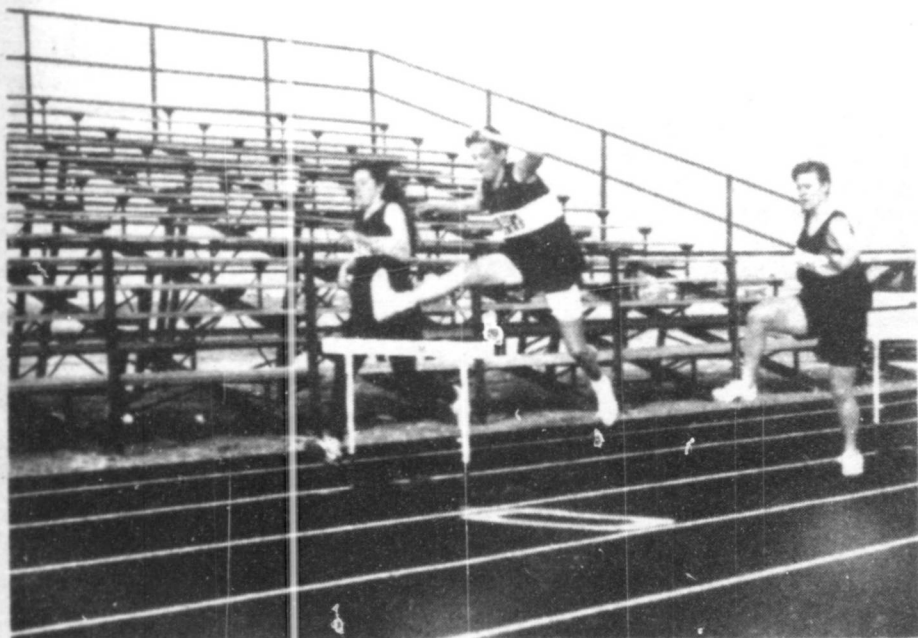

Tigers Capture First Place Saturday At Miami Relays

Groom Athletes continue to do great in area track meets. The Tigers and Ettes traveled to Miami last week to compete. The boys won their division handily with 167 points. The girls placed second with 152.5 points, just behind Miami who won with a score of 158.

Some of the big individual winners were: Matt Fields placing 2nd in the discus; Seth Ritter

placing 2nd in the pole vault; Shannon Miller placing 2nd in the shot; Bryan Crowell with 1st in the 800; Bo Burgin placed second on the 110 meter hurdles and the 300 hurdles; Paul McLaughlin placed 2nd in the 400.

The Tigers relay teams placed 1st in the 1600 and second in the 400 relay.

The Ettes had plenty to crow about although the 2nd place win was less than they hoped for.

Kay Case won the discus, Karen Babcock won the high jump and Sandie Conrad won the long jump, to give Groom three wins out of 5 field events.

Melanie Friemel placed 1st in the 3200 meter race and 2nd in the 300 meter hurdles.

The 800 relay team placed 1st and the 1600 meter relay team placed 2nd.

Grandview-Hopkins ISD

Voters To Fill Two Positions

Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District will have a full slate on May 1 for voters.

One newcomer and two incumbents are running for three vacant positions on the Grandview-Hopkins school board, said Kathy Davis, school board secretary.

The newcomer, John Mark Baggerman, 33, a Groom-area farmer, has filed for the May 1 election, along with incumbents Bill Ragsdale, 45, a Pampa-area farmer and business owner, and Melvin Wills, 52, a Groom-area farmer, Davis said.

Ragsdale, who has held his position on the school board for 12 years, is running for Place 1 in the election. Baggerman and Wills are running for Place 2 and Place 3, respectively.

The school board in February appointed Wills to his position as a replacement for Kelvin Ollinger. Ollinger resigned after seven years on the school board to move to Groom, Davis said.

The bid for the school board is the first candidacy for an elective office by Baggerman. A 1979 graduate of Groom High School, Baggerman is married to Lora S.

Baggerman and they have one child, 2-year-old Jessica. The couple is expecting another child.

"I just wanted to get involved in the community and see if we could help keep the school open for the children around so they wouldn't have to make such a long bus ride into Pampa," said Baggerman.

Grandview-Hopkins school board member Ronny Babcock, whose position expires May 1, has chosen not to seek re-election after 18 years on the board. Babcock, 46, is employed with the Austin law firm of Calame, Linebarger, and Graham.

CARSON COUNTY ANNOUNCES ADDITIONAL ROAD SIGNS

Carson County Commissioners met in regular session last week.

Judge Jay Roselius announced that additional road signs for the 911 county road marking project will be ready for installation in the next several weeks.

The court also discussed a \$51,438. increase in the budget for funding law enforcement, bonds, jury services, autopsies and the county extension program. No action was taken.

An update was provided on the payment on Lieu of Taxes program, by Judge Roselius.

A meeting between the Secretary of Energy Hazel O'Leary and the Nuclear Communities Working Group, of which Carson County is a member, will be held Thursday in Washington D.C., according to Roselius.

