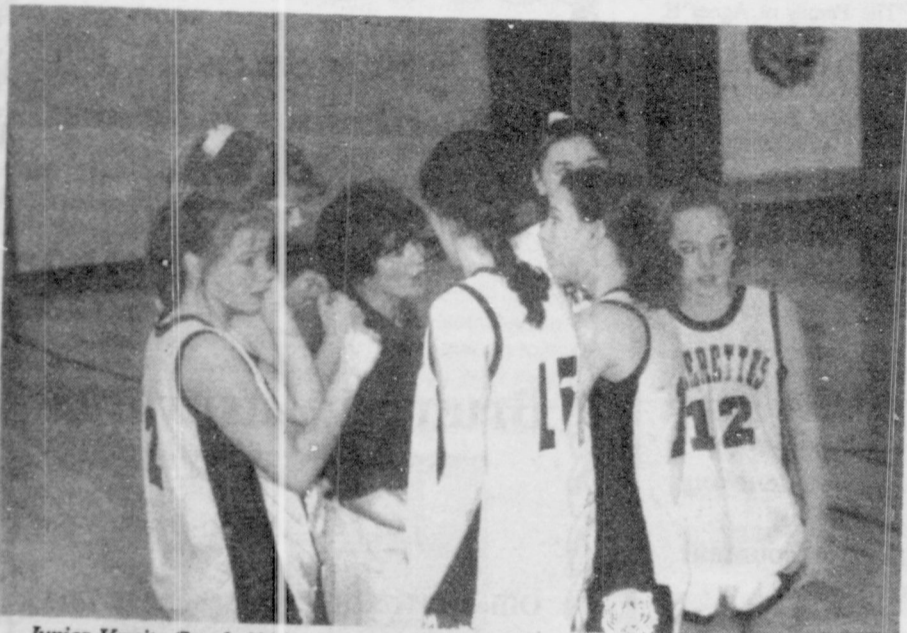

Cagers Play Games During Holiday Vacation

Groom cagers interrupted their holiday vacation to play a little "roundball."

The Tigers and Ettes faced off with Memphis on December 30th.

Both games were extremely close. The Tigerettes beat the Lady Cyclones 66 to 59. Jessica Friemel took top honors in scoring with 18 points.

Angie Conrad added 11, Jessica Stapp 10, Mary Hutsell 9, Julie Richardson 6 and Melissa Anthony 5. Christy Galvan, Karen Conrad and Tami Ashford each added 2 points, while Sara Britten had 1.

The Tigers were also victorious beating the Cyclones by three points, 64-61. Josh Evenson led the scoring with 17 points. Brad Sustaire had 16, Daniel Treadwell 14, Trae Kepley 5, Joe Britten and Justin Ritter each added 4, Toby Burgin 3 and Jimmy Chavedo 1.

On Friday, January 3 the teams played Clarendon. The Ettes lost by 9 points 52-61. High point was Mary Hutsell with 14. Jessica Stapp had 8, Karen Conrad had 7, Angie Conrad had 6, Sara Britten had 4, Stephanie Ollinger

and Melissa Anthony each had 3, Julie Richardson, Martie Phillips and Jessica Friemel added 2 points each and Tami Ashford had 1 point.

The boys ran into some difficulty with the Clarendon Broncos, losing 52-76. Brad Sustaire was high point with 14. Trae Kepley had 7, Justin Ritter 6, Toby Burgin and Josh Evenson each scored 5; Marcus Miller and Jimmy Chavedo each had 4, Daniel Treadwell 3, Todd Gray and Joe Britten each scored 2 points.

Justin Ritter To Play In All-America Bowl

Justin Ritter has probably heard all about how the South all-stars rallied to claim a 60-38 win over the North last year in the inaugural All-Americas Bowl. Now, he'll get a chance to see if he can help history repeat itself.

The Groom High School standout is one of 24 athletes invited to play on the South squad in the 1997 All-Americas Bowl. The game, which brings together 48 of the world's top six-man football athletes every summer in the football mad state of Texas, is scheduled to be played at 6 p.m. on July 19, 1997 at Abilene Christian University. Players from throughout the United States and the Canadian province of Saskatchewan are slated to play a group of Texas all-stars in the game, which is being sponsored by Six-Man Illustrated, Inc.

"We are delighted to be able to invite Justin to play in the All-Americas Bowl," said SI publisher Joe M. Nash. "We set out to put together the best roster we could, and we feel he can be a big part of that team if he chooses to participate."

As a safety and running back, Justin's statistics speak for themselves as to why

this local young athlete was selected for the team. He netted a whopping 2,315 yards rushing on 219 carries for 43 touchdowns. He passed twice for one completion of 15 yards and a touchdown. Ritter received 12 catches, gaining 215 yards for five touchdowns.

