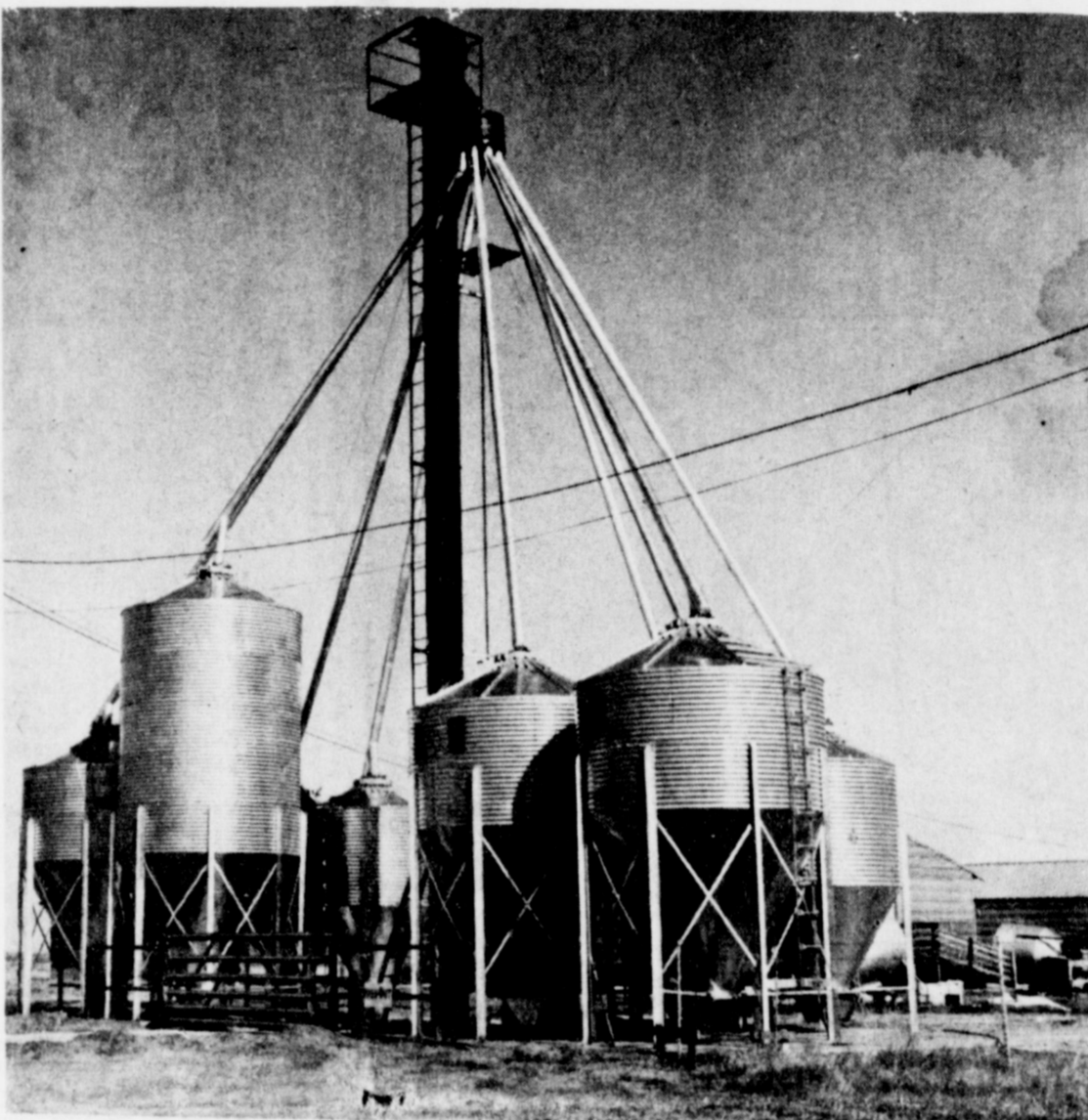
Next Friday, the Mules will meet Perryton for the final game of the year. Gametime will be 5 p.m. in Muleshoe's Benny Douglass stadium.

