Groom Tigers Stay With State Ranked McLean Through First Half

Groom Tigers lost Friday night in what has become the season's biggest rival game in the district. Penalties and short first downs seemed to plague Groom.

The Tigers netted 80 yards in penalties compared to 10 for McLean. The balance of penalty over

yardage came at very critical times for Groom.

Against those odds. Groom still played remarkably well. Brian Baker pulled in 105 yards rushing. Bruce Britten completed 6 of 13 passes and threw for 110 yards. Kirk Webb and Paul McLaughlin rushed for 35

and 30 yards, respectively. Todd Cockrell looked extremely good, returning kickoffs. Coach O'Dell stated that he expects to see more action out of him in the weeks to come.

9-1-1 Service Begins Oct. 25

Telephone subscribers in the Panhandle (537), Groom (248), Skellytown (848), White Deer (883) and Amarillo (335) exchanges will be able to access 9-1-1 services beginning October 25, 1991. The Carson County 9-1-1 system is one of 23 planned systems to be implemented across the Panhandle.

The availability of 9-1-1 service in Carson County

Sheriff's Dept. Adds **Two More Deputies To Staff**

Bobby Joe Leatherwood and Bret D. Henderson have been hired to the Carson County Sheriff's Department. The official action came during the Commissioners' Court meeting on Friday, October 11.

Leatherwood, who has recently been employed by Panhandle Police the Department, will live in the Fritch area and serve as a county deputy at a salary of \$18,436.

Henderson, hired as jailer/dispatcher, will receive an annual salary of \$12,000. The Court also approved

a \$100 per month increase for office expense for Justice of Peace Precinct 6 in Skellytown. The increase will now bring this monthly payment to \$200.

Commissioners, after discussing the problems of trash and old tires being dumped on county right-ofways, issued a statement asking the public to please dispose of trash and other items in the proper manner. This type of activity carries a penalty in the form of a fine.

A request from the County Judges and Commissioners Association to contribute \$150 to the association to help recover costs incurred in obtaining Legislative relief from jail overcrowding also received Court approval. It was announced that the new 911 emergency system for Carson County residents should be in operation in a few days. The tentative date is October 25. Relative to that system, discussion was held on marking county roads, a necessary procedure to help emergency personnel respond as quickly as possible to a specific location.

Groom Sales Tax, 71/4 %; Amarillo, 81/4 %-**Groom's Sales Rebate Down As Other Towns**

City of Groom sales tax rebate this period is \$2,344.65. October payments to the city include taxes collected on August sales and reported in September by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state. Businesses file either monthly, quarterly or annually depending on the amount of sales tax they collect.

Merchants collect the states' 6 1/4 per cent state sales tax and the 1 percent local tax levied in Groom, McLean, and Claude.

The tax is then sent to the Comptroller' Office. The state retains its share and returns to the cities their local portion of the sales tax.

WASHINGTON -- A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nu-trition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with ©1991 Omicron Int



On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to clelete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but no later than November 15, 1991. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 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
