"We have been getting our sand trucks and snow plows ready, said Supervisor John McConnell.

The workers have been on standby, but luckily the storm did not arrive in the wee hours expected. Wea 90 Weather service predictions are guessing anywhere from 8 to 12 inches for this storm. The last storm that hit on Christmas day dumped around 20 inches of snow on the area.

The way much wind. wind is blowing this storm may today, pose more problems for us."