## Library Display Slated for Blind

To inform Texans about the many services available for the blind and physically handicapped, the Texas State Library is circulating ten compact displays to public libraries throughout the state.

The display will be featured in the Muleshoe Area Public Library from November 17 to November 29, according to Anne Camp, librarian.

The four panel display--hinged together to fold up into a compact unit for mailing--is constructed around the theme: "To Recreate Our Written Heritage."

Each 14-inch by 28-inch panel features the variety of reading materials in a choice of physical formats--pages from a braille and large print books; plus a magnetic tape book, a record and a photograph of one of the reading aids.

A colorful collage, attached to the top of the display by two wooden dowels, features a blind person seated in a chair, surrounded by a composite of our literacy heritage--a cowboy out of a Charles Siringo western; the indomitable fisherman from Ernest Hemingway's 'The Old Man and the Sea'; Moses presenting the Ten Commandments; a pirate from Mark Twain's 'A Yankee in King Arthur's Court'; a matador from Tom Lea's 'Brave Bulls'; and even one of Damon Runyon's picturesque characters.

In addition, titles of such popular magazines as Sports Illustrated, True, Look and Newsweek are featured in the collage. All of the materials are available in talking books, braille, large print, or magnetic tape books.

James V. Peeler, manager in Muleshoe for Southwestern Public Service Company, was presented a jeweled award for 35 years service Monday night in Plainview at the annual service awards dinner for Plains Division employees of the electric company.

Preliminary work began on April 7, and construction continued at a steady pace until completion recently. The new building has 15,000 square feet and includes sales area, parts storage and parts office, business offices and a much larger service department.

A and B Construction Company of Lubbock did the work on the steel building. Costing in excess of \$60,000, the new building has a volcanic rock trim front and has central heating and evaporative coolers. The front inside walls are paneled and the floors in the parts and office areas are of vinyl asbestos. The ceiling is acoustical tile and the doors in the service department are of fiberglass.

In order to send packages by 'SAM' (if and when space is available on a plane) they should be mailed by November 22. If plane space is not available, the packages will be sent by ship.

For 'PAL' mailings, which is surface rate plus \$1, the deadline is November 29. Regular air mail deadline is between December 1-13 as the postmaster said this is ample time to assure the packages' arrival by Christmas time at an overseas base.

Members of the Society set up a little red, white and blue booth in downtown Muleshoe. The front of the booth urges everyone to help 'our' boys win in Vietnam.

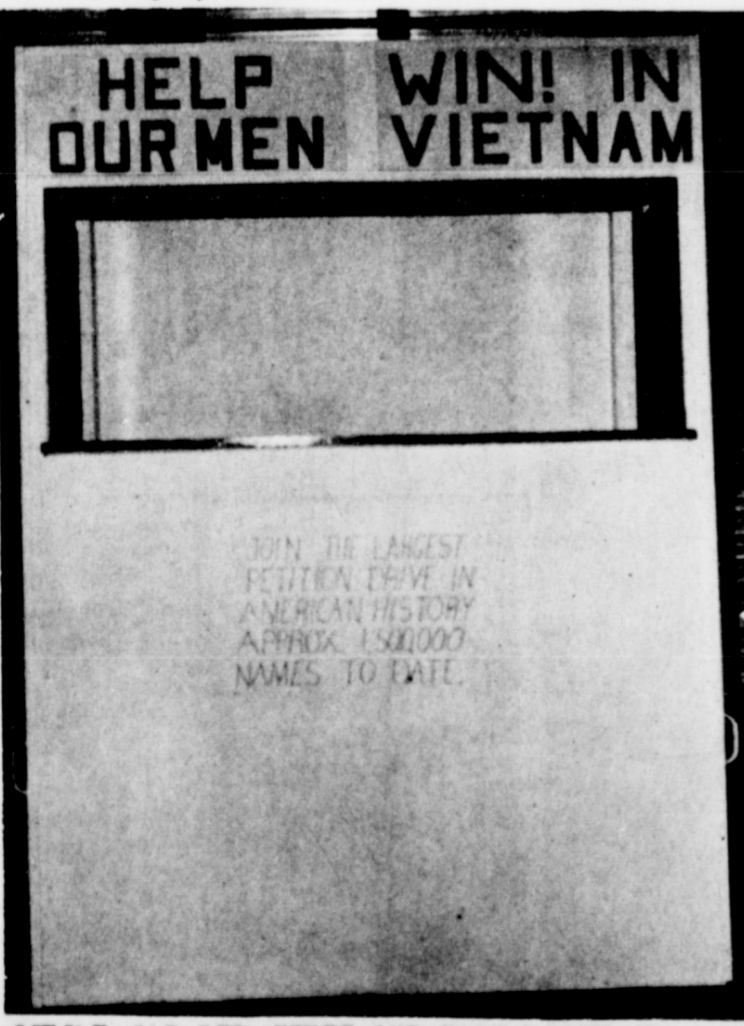
A spokesman for the Society said they are definitely opposing the Moratorium and one of the two purposes of the red, white and blue booth was to show support for the soldiers in Vietnam.

