





#### Q & A: Bond Issue Election

The following is a muestion and answer question session with John Wilson, Superintendent concerning the issue:

What is a school Q:

bond? A: School bonds can compared borrowing money to buy a house. Unlike when a house. Unlike when citizens borrow money however, when a school district borrows, it issues tax-exempt bonds. These bonds pay interest to the lender. Bonds issued by lender. Bonds issued by Texas school districts are eligible for the Permanent School Fund Guarantee, which insures payment of the principal and interest to the bond holder, resulting in lower interest rates.
bonds will be sold These competitive sale where potential purchasers bid to see who will offer the

lowest rates to the school. Texas law requires that the voters approve the issuance of school bonds. The board then decides the details of when to issue bonds, the terms and conditions of the sale.

Q: If passed, what will cost the taxpayers? Give an example such as the cost per year on a

home valued at \$40,000.

A: The exact amount of cost to taxpayers is

dependent on the amount of the bonds sold, the of the bonds sold, the interest rates at the time bonds are sold, and the eligibility of the district for help form the state Instructional Facilities Instructional Facilities
Allotment. Given current rates and a full sale of the bonds, the total cost of the repayment would vary from \$48,000 to \$64,000 per year for seventeen years. The total repayment could total repayment could vary from \$800,000 to

\$1,000,000. This would result in an Interest and Sinking tax of \$.10 to \$.13 per hundred dollars value

A \$40,000 home has a homestead exemption of \$15,000, resulting in a taxable value of \$25,000. This would result in an additional tax of between \$25 and \$30 per year, or \$2.00 to \$2.50 per month.

A: As in any kind of loan, the school would get the entire amount at

the sale of the bonds and would be able to use the money immediately. repayment would be for

Q: Do any kind of exemptions apply to the bond, such as "homestead" or "over "over 65?"

A: exemption of \$15,000 is applied to all residences the district which are the primary residence of the owner.

the "Over 65" On exemption, a person who applies for and receives this exemption will have their tax bill frozen. No new taxes can be applied to their tax bill they make major improvements to their homestead.

Q: What kinds of things will this money be used for and is the board mandated to spend it only on certain types of

The money from A: bond sales must be ed for capital uisition. This may used acquisition. include renovations, new construction, or equipment. In our case the bonds will be used in part to pay for heating, air conditioning, electrical work, as well as new renovations and equipment. The board is currently planning on renovations for the science lab and a new distance learning lab.

The board does, however, have the authority to use the money for capital

Q: What would happen if this money were not enough? Would the board have the ability to ask for another bond election? If so, how many years down the road?

A: The board plans to only spend on capital projects the amount of the bond sale. The board may ask the voters for another bond election at any time. The school has no plans for further facilities improvements at this time, and it is hoped that the improvements from these bond funds

from these bond runds will be adequate for a number of years.

Q; What would happen to the school if this measure is not passed?

A: If the bond sales

vere not accomplished, school the would continue to operate. The the fund balance that currently school would be used to fund whatever projects are necessary. This depletion of fund balance could the school eliminate some programs if state funding does not change in the coming years. Of course, trying to predict the future, especially in the area of school finance, is very difficult.

A: The people of the Groom community should be confident that they have elected a competent.
