

In order to send packages by 'SAM' (if and when space is available on a plane) they should be mailed by November 22. If plane space is not available. the packages will be sent by

For 'PAL' mailings, which is surface rate plus \$1, the dead line is November 29.

Regular air mail deadline is between December 1-13 as the postmaster said this is ample time to assure the packages' arrival by Christmas time at an overseas base.

During the past 10 years, the Bailey County Junior Live-stock has grown from 75 exhibitors showing 161 animals and no budget, to 131 exhibitors showing 269 animals in 1969, and an overall budget of \$4,044. In the intervening years since 1959, an almost 100 percent increase in the size of the show has been noted.

For the 1970 show, 148 exhibitors are expected to show a total of 296 animals. This represents a 10 percent increase over the 1969 show.

A spokesman said, "The Bailey County Junior Livestock Show serves to challenge the interests and abilities of more Are Listed than 500 boys and girls active in 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters in 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters in the Muleshoe Area. Over 100 For Football of these youngsters actually entered the 1969 show, exhibiting animals which they had fed and cared for from four to 12 months.



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



The auditions were held on the campus of Oklahoma City University, a Methodist related college.


