fund into a deficit. In addition to this, another \$10 million is needed to pay for other disasters in the remaining nine months of the fiscal year.
So read a news release dated September 26, 1989 and received by The Groom News the following week. A telephone call to The Groom News on Teeeday, October 17, said Carter County's goal in that campaign is $\$ 55.00$. Thates reyht -- only S55.00. "Surely we will have no difficulty meeting that goal," the editor told the Red Cross representative. Four hours after that telephone conversation, a killer earthquake hit Callifornia in the San Franclsco area. Immediately, the American Red Cross was called Into action clear across the country from the hurricanestricken area, caring not that the new fund campalgn was Just starting.
No new Information has been recelved by The Groom News concerning how much

higher the Carson County goal will be, but common sense makes it quickly understood that it will increase considerabie. Can it be met? The Groom News staif believes it can -. quick$y$ and easily.
Prior to the earthquake Cross Chairman George F Cross Chairman George F. flat-out that by can state lat-out that by meeting cose current commitments, fund entire disaster relief fund and reserves will be exhausted. In fact, we'll be in a substantial deficit position."
After the earthquake, the "substantial deficity" became more acute.
As the single nongovernment rellef agency chartered by Congress to provide disaster assistance to all Americans, the Red Cross rellies totally on the generosity of the American people at times like this. bor helping neighbor, we urge Americans to support
he Red Cross by donating whatever they can afford to the disaster relief fund," said Moody.
Carson County Red Cross operations are handled through the County Judge's Office. Judge Roselius sald that a check to cover the county's $\$ 55.00$ goal has already been sent from the funds on hand and that other donations will be sent to the respective relief areas as they are received.
"If our people want thelr money sent to a specific area Hugo or San Francisco they should Indicate that by a notation in the bottom lefi comer of their checks," Rosellus said. "That way we will know exactly where to send them. Checks not designated will be put into the general fund and divided equally between the hurricane and earthquake areas."
