Disaster Assistance For Drought Stricken Farmers

Clinton President announced that disaster assistance will be available throughout Texas for agriculture producers suffering losses because of this summer's drought. Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman has designated the entire State of Texas as a disaster area due to drought and excessive heat.

The drought has damaged most Texas crops to the extent that many fields may not be worth harvesting. Many areas of Texas have received less than a third of their normal annual rainfall, and soil conditions in the entire state are classified as "severely dry."

The National Weather Service predicts a high probability of continued drought throughout the rest of the 1998 growing season.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes available low-interest loans to eligible farmers who have suffered a loss of 30 percent or more on any single crop. Qualifying producers must creditworthy, unable to obtain credit elsewhere, and have adequate collateral to secure the

FSA authorized emergency having and grazing of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acreage in counties with significant losses in hay and pasture production. Producers cannot both hay and graze the same CRP land.

Farmers and ranchers who have suffered damages are encouraged to contact their local USDA Service Centers or FSA county offices for further information. These are listed in telephone books under "U.S. Government, Department of Agriculture."

Tobacco Law Suit Benefits Gray Co. In Settlement

Gray County approximately \$423,283.00 from the state's settlement with the tobacco industry according to preliminary estimates released by House Speaker Pete Laney's office.

State officials and the industry wound up their negotiations last week with the tobacco companies agreeing to pay Texas \$17.6 billion over a 26-year period. The settlement is more than \$2 billion higher than the industry originally said it would

pay the state.
"The trust account will provide a substantial, perpetual source revenue to help offset the cost of providing health care," Laney said. "This approach to managing the funds will ensure that the payments we receive now provide lasting benefits for future Texans."



County Reviews Unexpected Costs Caused By Inmates

Carson County Commissioners' Court met on July 27, 1998 with all members present. Minutes were read and

approved.

The court approved the replacement of a buried communication line by G.T.E. The installation will be south of the intersection of highway 60 and country road L.

The court reviewed budget requests from various county offices and discussed the '98-'99 fiscal year budget. The proposed budget will be prepared and filed in the clerk's office and a hearing will be held in the next few weeks to act on the budget.

Roselius informed the court that there had been

unexpected costs the last few months with medical expense of jail inmates and the replacement of the heating and air conditioning unit at the Library in Panhandle. Because of these costs, budgeted amounts in other areas of the '97-'98 budget will not be utilized. Judge Roselius said, "With two months left in the present fiscal year, it looks like we will be under the amount budgeted by the court for fiscal year '97-'98."

The court reviewed information from received Jim Allison, Council for the Texas Association of Counties, concerning county tobacco claims. Mr. Allison reported that an agreement in principle had been reached which


