

I just got in the 1996 accident records for the State of Texas and things don't look too bad. During 1996, there were 3,247 fatal traffic accidents which resulted in 3,738 deaths.

This is a 17.8% increase from the 1995 fatality figure of 3,172 deaths. The Texas D e p a r t m e n t o f Transportation reports that 187.064 billion vehicle miles were traveled in Texas during 1996, a 2.2% increase in miles traveled as compared to 1995. Deaths in rural areas of Texas, which includes towns with

less than 5,000 population, increased by 21.7% when compared to 1995. There were 2,225 fatalities in 1996 compared to 1,829 fatalities in 1995. Fatalities increased on all classes of roadway for both rural and urban routes during 1996. The largest increase (32%)occurred on rural county roads, followed closely by U.S. and highways (28%). Rural interstate highways saw the smallest increase in fatalities (11%). City roads, which include interstate, U.S., and state routes, increased by 13%. It is unknown at this time if the increased speed limits had a part in the rise of fatalities. Other items of interest include, that there were no deathless days in That means that there was a traffic accident that killed someone every day of the year in 1996.

These accidents resulted in 57% (2,135) fatalities. In 1996, the proportion of fatalities which were alcohol related decreased to 33.3% as compared to 1995 when 35.9% were alcohol related.

Single vehicle accidents

accounted for 60% (1,948)

of all 1996 fatal accidents.

#### Sick Plant Clinic

The Carson County Extension Service will be hosting a Sick Plant Clinic from 1:00 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. Thursday, June 26th.

Dr. Harold Kaufman, Plant Pathologist and Dr. Carl Patrick, entomologist, will be at the Carson County Extension Office to identify plant problems for homeowners and producers. If you are having a problem with a tree or plant, this would be a good time to have it diagnosed. Even though the proportion decreased, the total number of alcohol related fatalities (1,244) increased by 9.3% from the 1,138 in 1995. There were 115 motorcycle fatalities (operators and passengers) in 1996. This figure is a 10.9% decrease over the 129 killed in 1995. Pedestrian fatalities in 1996 totaled 447, which is a 3.0% decrease from the 1995 total of 461.

In 1996 there were a total of 298,143 reported accidents in Texas compared to 351,073 in 1995. This resulted in 3,738 deaths compared to 3,172 in 1995. There were 350,397 people injured as compared to 334,259 in 1995.

On 06-14-97, I worked an accident in front of the Trading Post in Conway. A TTST driven by a James Floyd McCormick of Lafayette, TN overturned on the access road. The truck was going too fast to make the curve and turned onto its left side. The load of cantaloupes were transferred to another truck. The driver was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo by the Panhandle EMS. driver was cited for unsafe speed, ride not secured by seat belt, and defective trailer brakes. Numerous stress fractures were present in the brake shoes, scary thought. A truck weighing 80,000 lbs and all the brakes are not working!



## Helen Britten Honors Rescuers At FBC

Helen Britten honored rescuers recently at the First Baptist Church in Amarillo, for their 145-day search for the bodies of her family.

Her husband, Dr. Robert Britten, 41, and their three sons - Patrick, 9, Benjamin, 8, and Phillip, 11 - died December 14 when their boat capsized during a duck-hunting expedition at Lake Meredith. Ben, the last to be found, was located May 8.

Mrs. Britten honored the searchers with a plaque and a dinner in memory of her family.

"People have been unconditionally sacrificial of their time and companionship, and this helps me give back to

them," Mrs. Britten said.

She thanked rescuers for not giving up on the search to recover the body of Ben.

Carl Dyer, a Park Ranger at Lake Meredith, recovered all four bodies. He said that he and other searchers kept going out every day because they felt a sense of responsibility to Helen Britten.

Mrs. Britten said that the support of her family, friends and church has helped her deal with the tragedy.

"I've felt lonely, but never alone," she said.

## If You Ask Me . . . And Nobody Did

Let's call this segment. .
"Country Goes To Town." I know I'm a little bit of a hick and, frankly, I'm pretty "Why" you proud of it. might ask? Well, it's because I'm just constantly surprised about things that other people take for granted.

The Complex itself covers about four city blocks. It is connected by walkways that go out over the streets. #### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons currently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."