The other purpose of the booth was to obtain signatures on a petition designed to stop aid to Communist Satellites and Communist countries, which includes materials the Birchers say can be used for weaponry to kill American soldiers in Vietnam.

According to a speech of Hon. Glenard P. Lipscomb of California on Monday, Oct. 17, 1966, and made a part of the Congressional Record, flagrant shipments are being made to Communist Countries and Satellite Countries.

Representative Lipscomb said that among other countries, Russia had received airborne communications equipment: generators for electrical equipment used to control aircraft and hundreds of other items.

Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Bulgaria, Poland, Hungary, Yu-

 In addition, the display features a pocket for the State Library's brochure which provides detailed descriptions of the services offered by the Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped.  
 Designed by Robert Cisneros of Austin, the display utilizes the key artwork that was pre-

pared for a poster issued in the spring by the State Library. The four-color poster was created by the Central Texas artist, Charles Shaw, who was recently elected to the Society of Illustrators.

Currently, the Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped of Texas State Library, is serving 9,000 patrons, and it is believed that this concentrated information program which is now being launched will go far toward "spreading the word" to all of the approximately 110,000 eligible Texans who cannot read conventional printed materials because of physical limitations, said a spokesman for the program.

Located in the Texas Archives and Library Building in Austin, this division of Texas State Library is one of the national network of 42 Regional Libraries for the Blind

and Physically Handicapped sponsored by the Library of Congress.

Mrs. Camp said "I would like to urge everyone to come to the library when the display is set up Monday. Especially invited is anyone who has reading problems."







"It is known that as part of its trade arrangements with North Vietnam, Rumania supplies vehicles to the Hanoi regime. For the most part Communist vehicles are multi-purpose and can be used interchangeably for military and commercial purposes. Any vehicle sent therefore can be assumed to support Hanoi's military operations."

The local John Birch spokesman said that photostatic copies of the above Congressional Record report will be available for the public at the booth.

He said the effort to obtain signatures is a national coordinated effort and has been for more than a year. He added that to date more than a million and a half signatures have been presented to the members of Congress. Adding that several signatures had been obtained locally during the year,

The auditions were held on the campus of Oklahoma City University, a Methodist related college.

