Because of the financial situation of the McLean Schools, we must make some drastic must make some drasic is getting ready to make is getting ready to make
some tough financial some tough financial decisions. Before you make those decisions, I would. like you to consider some things. I was told that the method that the School Board obtains its information is through the Superintendent and that he obtains his information from the two principals who in turn get information from the teachers. While those sources are valuable, other sources should be considered, too.
I spend a lot of time at the schools. I see how th gs go from day to day. Since 1 am not a teacher or
administrator, I believe I can add a unique perspective to the situation. I see a group of very hard-working and caring individuals who regardless of the difficult situations do as good a job as anyone could ask. Each one goes above and beyond the call of duty from the custodial stafi up to the principals. Almost every staff
member helps in more member helps in more than one area. The elementary school
secretary works in the secretary works in the cafeteria and acts as a nurse when needed. The custodians drive busses
and pulls cafeteria duty. unquestionable. The and pulls cafeteria move High School needs Blaze from class to class Herring and the Grade helping one another so. School needs Dick helping one another who Crockett. Both men have that the children who need special help receive it and so that they can have a music class. The librarian works in the cafeteria, teaches computers and opens the library every Monday iight so that the children will be successful in will be The principal reading. The principas goes from class to clas making sure everything is operating smoothly and that everyone has what they need. He carefulily watches who is coming in and out of the building and also teaches classes to free up teachers to do all the little extra things that need to be done.
Last year, we had several teachers leave the elementary that were not replaced. This year, we have two more leaving who will not be replaced. The teachers are shuffled around to fill the gaps and we will lose the Reading Recovery Program. This program program. helped so many has helped so many hildren in the past.
The High School, like the Grade School is inderstaffed. It understaffed. It ha gotten to the point that almost the only elective left is helping as student aid. The teachers in the High School are dedicated to their students and give them an excellent education. We have a very low dropout rate. I beheve that this is due to an aware staff that stays on top of things and are there for the kids. Principal Herring is a great asset to the school. He does everything he can to help the students succeed. I personally know of several students who would not have graduated if it hadn't been for him.

Like Mr. Crockett, he is known to go to the students' homes when they miss class to make sure that they don't drop out. Both men have helped students who have enced personal itaged and depression tragedy dedication is
helped my family many times.

I believe a good example of the teachers' dedication to their students was exhibited by Misty Hannon when she visited the homes of each of her students when one was killed.

There is a reason that McLean ISD has had an exemplary school for the past three years and we score so high on the TAAS tests. It is the staff.
I am asking you in the little bit of time we have left in this school year to visit the schools every day. Spend a lot of children. See how they children. See how they are taught. After all, they are what this is all about. Next year, spend more time at the schools, volunteer to help with the reading, help in the cafeteria, visit each class. Some of you I have never seen at a PTA meeting, but every teacher is there for every meeting, even when they live out of town. When you make your decisions in which areas to cut, make the best decision...an informed one.
Suggestions: 1)Stop financing student trips except for gas and transportation. students can hold fundraisers. 2)Turn the air conditioners on to 80 degrees and the heaters to 70 degrees. 3)Fix the computers and sell the surplus ones since they are not used and some are not in working condition. 4)Use the assets we have and make do with what we have. 5)Have an open town meeting where the whole community can brainstorm. Someone in the community may have an idea that you haven't thought of. 5) Use
volunteers from volunteers from the
community to help with tutoring to help assist where we are lacking in the Reading Recovery Program.
