

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Carson County Sheriff's Report

Nine persons were booked into the Carson County Jail over the past week. Three were arrested for violations of the Family Violence Code, two for DWI, two for Public Intoxication, one for Minor In Possession of Alcohol and one for Theft by Check.

Four persons remain in custody in the jail. One for Indecency with a Child, one for DPS Warrants, one for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and one for Felony Possession (3 lbs) of Marijuana.

This is the time of year when telephone solicitors began making their calls to generate funds for a number of organizations. Some callers indicate that they represent state or national law enforcement organizations. If you have questions regarding the validity of such calls, please contact our office and gi e us the name of the caller (if known), the organization they are supposed to represent and what the caller is soliciting (donations, information, subscriptions). We will investigate the matter and advise you if this organization appears to be

operating in a legal manner.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department has had an extremely high number of investigations in the past few months dealing with matters of sexual abuse and contact with children and domestic violence. It is our policy under the Family Violence Act to deal with the matter when we are initially called to the scene of a domestic dispute.

When we are sent to a domestic dispute we do not have the capacity to act as marriage counselors or as mediators. If a deputy observes any indication of assault (including pain on the part of the victim) the offending party will be responsible for the altercation, both parties will be a rrested and incarcerated. When children

are in the home, the Department of Human Services may be called to care for the children in the absence of one or both parents if there are no other relatives available to care for the children.

We can also be of assistance to persons having

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

Southwestern Bell Updates System

Many New Services Become Available....

Southwestern Bell Telephone customers in McLean and Alanreed will gain access to the mest dvanced telecommunications network available when Southwestern Bell converts its central office in these two towns to a new digital switching system on March 26th said Gary Stevens, Area Manager.

The new switching system will serve 799 McLean and Alanreed telephone customers in the 779 exchange.

McLean and Alanreed will receive the latest in telephone digital switch ng as part of an agreement announced in November,

1991 by the Texas Public Utility Commission and Southwestern Bell Telephone.

Southwestern Bell is installing the switch as part of an accelerated program designed to help boost the Texas economy and provide customer benefits worth more than \$1.2 billion through 1994.

"The negotiated settlement was a product of months of intense discussion among the PUC staff, Southwestern Bell and 23 separate intervening groups," said Stevens. agreement provided an incentive to build a telecommunications network that should attract new businesses and jobs to Texas without increasing telecommunications costs to the Texas ratepayers."

"With this conversation, McLean and Alanreed customers will be served by a switching system that is second to none," Stevens said.

Stevens explained that digital technology enhances a community's ability to retain and attract new business as well as improved

telecommunications services. "Digital switching enables

Southwestern Bell to improve voice transmission quality and to make available a number of new customer services," Stevens said.

New services made possible by digital switching include One-Plus Easy Access to long-distance carriers and Custom Calling features such as Call Forwarding, Call Waiting, Speed Calling and Three-Way Calling.

Stevens said another benefit of digital technology, aside from being the most advance system available, is its cost-effectiveness in terms of space requirements and maintenance. Computers in the system allow it to perform millions of switching functions each second. The system can

diagnose itself, and, in many cases, correct a problem before customers affected.

Once the cutover is completed, McLean and Alanreeed customers will have access to their primary long-distance telephone company of choice.

After the cutover it will be necessary to dial all en digits of the telephone number for local calls.

If you now have 900 call blocking and wish to have it after the new system is cutover you need to call your business office at 1-800-464-7928 before March 26, 1993 to order a touchtone line. If you do not have a touchtone line on March 27, 1993 you will not be able to continue using your touchtone telephones for outgoing

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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to re-distribute among other a hool districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create councy education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined County education districts may levy, collect, and dis-tribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be alowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$ 00 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem tax es redistributed and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 roposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring ex-penditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendnt applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31,

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates.'

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a an made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.


The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the per-manent school fund."
