By: Jerry Don Cook As you probably know, McLean ISD has recently completed the State accred itation monitoring process by staff members of the Texas Education Agency There are two areas of our daily class schedule that need to be changed..
The first area is the length of the school day for kinder garten through the third grade. Our buses arrive by 8:00 each morning to give students the opportunity to eat breakfast in the cafeteria and attend tutorials which are scheduled from 8:05 to 8:30 every day. The after-noon buses depart after 4:00 p.m. the main concern is that the young students were required to stay at school an extra hour waiting for the buses to run.
On November 20, at the beginning of the third six weeks grading period, we will reduce the length of the school day for all grades. Tutorials for grades one through twelve will be from \(8: 00\) to \(8: 25\) every day Regular classes for grades K through 8 will begin at \(8: 25\) Regular classes for grades 9 through 12 will begin at 8:30. Grades K through 8 will be dismissed at 3:20 and Grades 9 through 12 will be dismissed at 3:21. The buses will leave school between \(3: 25\) and \(3: 30\). The new dismissal times will require that grades 7 through 12 move from an eight period day to a seven period day.

The second problem with the present schedule is some classes in grades 6 through 12 have only boys or only girls enrolled. According to federal guidelines, Athletics is the only course that can be sex segregated. We must schedule classes so that both male and female students have an opportunity to be in the classes together, This rule includes physical edu

cation.
The new daily class schedule has been constructed so tha: no student will lose credit in any class in which the student is currently enrolled. Every attempt has been and will continue to be mate to implement these nee ded changes as smoothly as possible.
