Channing 10th. All schools in the top 10 were ranked in order of the final scores netted by each junior class. The state average score on the test was 53 percent for math, 46 percent reading, and 50 percent writing. Highland Park was the

Highland Park was the only large school to rank in the top ten. The student' teacher ratio for Highland Park is 15.8, the state average is 16.3. Most of the other top 10 finishers were small schools with a far lower number of students per teacher than the state per teacher than the state

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





#### Oil Production Down


The State Comptroller's office recently said that Texas oil wells have produced 51.1 million barrels less this past year than the year before.

This shows that the low price of oil isn't the only culprit working against the Texas economy and the Texas oil industry, Comptroller Bob Bullock said.

"The drop in production was worth \$772.1 million at current market prices," Bullock said. "So much attention on declining oil prices may have masked the fact that production in Texas has slipped by more than 140,000 a day."

He said tax records show that Texas wells were pro-ducing about 2.3 million taxable barrels of oil a day in mid-1985.

Production has dropped to slightly more than 2 taxable barrels a day by August of this year.



#### **Financial Focus**

By Tom Byrd Regardless of what security we select, it should meet our goals. One of the basic tenets of investing is that it should not be done on impulse. Know what you want before you buy. Then, determine if your selection will do for you what you want—in short, if it will meet your needs.

If, for example, you want your investment to give you your investment to give you income, then you must expect your choice to provide suitable dividends (stocks or equity investments) to meet your needs. In addition, you must be reasonably convinced that this income will be paid to your resularly and on time. this income will be paid to you regularly and on time.

Whether or not you get your income will depend on the ability of that particular corporation to meet its obligations. It is also is also

generally true that the higher your yield or return, the more risk you assume.
