of ten Groom ISD employees including the top a dministrators, Superintendent Kenneth Sweatt and Principal Judy Babcock, and the entire coaching staff except for Shirley Fields.

While staffing problems at Groom ISD were quickly solved, the school remained in the news, as students continued to excel at many activities.

Groom was named one of the top 6 schools in the state according to ACT scores.

Elementary students win

the District UIL meet and senior Andrea Payton qualifies for state in the Poetry Contest.

Stacy Fields and Stanley Homer both qualified for the State Piano Competition, with Fields bringing home the Silver Medal.

In May sixteen students graduated from Groom High School.

The Tigers football team played their first 11-man football game in many years, and came away with a win.

Groom Tigers and Tigerettes basketball teams both qualified for regional only to be beaten by the Nazareth teams. The Ettes are on their way to a District Championship as 1995 gets underway.

Groom FFA and 4-H students dominated the Carson County Stock Show. Scott McLaughlin and Melody Burton take top honors winning Grand Champion Heifer and Steer respectively. Amanda Martin and Kori Brown each won Reserve Grand in the pig and heifer show.

The Varsity and Jr. High

boys win the District Track Meet held in Groom annually.

On the local political scene, new Mayor, Greg Lamb takes over from outgoing Mayor Jimmy Britten.

Jeannie Cunningham and Linda Orr face runoff election for the county treasurer position while Randall Sims and James Shelton battle for the District Attorney's office.

The City of Groom raised taxes 3¢ the legal limit without a roll back election.

New Dialing Requirements

Beginning January 3, 1995, long-distance calls originating and completing in area codes 806 and 955 must include the area code ("0" or "1" + the area code number + the seven-digit directory number.)

"Within the 806 and 915 area codes, there continues to be a growing demand for telephone lines," according to Hardy E. White, GTE's general manager-customer

operations, Western division.
"This expanding need from population growth, economic progress and new technology - cellular telephones, fax machines, paging service, computer modems and others - has required a change in dialing procedures for long-distance calls within these area codes."

Sidewalks And Curbs Will Soon Meet ADA

Requirements
The Texas Department of
Transportation's (TxDOT's)
Pampa Area Office is
making it easier for
wheelchair users to get
around in Carson County.
Sidewalks and curts are
being modified to meet
"Americans with Disabilities
Act" (ADA) requirements.

The Texas Highway Commission awarded the Pampa Area contract to Keystone Construction, Inc. of Austin. The project will cost an estimated \$140,000.

Contractors will modify the sidewalks or curbs at more than five locations in Groom. Work consists of replacing concrete curbs and sidewalks with concrete amps. Keystone Construction will also midify sites in Pampa, Mccan, Panhandle, White Deer, Higgins, Canadian and Miami.

"The Texas Department of Transportation knows pedestrian traffic is just as important as vehicle traffic," says Pampa Area Engineer Jerry Raines. "This project ensures every pedestrian can cross our state highways safely and easily."

The ADA contract is just one way TxDOT is meeting its mission to provide safe, effective, and efficient movement of people and goods.



Small Towns Get Tax Rebates

January, even the smallest Texas communities will receive rebates of local sales tax revenues on a monthly basis, just as larger cities do," State Comptroller John

Sharp announced recently. "The change affects more than 100 cities, from Aquilla to Yantis, whose local sales tax may generate only a couple of hundred dollars a month - or less. In the past, we have sent those cities sales tax rebates on a quarterly basis, or when their sales tax collections reached \$500 - whichever occurred first," Sharp said.

"Due to advances in technology, we now transfer sales tax rebates electronically to almost every community in Texas.

AUSTIN - "Starting in Direct deposit eliminates the cost of issuing a paper check," Sharp said.

We've been working hard for the last few years to make this change. We never liked having to hold a town's sales tax revenue until it reached a certain amount of money. That money belongs to the local community, no matter how much or how little it is," Sharp said.

Local merchants collect state and local sales taxes on all taxable purchases and send the money to the State Comptroller. The deposits the state's share in the Treasury and returns the local revenue to the cities.
