I spend a lot of time at the schools. I see how to gs go from day to day. Since I am not a teacher or administrator, I believe I can add a unique perspective to the situation. I see a group of very hard-working and of very hard-working and caring individuals who regardless of the difficult situations do as good a job as anyone could ask. Each one goes above and beyond the call of duty from the control of the cont from the custodial staff up to the principals. Almost every staff member helps in more than one area. The elementary school secretary works in the cafeteria and acts as a nurse when needed. The constoliant drive busses. custodians drive busses

and pulls cafeteria duty. The teachers often move from class to class helping one another so that the children who need special help receive it and so that they can have a music class. have a music class. The librarian works in the cafeteria, teaches computers and opens the library every Monday night so that the children will be successful in reading. The principal reading. The principal goes from class to class making sure everything is operating smoothly and that everyone has what they need. He carefully they need. watches who is coming in and out of the building and also teaches classes to free up teachers to do all the little extra things that need to be done.

Last year, we several teachers leave the elementary that were not replaced. This year, we have two more leaving who will not be replaced.
The teachers are shuffled around to fill the gaps and we will lose the Reading Recovery around to fill the gap-and we will lose the Reading Recovery Program. This program has helped so many children in the past. The High School, like the Grade School is

and It overworked understaffed. gotten to the point that almost the only elective left is helping as a student aid. The teachers student aid. in the High School are dedicated to their students and give them an excellent education. We have a very low drop-out rate. I believe that this is due to an aware staff that stays on top of things and are there for the kids. Principal Herring is a great asset to the school. He does everything he can to help the students succeed. I personally know know who several students who would not have graduated if it hadn't been for him.

Like Mr. Crockett, he is known to go to the students' homes when they miss class to make sure that they don't drop-out. Both men have Both men have helped students who have faced personal faced personal tragedy and depression. Their

High School needs Blaze Herring and the Grade School needs Dick Crockett. Both men have Dick helped my family many times.

I believe I believe a good example of the teachers' dedication to students was exhibited by Misty Hannon when she visited the homes of each of her students when one was killed.

There is a reason that McLean ISD has had an exemplary school for the past three years and we score so high on the TAAS tests. It is the staff.

I am asking you in the little bit of time we have left in this school year to visit the schools every day. Spend a lot of time there. Watch the children. See how they are taught. After all, are taught. After all, they are what this is all about. Next year, spend more time at the schools, volunteer to help with the reading, help in the cafeteria, visit each class. Some of you I have never seen at a PTA meeting, but every teacher is there for every meeting, but every teacher is there for every meeting, even when they live out of town.