Representatives of Sen. Phil Gramm's, Sen. Bob Krueger's and Rep. Bill Sarpalius's offices have been notified and will attend the meeting, according to Roselius.

The next meeting of the Commissioners Court is set for 10 a.m. April 12 at the Carson County Courthouse.

Child Abuse Prevention Month—

Panhandle Father Charged With Son's Death

Child abuse is not just an inter-city problem according to Carson County Sheriff Loren Brand.

It is becoming more and more evident that it is a problem for Carson County as well.

Paul Yankon Taylor was accused of leaving his 5 month old son, Cary, home alone.

At the time his child may

have been dying the man was at a local convenience store talking to police about a relative in an unrelated incident.

Police Chief Ken Rogers stated that Taylor never mentioned that his child was home alone during the course of the conversation. That was between 8:25 pm and 8:45 pm.

At 9:13 a 911 call from

the Taylors home. Witnesses say that Taylor had been gone approximately 1-1½ hours.

The cause of death had not yet been determined. Police officials stated that there were no visible signs of abuse on the child's body.

Recent surveys show that at least 1 in 4 girls will be sexually abused before they reach the age of 18, while 1

in 6 boys will be abused. Authorities feel that that figure may be high since boys have a tendency to be hesitant in reporting such incidence.

In our own county, Sheriff Loren Brand said that violent crime is up about 75%. Included in this figure is a large number of abuse cases including sexual and physical abuse.

"I don't think there is actually more of this kind of abuse taking place," said Brand, "I just think people are beginning to see how important it is to report these incidence."

The Sheriff's Department has been able to build strong cases and gather sound evidence in these cases.

"Confidentiality for the victim is always a primary concern," said Sheriff Brand. "We, at the Sheriff's office really appreciate all the help we get. It's a traumatic event and by the time a child tells someone their deep dark secret, they should know that they are the victim and are not to blame."

He went on to say that there are many organizations the Department works with that can help both the victim and abuser.

"We would much rather provide preventive law enforcement than to be out arresting people. . . but we will do that if necessary," stated Brand.

Principal Judy Babcock said, "Most of the type of abuse we see is neglect."

It is the responsibility of every citizen to report suspected child abuse of any type. Common citizens often hesitate to get involved.

"Talk to someone you trust," advises Sheriff Brand. ". . . A law officer, teacher, or member of the clergy."

Child abuse whether physical, emotional, sexual or neglect is a chain reaction. Many times, the victim becomes the abuser. The chain can be broken. As, John Walsh; who has become one of the countries greatest child advocates after his son was murdered in a violent crime says, ". . . One person can make a difference."

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Fund raising for the



As The Interstate Turns ...

On Sunday, March 14th, 1993 Trooper Gary Davis arrested a Amarillo man on I-40 three miles west of Groom for Driving While License Suspended. The man's drivers license and license plates to his vehicle were seized and he was placed in the Carson County Jail.

On Wednesday, March 17th a Arizona City, Arizona man was arrested for Possession Of Marijuana less than two ounces after he was found with two marijuana cigarettes and a small plastic bag of marijuana. The man was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Phyllis Tyler and

placed in the Carson County Jail until he could post bond. Later that afternoon Trooper Gary Davis investigated an accident on I-40 ten miles east of Amarillo. A Oklahoma man lost control of his vehicle and landed in the barditch. The man was issued a citation for unsafe speed and released. No injuries were reported.

A favorite saying, "Three strikes, you're out," came true for a Amarillo man on Wednesday evening. The man was stopped by the Carson County Sheriff's Office for driving without any headlights on US 60 East of Panhandle. The man was told to leave his

vehicle in Panhandle until he could fix the headlights so he would not cause an accident. The man left and was the spotted by the Panhandle Chief of Police attempting to leave Panhandle with no headlights. The chief explained that he could not drive the vehicle without headlights during the hours of darkness. The man was later stopped on US 60 near Pantex for Driving Without Lights when required, Defective Headlamps, No Insurance, Speeding and Following To Closely. Trooper Davis was left with no alternative but to place the man in the Carson County Jail before he killed himself or someone else. The man was issued three citations and issued three warnings and could have been arrested for Disobeying A Lawful Order.

Corporal Roland McGill investigated an accident on a county road fifteen miles north of Panhandle off of TX 207. The Oklahoma City man was issued a citation for Unsafe Speed. No injuries were reported.

On Saturday, March 20th a McLean man was arrested for Driving While License Suspended. His drivers license and license plates were seized on I-40 one mile west of Conway. The man was released on his own recognizance.

