Board Opts To Hire Only One New Coach

Bill Baker, certified public accountant of Borger, attended the meeting of the Groom School Board and reviewed the audit with board members last Tuesday. Baker's report reflected funds of the District as they stood on August 31. He noted the school has a balance in the General Fund of \$641,548.73. Baker said all accounts appear to be in good order and all accounting and checking procedures at the school appear to serve their intended purpose although his audit was not thorough enough to determine such. All accounting practices are certainly within state guidelines and procedures.

Missouri Man Found Shot At Comfort Station

Carson County Authorities and Texas Rangers continue their investigation into the slaying of a Missouri man found dead in his trailer at the comfort station 20 miles east of Amarillo on Saturday, December 11.

Louish H. Sidwell 62. of St. Carson County Deputies last Saturday evening. They initually thought Sidwell had died of natural causes, but

Sheriff Reed said his office is continuing their investigation with no new leads at this time.

until 10:00 Monday night. Department Supervisor Randal Patterson said his department ran seven trucks and two motor graders non stop but with the amount of snow and "lots of blow back with this storm" his crews had a difficult job keeping roads open.

"We have 565 lane miles to clear in our section with our highest concentration on keeping the Interstate open. The interstate was closed west out of Amarillo during the storm but the local sections were kept open.

Numerous stranded travelers were aided by the highway department workers who also lose time clearing roads as they take those stranded to the "nearest warm and safe place we can find," said Patterson.

Most businesses were kept from opening Monday as those who could stayed home. Exceptions were the Groom Grocery which owner Bill Ellington said he stayed busy all day as persons purhcased supplies to get them through the storm. The State National Bank also opened with four wheel drive vehicles sent to bring employees to work. Federal law prevents the Bank from closing without permission from their regulating agency.



Results of the EXCET test taken by teachers and adminsitrators around the state this fall reflect favorably on West Texas State University graduates. Of the 70 Texas institutions whose graduates took the test,

16th with an 87.9 percent pass rate. The statewide average was 82.1 percent.

WTSU ranked 8th among Texas' 33 state-supported institutions, surpassing Texas Tech whose graduates



les made his recommendations for the career ladder, in light of using "the most prudent way to handle the career ladder at this point." The board voted to maintain the present program, although as explained by administrators, actually, funding for the program through the State will be one teacher short this year. Ten tions will be made

According to Principal Ken Sweatt, the option selected by the board will raise the standards to keep

qualified teachers at present career ladder salary levels. "You have to consider what we can afford," he said.

Supterintendent Peeples added, "I don't know a soul we have, that if we had a lot of money, I wouldn't recom-

mend."
"Placing a cap on the program stiffles the teacher's motivation," Sweatt added.

It was also noted during the discussion that state base raises would be \$1,140 per teacher which will require some \$23,000 in local tax money to fund.

Peeples requested the board make a determination on whether to rehire one or two coaches to replace those leaving and what salary the district would be willing to pay which touched off over an hour long discussion. Sweatt added that the school had had a number of inquirtwo requests applications.

Peeples reported that surveying area schools with programs similar to Groom's operate with three coaches saying coaches agree that to run a junior varsity program, along with the varsity would require three coaches. Sweatt also told board members that he had reviewed a tentative schedule and that with shifting of subjects and high school teachers, "we could get by with two

Board member Bud Fields stated he leaned toward hiring two coaches seeing more 'ability on the basketball court during the next few the driveway from the snow that dumped 12 and a four foot drift covers the front porch.

years than on the football field. If we go the one coach route, I'd like to be sure that coach has strong basketball ability," he said. He went on citing that the basketball program has had the greatest success in recent years.

ball coach." He explained that because of the transition to a new system of football, he favored hiring a good six man coach.

That may be difficult according to Sweatt who said he had talked with a top notch six man coach from the south who could not consider coming to Groom and leaving the salary and benefits he enjoyed at his present job. The coach is paid \$6,000 above base pay, furnished a house and utilities free.

After a lengthy debate, board members voted to look for one coach, but left the option open to consider employing two coaches if one could not be found to take the job. It was also agreed that the new man could be offered from \$3,500 to \$4,500 above base pay depending on his qualifications. Another bargaining tool will be a house with two able when present coaches leave Groom.

The evaluation of Superintendent Peeples per-formance was tabled until the next meeting as Bill England was unable to complete his evaluation form on time. Board Secretary Don Lyles reported he had compiled figures on the six reports turned in by board members. The board opted to wait until the reports were 100 percent complete to do the evaluation.

In other action the board approved the audit report, ratified Roman Friemel as a representative to the Carson County Appraisal District Board and paid the bills.

Winter Storm Causes **Alanreed Fatality**

The Texas Panhandle's first major winter storm struck early Sunday morning and continued through early Monday evening. Before it was over, it had brought well over a foot of snow while wind gusts of 20-30 miles per hour left much higher drifts. Roads inside town were virtually impassable on Monday and I-40, though open, was extremely hazardous. The poor road conditions were still hampering travel as late as Wednesday.

The sotrm was a rude introduction to winter after the area had enjoyed unseasonably warm, dry days through the month of December. Although the snow ended Monday night, the National Weather Service was predicting cold temper-atures through the rest of the 20's and 30's and lows in the single digits and in some areas below zero. There was also the possibility of more snow by the end of the week.

Most people found it difficult, if not impossible, to go to work on Monday due to snow-packed roads and limited visibility caused by blowing snow. Local schools were closed down on Monday and Tuesday. On Monday, City Hall remained open for most of the day. The Bank of Commerce, McLean Pharmacy, Ham-bright Building Supplies, and the Cowboy opened for part of the day but closed down around midday as conditions worsened. Puckett's and Taylor Food Mart managed to remain open all day and places such as the Texas Motel and Restaurant and the Country Corner Texaco became a haven for stranded truckers and mot-

orists.



A seamless network of in-home and communitybased care often helps an elderly person avoid costly, unnecessary institutionalization.

The Panhandle Area Agency on Aging's program was refunded on the basis of the Department on Aging's favorable evaluation of its progress to date.

"As this project develops, our staff will be available to help assure its continued success," said Department on Aging Executive Director O.P. Bobbitt.