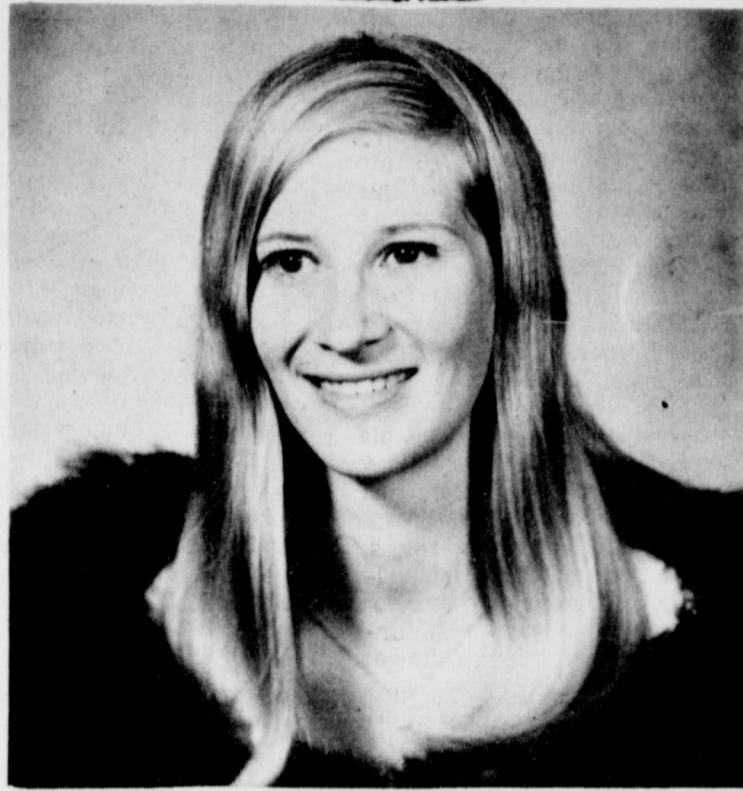

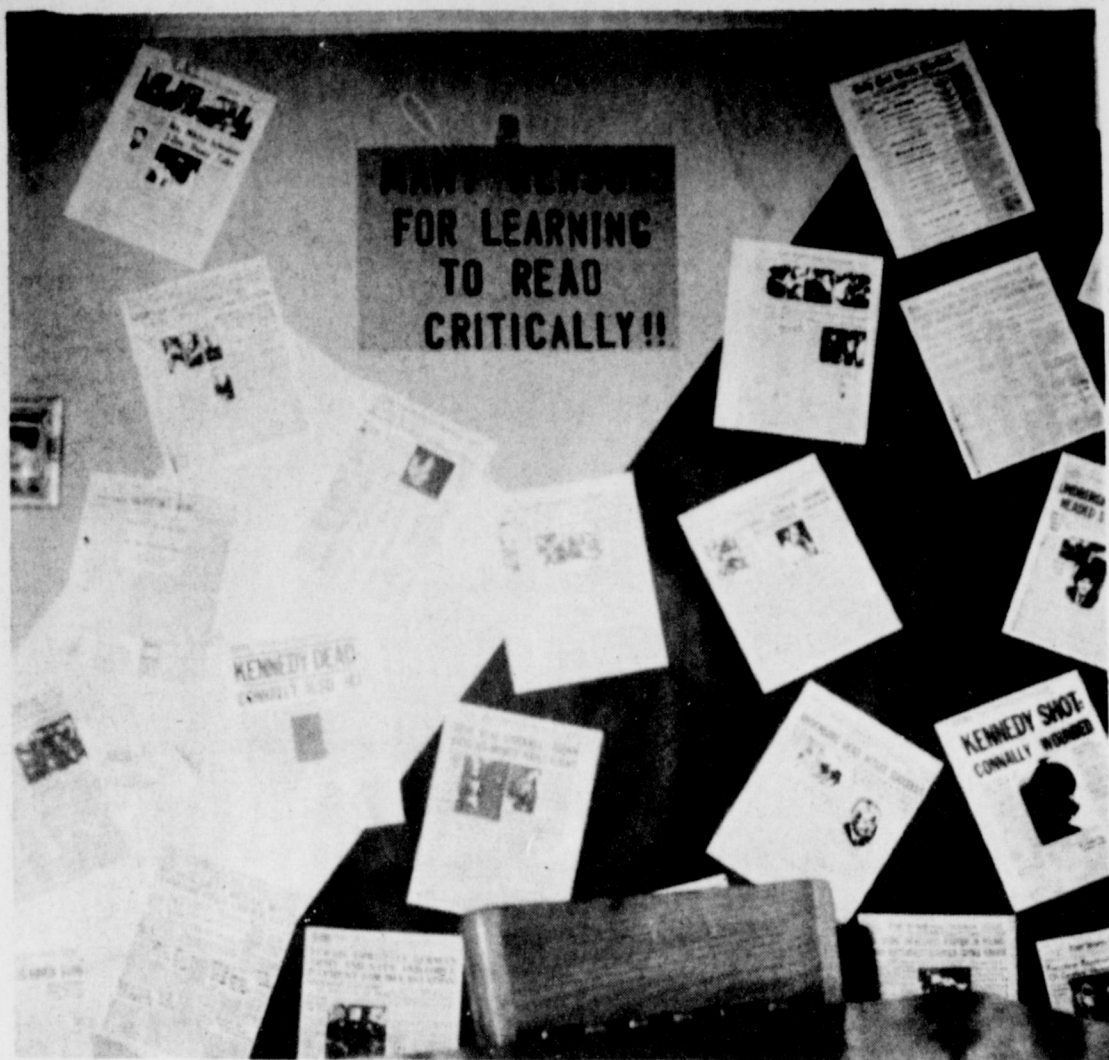

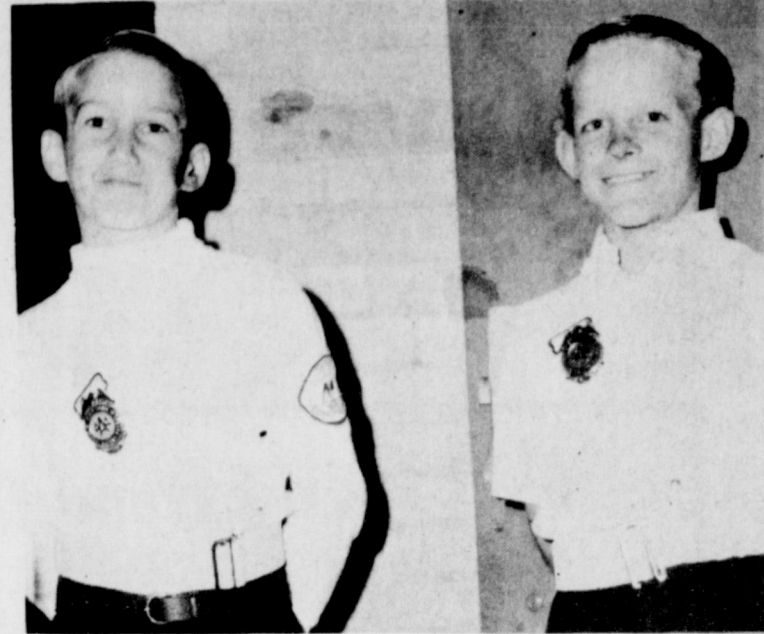

Records show that we checked out 641 paperback books last month! This was almost 1/3 of our total circulation- and attests to the popularity of this type of book; and we are getting more to add to our collection every week. We had 46 donated this week.

Two beautiful new books we are adding this week will be of interest to many: "Indian and Eskimo Artifacts of North America" is primarily a pictorial guide with explanatory captions, but it shows over two thousand examples of all of the major kinds of artifacts- tools, weapons, pottery, basketry, clothing, and ceremonial regalia are shown. The approach is informal, with the author's witty style making simple artifacts noteworthy. "Pictorial History of the Wild

West"- a true account of the bad men, desperadoes, rustlers and outlaws of the Old West- and the men who fought them to establish law and order. John Kenneth Galbraith's "Ambassador's Journal"; when President Kennedy appointed Mr. Galbraith to be his Ambassador to India in 1960, Mr. Galbraith decided that it would be an interesting time, and that he would keep a diary. So he did and this is it. His diary will be counted one of the most important, certainly one of the most readable and by all odds the most relaxed of the books on the Kennedy years.