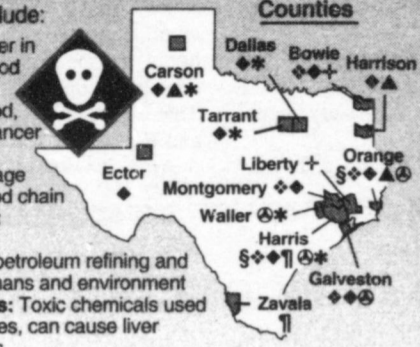

Hazardous waste sites get Superfunds

29 uncontrolled or abandoned hazardous waste sites in 13 Texas counties were designated to receive cleanup funds from the federal Superfund program as of Fall, 1992. The wastes that pollute air, soil and water include:

- § **Chlorinated hydrocarbons:** Linger in environment and accumulate in food chain, includes DDT, chlordane
- ◆ **Cresolates:** Used to preserve wood, may cause skin ulcerations and cancer
- ◆ **Heavy metals:** Includes mercury, chromium, arsenic and lead, damage living things and accumulate in food chain
- ▲ **Organic chemicals/compounds:** Includes benzene and toluene
- ¶ **Petrochemicals:** Produced from petroleum refining and fuel oil residues, often toxic to humans and environment
- ⊕ **PCBs, Polychlorinated biphenyls:** Toxic chemicals used in consumer products like adhesives, can cause liver damage and accumulate in tissues
- + **Polynuclear aromatic hydrocarbons:** Highly reactive organic compounds, can be carcinogenic
- * **Volatile organic compounds:** Potentially toxic chemicals used in consumer products (solvents, paints, fuels). Widespread use.

"Using our Customer Service Card system can benefit you and others. A Consumer Service Card is tracked by computer to help us ensure that you receive a response and a solution. The computer also allows us to consolidate information so we can identify problems that might effect other customers in our area."

The Postmaster says that every Post Office lobby has a supply of easy-to-use, postage-free Consumer

Service Cards, which are also available upon request from any letter carrier. If the response to your card does not satisfy your concern, the Post Office will provide the name and address of your district's Consumer Affairs Manager.

Or, you can write to the Vice President and Consumer Advocate of the Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza, Washington D C 20260-2200.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department is assisting the Panhandle Police Department with the investigation into the death of a 4-month old child at a Panhandle residence. One subject has been incarcerated after the initial investigation of this incident.

Sheriff's deputies are investigating an incident of telephone harassment in Groom and a case of theft and credit card abuse, also in Groom.

Deputies assisted with traffic control at various grass fires in the county and investigated reports of shots fired in the Fritch area and

reports of suspicious persons.

The Sheriff's Department recovered several items of stolen property in the Amarillo area after recovering notes left in the suspect's property which detailed where the stolen property was taken. The recovered items are from burglaries committed in Carson County last year. The suspects have previously been adjudicated and are currently serving sentences in the Texas Department of Corrections. The recovered property was released to the rightful owners.

Our department is investigating a report of assault which stemmed from an altercation at a local business. We are continuing investigations of several reports of probable child abuse/neglect in the county.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department located a suspect wanted for questioning in a federal investigation. The suspect was picked up in Conway and released to federal authorities.

Alanreed Residents Ask MISD To Keep Up Buildings

The Alanreed Community Improvement Committee met with McLean School Board officials in their regular meeting two weeks ago to issue a plea concerning the fate of the Alanreed School District building.

As you may recall, Gray County Commissioners voted in February that Alanreed should become part of the McLean School District. As a residual effect, that meant that all the Alanreed ISD property - i.e., buses, buildings and equipment becomes the property of the McLean School District.

The McLean Board had offered to lease the building to Alanreed for \$1 per year for 99 years.

Representatives of Alanreed felt that the cost of utilities, insurance and maintenance would be cost prohibitive for them.

Alanreed is not an incorporated town and has no way of raising funds by taxes.

The McLean School Board resolved to study the problem. Superintendent Stanley Lamb said in an interview this Monday morning that if the McLean School owns the buildings then they must be insured and maintained.

Billy Bob Adams, current superintendent of Alanreed ISD, said that a ballpark figure for insurance, utilities and maintenance "was not available."

Interested individuals may wish to attend the April 13 McLean School Board meeting when the matter will be discussed further.

In other business: The text-book committee was approved. Principal Charles Callum will chair the group.

Expressed disapproval for the proposed constitution amendment for school finance.

Approved \$2,782.00 athletic budget for Jerry Miller for the 93-94 school year. This is \$1,600.00 less than last year due to \$2500 expected donations from the McLean Athletic Booster Club.

Increased the supplement to teachers salaries with Masters Degrees from \$800 to \$1,500. There are five teachers in the district with Masters.

Developed a tentative "Dream List" of improvements such as a new bus per year, new high school lockers, new curtains to replace the 11 year old ones in the auditorium, construction of a new gym and tennis courts and paving the high school parking lot.

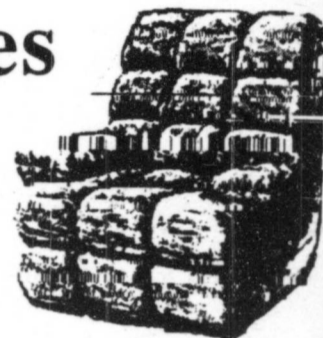