Performing 92 solo tackles and 73 assisted tackles, he earned 165 total. Ritter also had five interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

Make no mistake, there is plenty of talent on hand for the North team, which will be coached by Melrose, New Mexico's Dale Means and Hildreth, Nebraska's John Poppert. Players on the North roster will be from Saskatchewan, New Mexico, Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas, Arizona and Montana.

"We feel these are some of the best six-man athletes there are," said Tommy Wells, who, along with Nash, publishes North America's only six-man football magazine. "I think people will be really surprised when they see the talent and abilities these athletes have." Last season, armed with the presence of



former Bjorkdale standouts Pat Clarke and Blair Currey, the North team led through the first three quarters of the game before finally settling for a 60-38 loss on a rain-soaked field in Ranger, Texas.

Some of the top players invited to the game include record-setting quarterback John Estes IV. This past season, the former Abilene (TX.) Christian High School standout passed for over 4,000 yards and became six-man football's all-time

Sister Of Local Woman Passes Away

G. Irene Franklin Smith

G. Irene Franklin Smith, 90, of Pampa, died Monday, Dec. 30, 1996, at Spearman. Services were under the direction of Carmichael-Whitely Funeral Directors of Pampa.

Mrs. Smith was born May 11, 1906, on the Waggoner Ranch near Groom, the granddaughter of early Gray County pioneer Alexander Schafer. She graduated with honors from Amarillo College with a degree in business. She married Irl Marvin Smith in 1935; he died in 1994. She had been a Pampa resident since 1933. She worked as a bookkeeper for Culbertson-Smalling Chevrolet and later owned and operated Smith Studio with her husband from 1936-94.

She held various offices in Panhandle Photographers Guild and was a member of Texas Professional Photographers Association. In 1970, on the group's 50th anniversary, she became the second woman to serve as president of the Southwestern Professional

Photographers Association. She studied photographic oil painting under various artists and was a founding member of American Photographic Artisans Guild, serving as national president of APAG in 1978 prior to being presented an honorary degree in 1991 and a Distinguished Service Award in 1993.

She was a life member of Professional Photographers of America, and, in 1991, she and her husband were the recipients of the P.P.A. Directors' Award. The Smiths were also among the first in Texas to have lifetime membership in Oklahoma Professional Photographers Association bestowed upon them. Mrs. Smith was among the first graduates of advanced portrait classes at P.P.A.'s Winona School of Photography and received a P.P.A. Craftsman degree in 1977 for a combination of service, convention programs and exhibition print awards.

She was a member of First United Methodist

Church, where she sang in the church choir, taught Sunday School and was active in Wesleyan Service Guild. She was also a member of Altrusa International of Pampa, helping establish Career Day programs at Pampa High School and serving in various local offices.

Survivors include a daughter and son-in-law, Rochelle and Calvin Lacy of Pampa; a son, Dwayne Smith of Spearman; three sisters, Hazel Butler of Pampa, Cleo Nix of Groom and Virgie Vance of Oklahoma City, Okla.; a brother, Orville Franklin of Pampa; three grandchildren, Gail Threet and Greg Wilkins, both of Lubbock, and Glenna Hastings of Austin; and five great-grandchildren.

The family requests memorials be to First United Methodist Church, Altrusa Club or International Photography Hall of Fame and Museum, Kirkpatrick Center, Oklahoma City, OK 73111.

The driver fell asleep and came across the center median into the westbound lanes backwards. The Buick struck a 1995 Ford Van driven by Dwight Russell of Amarillo in the drivers door. Both drivers were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital by Panhandle and Pantex Ambulances. Holtz received a citation for Failing to Drive in a Single Lane. I

would like to thank the Sheriff's Office and Groom Highway Department for traffic direction at the scene. That helps us a lot so we can investigate the accident and not have to worry about traffic direction.

The final New Year's Motorcade count was eighteen killed over the 48 hour counting period. Austin predicted 15 fatalities and once again we went over the count, as happened during Christmas.

So drive carefully, obey the speed laws and watch out for the other guy.