"The Promise" by Chaim Potok; a sequel to The Chosen- Just as The Chosen summoned up the depths of the commitment that loving fathers make for their sons, this new novel evokes the promise that the young make to themselves, -the obstacles life interposes, and the strength, and daring that must be brought to bear if the

promise is to be kept. This is the story of the two boys who grew up together in Brooklyn, one a clinical psychologist-the other studying to be a Rabbi.

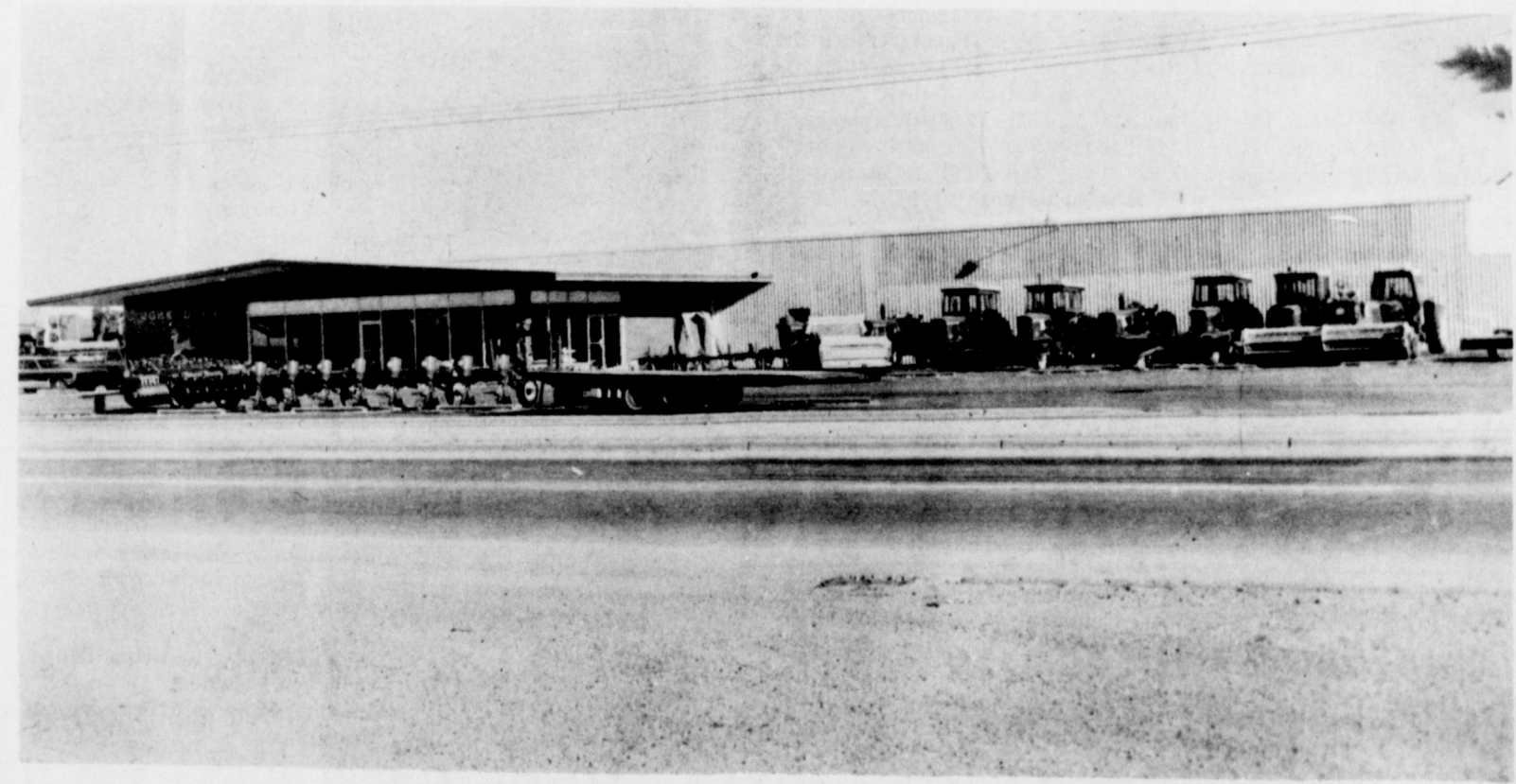

**THE PEARL** by John Steinbeck. A poignant tale based on an old Mexican legend, this is a simple story of tragedy in the great tradition. The poverty-stricken fisherman, Kino, finds a pearl of great price, only to be plagued by such sorrow and trouble that he longs to be rid of his treasures.

