

SPIN AL SCREENING SCHEDULE [Grades 5, 6, 7, 8, 9]

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that required all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescents years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents have some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection. Students who have a rapid period of growth after ninth grade can be referred by parents to the school nurse. Spinal screening for McLean ISD school children scheduled for October 8.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: Scoliosis and Kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. The condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected early. This year we will check all students in 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9

grades.