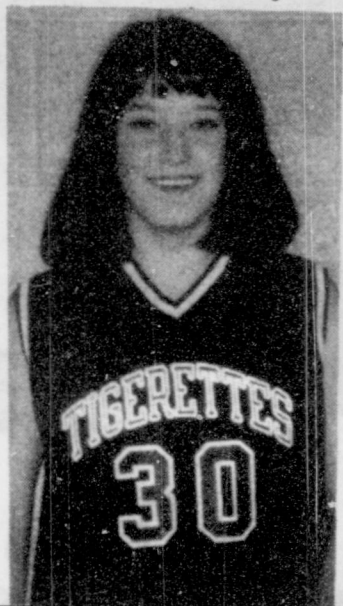

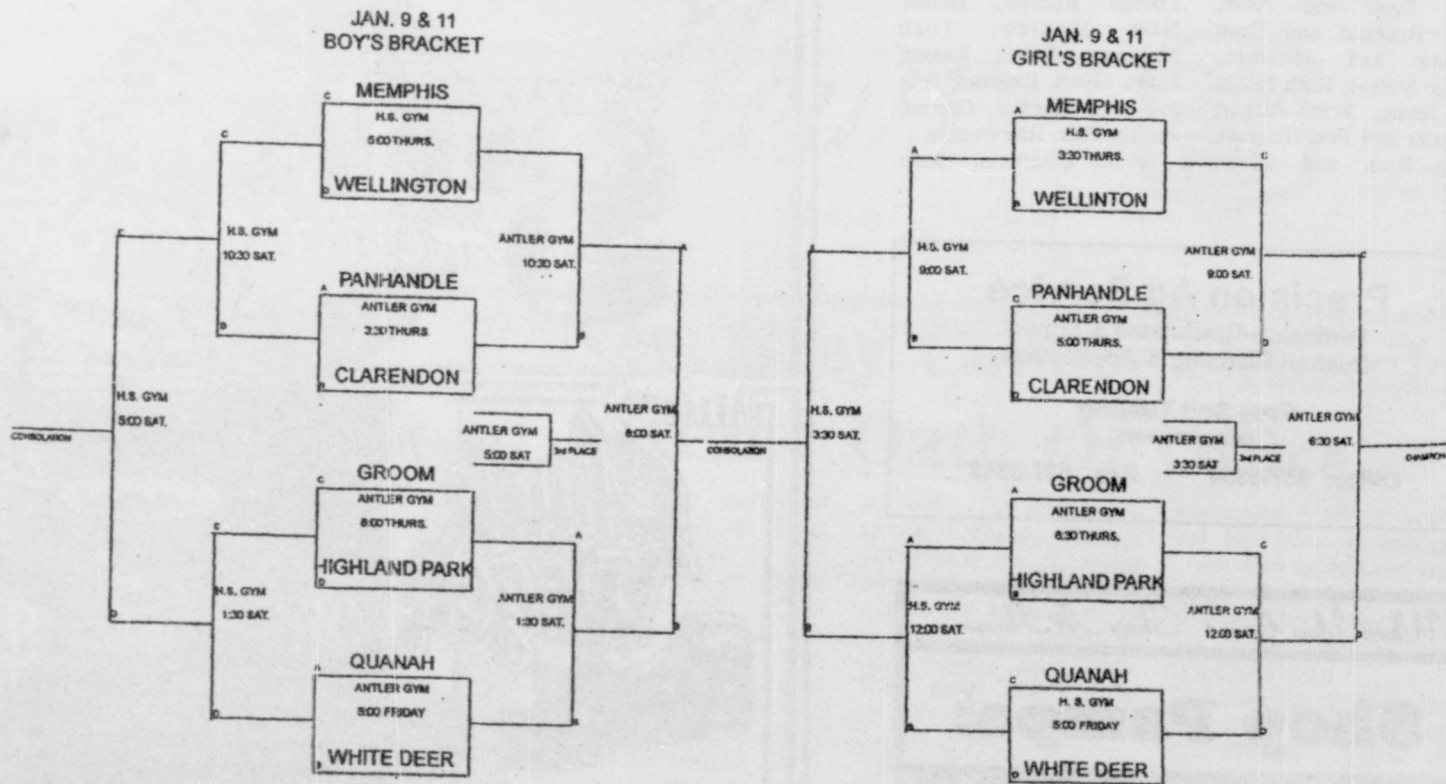

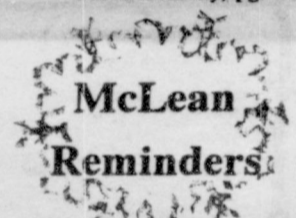
Davie Gipson's Recipe Featured In Green Thumb Cookbook



Orders Being Accepted For Trees

The Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District is still accepting orders for tree seedlings. These seedlings are offered at a nominal cost with the aim of the program being to protect cropland, feedlots, and buildings, and to control erosion and enhance wildlife.

Several species are available. Potted conifers offered include Afghan Pine, Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Eastern Red Cedar, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Colorado Blue Spruce, White Pine, Scotch Pine and Pinon Pine.

Several species of bareroot hardwoods are also available including Aromatic Sumac, Catalpa, Desert Willow, Green Ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Honeysuckle, Mulberry, Nanking Cherry, Russian Olive, Shumard Oak, Ash, Caragana, Cotoneaster, European Sage, Golden Willow, Hybrid Cottonwood, Lacebark Elm, Lilac, Lombardy Poplar, Native Plum, Sand Cherry, Siberian Elm and Flameleaf Sumac.

Wildlife Packets are also available. The packets include 25 seedlings each of 4 different species, and are designed to enhance quail and pheasant, turkey, deer, and squirrel populations.

The trees will arrive at the District Office at the end of March. District representatives suggest that tree orders be placed early as many species sell out very quickly. The deadline for ordering the trees is March 12. Anyone interested may obtain an order form at the Gray Co. SWCD Office located in the Gray Co. Courthouse Annex on East Frederic (Highway 60), or by calling the District Office at 665-1751.