**THE CHOSEN** by Chaim Potok. A powerful novel that contrasts father-son relations in two very different orthodox Jewish families in Brooklyn's Williamsburg section.

**THE GOOD EARTH** by Pearl Buck. The story of the Chinese peasant Wang Lung and his wife, O-Lan, and their rise from rags to riches. This is not only a novel of China before the advent of Communism, but also a great epic of the soil and of man's universal struggle for a better life.

**THE EIGHTH DAY** by Thornton Wilder. John Ashley is accused of the murder of his friend, Breckenridge Lansing, and sentenced to death. Mysteriously, he escapes from prison, and the story traces the lives of various members of both families up to the time the murder is eventually solved.

We wish to say good-luck to her and wish her stay in Muleshoe to be a long one.

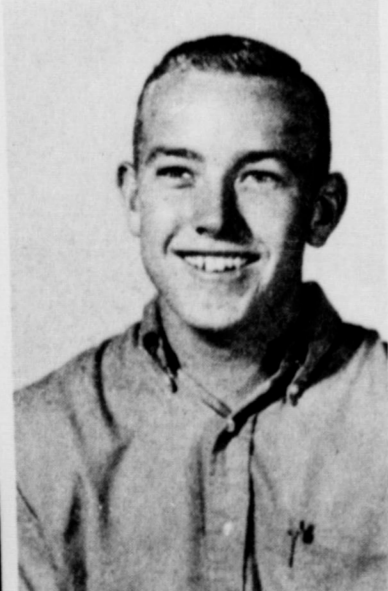

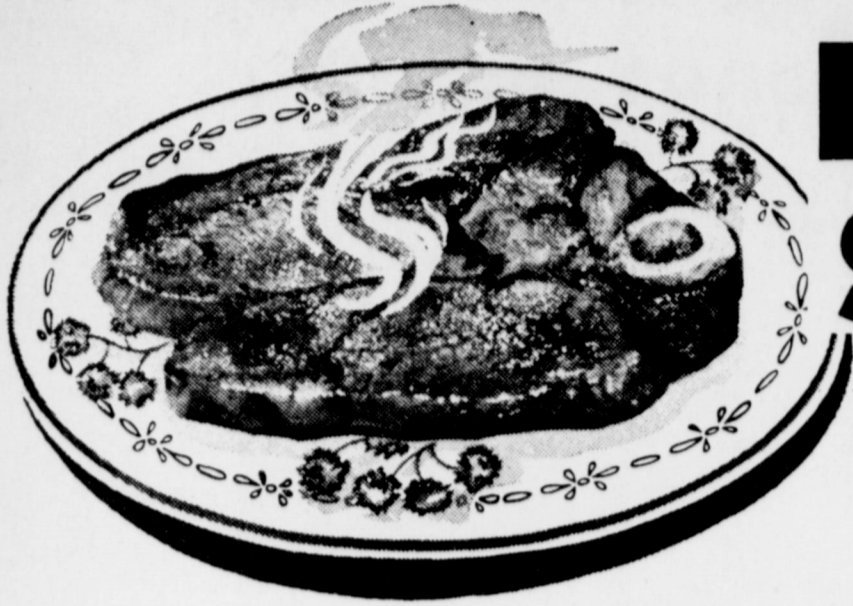
