Those making up the crowd at the rally were a



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## County To Benefit By Suit

Carson County will approximately \$116,139.00 from the state's settlement with the tobacco industry according to preliminary estimates released by House Speaker Laney's office.

State officials and the industry wound up their negotiations last week with the tobacco companies agreeing to pay Texas \$17.6 billion over a 26-year period.

The settlement is more than \$2 billion higher than the industry originally said it would pay the state.
"The trust account will

provide a substantial, perpetual source of revenue to help offset the cost of providing health care," Laney said. "This approach to managing the funds will ensure that the payments we receive now provide will lasting benefits future for Texans."



I have taken all of the courses required by the state, including the hour exam, certified tax collector. have been certified this field since 1985, which required to hold position.


