Board Members Hire Girls Coach

Kindergarten teacher Pam Hutsell presented the 'Write to Read'' program for school board members at their meeting last Tuesday night. An innovative approach to teaching reading would incorporate the use of a computer lab into the curriculum of elementary students. Mrs. Hutsell stated she has used the method this year in kindergarten and has more students reading than ever before. Board members had no dicsussion and did not take any action on the







Terri received her certificate during an awards banquet held recently in Amarillo.









If you are having problems with dogs, your City does have traps that do not harm the animal and we will be most happy to bring these to your area on request.

Please help us to assure that our community is kept a safe place for our children to live.
