passing Summer is quickly. Believe it or not, school resumes in one more month. Generally, by the time the first day of school rolls around, everyone is ready for it; parents and students.

If you missed the last 1992-93 school calendar that was published by the paper, there is another copy in this week's edition.

Several people have been working very hard this summer to improve the condition of our schools. I'm sure that you have noticed that the lawns, including the two football fields, look very good. Inside, the auditorium has new lighting and new paint. All of the classrooms at the high school have been repainted - with complementing, contrasting trim. I'm sure that it will be a welcome sight to the students.

We regret to inform you however, that our lunch prices had to be increased. Our lunch program continues to operate in the "red." Each year our losses amount to many thousands of dollars. We are trying to reduce these losses. We have reduced the cooking

staff by one and increased the cost of all lunches by 50¢ each. Therefore the cost of lunches for the school year 1992-93 will be as follows: Lunches for K-5 - \$1.50; Lunches 6-12 -\$1.75; Lunches for Staff -\$2,00.

One other item that will change in the cafeteria this school year is the way food is served. In the past, every student had to take what was prepared whether they wanted it or not. Beginning this school year, the program will change to "Offer vs. Serve." In other words, students will have an opportunity to have some choice as to what will be placed on their lunch tray. That should help improve the efficiency of our cafeteria, plus make the students happier.

There will be some new teachers on staff this year. We will run a "Beginning of School" article later in the summer. New staff members names will be published at that time.

State Rep. Warren Chisum, hospital board of trustees chairman Vic Raymond, and Economic Development Board chairman Bill Waters will speak briefly during the ceremonies. An artist's conception of the new building will be unveiled by chief of staff, Rene Grabato, MD.

CITY OF McLEAN PUBLIC NOTICE

The City of McLean has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the following maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department "Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.). The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water to be 11.73 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water such as bottled water, for their infants under 6 months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation. The city will offer to provide bottled water of acceptable quality to pregnant women and to infants under 6 months of age for cooking and drinking purposes.

Deed To Old Groom Hotel Presented To City Of Groom

The City of Groom has officially became the owner of the old Groom Hotel and Clinic Building. At their regular meeting last Tuesday night Helen Witt presented the deed to Mayor Jimmy Britten.

"Dr. Witt loved this town," said Mrs. Witt, "He thought there was no place on earth like Groom. He would have wanted the former clinic to benefit the town."

The U.S. 66 Hotel and Groom Clinic have loomed large in the history of Groom. Built in the 1920's, it was the pride of the town. Among the businesses it once housed were the hotel, beauty shop, barber shop,

post office, drug store, fire department and Southwestern Public Service

At one time the Church of Christ met in what later became Koetting Grocery, Blakeney Grocery, Cornett Grocery and finally part of Vivians. On at least one occasion a high school banquet was held there.

When Dr. Witt came to town in 1935 his office consisted of two rooms where Johnny Homer later had his pharmacy. As his practice grew he added two more rooms and finally purchased the hotel building, converting the east part of it to a hospital when See Old Hotel, pg. 5
